



First stop on Squanto's return to America was the island of Monhegan off the coast of Maine.



There they picked up Samoset, a chief of the Wampanoag. They then sailed for Plymouth Harbor, arriving there about six months before the Pilgrims.



This was the territory of Squanto's tribe, the Patuxet. But the wandering Wampanoag, a neighboring tribe, but he was restless and unhappy.

The Pilgrims, during their first winter in the New World, caught only brief glimpses of Indians in the distance.



Then in spring, Samoset strode boldly into their settlement. He told them of the great chief Massasoit—and of Squanto, who once lived in the Pilgrim's own land.



In a few days Samoset returned with Massasoit, sagamore of the Wampanoag, a party of warriors and Squanto. Later, with Squanto as interpreter, the Pilgrims and Indians formed a treaty of peace. Based on mutual trust and respect, it stood unbroken for half a century.

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP)—The four grandchildren of President and Mrs. Eisenhower join them at their vacation retreat today for the Thanksgiving weekend. The youngsters are scheduled to fly from Washington for turkey dinner Thursday at the Augusta National Golf Club. The children are being accompanied by their parents, Army Maj. John Eisenhower and his wife Barbara. The family arranged to travel aboard an Air Force courier plane which makes the trip to Augusta almost daily to bring government documents and reports to the President. Eisenhower's son John, now on the White House staff, will sit in here Friday morning at the President's conference with Pentagon and Budget Bureau officials on military spending. The conference delegation from Washington will include Secretary of Defense Neil H. McElroy; Gen. Nathan F. Twining, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; and Budget Director Maurice H. Stans.

Many of the mourners in the Home of Peace Mausoleum were present at the Friars Club Sunday when Einstein, 34, collapsed with a fatal heart attack. A few minutes before he was stricken, the comedian had delivered a show-stopping monologue at the Friars dinner honoring Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz.

Japanese Imperial Council To Announce Marriage

TOKYO (AP)—The Imperial Council is expected to announce Thursday that Crown Prince Akihito will marry a pretty commoner, Michiko Shoda, whom he wooed and won largely by telephone. After years of discreet guessing who the next empress will be, Japanese were told today that Akihito has picked his bride. An announcement said the Imperial Council will meet Thursday "to discuss matters concerning the marriage of the crown prince."

Cotton Fails To Do Work

OROVILLE, Calif. (AP)—Some of the prisoners sang "Power Is in the Blood" but not Donald Smith. He sat in the Butte County Jail, his ears stuffed with cotton, playing cards. Smith, awaiting trial on a forgery charge, had protested his constitutional rights were being violated by having to listen to sermons and hymns each Tuesday night. The jailer provided Smith, 25, with the cotton. "It didn't work," Smith said. "We can't sing very well." "You can't sing at all," Smith shouted from his cell. He finally threw down his cards, shouted, "I should have played the jack," and retired to a corner where he held his hands over his cotton-plugged ears.

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Millions Of Americans To Fete Holiday At Home

Millions of Americans will celebrate Thanksgiving at home Thursday, while the traditional fowl simmers in the oven, and the winds howl outside. It was expected to be one of the homeliest Thanksgivings in recent years with much of the nation facing bad weather and two of the largest airlines out of service because of strikes.

Police Probe More Scares

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP)—Police checked the third and fourth school explosion scares in Albuquerque today. Separate anonymous telephone calls late Tuesday warned of nitroglycerine being placed in two University of New Mexico buildings—one a dormitory—and a bomb hidden in Highland High School. Police found nothing. Those scares came just after Albuquerque officers searched two other schools, Sandia High and Andrew Jackson Junior High, for bombs. Students there were evacuated, and police swarmed into the buildings, finally reporting they found nothing. The anonymous warnings came within two days of a blast at Heizer Junior High School in Hobbs, N.M. A single classroom was damaged there, and Hobbs police found dynamite wrappings in the debris, and some fuse.

NY Honors Grace, Mate

NEW YORK (AP)—Prince Rainier III and Princess Grace of Monaco are now honorary citizens of New York City with the privileges of the exclusive Lotus Club thrown in for extra measure. The royal couple were honored Tuesday night at a state dinner at the club, membership of which includes President Eisenhower. Mayor Robert F. Wagner welcomed them to the city and declared them honorary citizens. Rainier and his wife, former film star Grace Kelly, plan to spend Thanksgiving in Philadelphia with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John B. Kelly. They will visit in this country about a month before returning to Monaco.

The National Safety Council did not make a prediction on the expected traffic death toll, but it noted that during a non-holiday period extending from 6 p.m. Wednesday to midnight Sunday 470 persons would be killed. Most states and cities ordered out extra contingents of police to handle the expected heavy increase in auto traffic and to keep the death toll at a minimum. However, the National Safety Council said Thanksgiving is not one of the holidays noted for drunken or reckless driving. Strikes at Eastern and Trans World Airlines were expected to reduce the air traffic by one-third during the holiday period, and many persons decided to stay at home rather than face a long auto trip. Members of the armed forces throughout the nation and at foreign stations will be served full dress turkey dinners from cranberry sauce to cocktail nuts. Institutes of penal institutions will get fowl dinners with all the trimmings, and throughout the nation the homeless and the vagabonds can share in giving thanks at charity kitchens. Churchgoers of all sects will attend services in reminder of the days when the Thanksgiving turkey was as much a sacrifice to God as to pilgrims' hunger.

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
