Smog Plagues Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Residents were offered little relief today from a four-day fog-smog attack that consisted partly of a sulphuric acid mist similar to that found in the killer fogs which once engulfed Donora, Pa., and London, England.

Scattered showers fell late Tuesday night but failed to cleanse the basin area of the eye-irritating air. The U.S. Weather Bureau said the earliest relief in sight was in the late afternoon.

Thousands of irate citizens complained to the Air Pollution Control District Tuesday as the heavy pall of dirty air hovered over the city and cut visibility to less than a mile.

S. Smith Griswold, APCD chief, told the city board of supervisors there was no way presently known to measure the acid content of the air.

Editors Seek Count Revise

SANTA CRUZ (UPI) — A committee of California editors has demanded a reform of California's "archaic" method of counting election returns.

In a report released Tuesday, the editors said a drastic reform is needed to speed returns and to reduce the number of inaccuracies. They pointed out as an example of unnecessary delays the contests for secretary of state and Proposition 9 on the November ballot.

The editors listed four principal areas that need reform: 1 — Illegal procedures in vote tabulation at the precinct level.

2 — A lack of statewide tabulation before the official canvass and count of absentee ballots. This job is now being done on an unofficial basis by the wire services.

3 — The need for a law governing the tabulation of the vote at the county level.

4 — Political buck-passing for the responsibility of vote counting owing to the lack of state requirements.

Board Okays Dam Contract

PENDLETON (AP) — A contract leasing the McNary Dam townsite to two California industrialists was approved Tuesday by the board of trustees of the Confederated Indian Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation.

Robert and William H. Schultz, owners and operators of the R. S. Engineering and Manufacturing Co. of Los Angeles and the S and S Steel Products Corp. of Compton, Calif., plan to build a house trailer manufacturing plant on the 344-acre site.

The Schultz brothers, who hold a five-year lease with an optional renewal clause, will pay \$1,200 monthly for the site, which includes homes built by the government for construction workers. They have been empty since the dam was completed.

Detroit Says Home Is Going To Dogs, Cats

DETROIT (AP) — Edward J. Grifford didn't mind his wife's six dogs and three cats so much when he was working. But when he was unemployed the animals were unbearable.

So Grifford gave his wife a 30-day ultimatum — get rid of the animals or else. The ultimatum expired Tuesday. Grifford walked to police headquarters and asked to be locked up for 90 days. He was booked as a vagrant.

"I'm not a vagrant," Grifford told Recorder's Judge George Murray. "I've got a home—but it's full of cats and dogs. I'd like to go to jail to get away but there should be a better charge than vagrancy."

Judge Murray said he could find no other charge to cover the situation. Grifford left for home mumbling.

The payment — amounting to \$167,041 — comes largely from state income taxes and is distributed to county schools.

Four annual payments equal approximately the same amount each quarter. The next payment is due about February, Mrs. Cook said.

CINCINNATI (AP) — The officer said, "I'm going to lock you up on a vagrancy charge so you can have something decent to eat Thanksgiving."

And he took the man he said was scavenging in a garbage can to the police station.

But booking officers got a surprise from the man, James Romannell, 35 and homeless, who was wearing ragged clothes.

A routine search of his pockets turned up a big wad of money — \$230. Then a bank book turned up with deposits of \$7,900.

Police decided to charge the man with "removing waste from a container." They told him he had enough money to post bond.

But police said he told them, "Why should I pay to get out? This is as good as any place I sleep."

Paper Company Still Mulls Sites

NEW YORK (AP) — Headquarters of International Paper Co. reported no decision Tuesday on sites for its proposed West Coast plants.

Its location engineer, Harlan Shope, is on the West Coast, but would have little to add to this, the headquarters statement said.

The company has filed for water rights at three Oregon locations, two near Roseburg and one near Klamath Falls. It was in answer to a question whether this meant decision had been reached that the company said the matter was still undecided.
