



THOUGH HE CAN'T take a trip to the moon in person, Charlie Norris of Cincinnati, Ohio, has the next best thing — a 1,800-power homemade telescope which brings the moon to within an apparent distance of 130 miles from his back yard. Charlie, operator of a TV service, got the bug after the first Sputniks were launched and built the 13-foot reflector for \$300 and a year of part-time work. New Wave Of Asian Flu Unlikely

WASHINGTON (NEA) — If the Asian flu bugs decide to attack again this year, the resulting conflict will probably be strictly a limited war.

Dr. C. C. Dauer, U.S. Public Health Service flu expert, declares: "Influenza virus is hovering around somewhere. When conditions are right it will blossom forth into epidemics. But we think they will only be in localized areas."

Main reason why Dr. Dauer and other specialists don't expect another global or national epidemic of Asian flu is that the thousands of people who contracted the virus have now built up some natural resistance to it which they didn't have when it struck for the first time last year.

Also, the special vaccine de-

signed to boost this resistance is plentiful supply throughout the country and is considered to be a highly effective deterrent against another world-wide attack.

Actually, specialists are not even sure whether the Asian bug will be involved in this year's brush fire-type flu war. They think the 1958 culprit might be the "Bon" bug, another type of flu virus which for some unknown reason pulls sneak attacks only once every four or five years. It's been about that long since the last time the Bons struck this country.

The word Bon is actually an abbreviation of the name of a flu patient from whose blood doctors first isolated this particular virus.

Flu experts explain that the strong chance of it striking in 1958 is no real cause for alarm. A vaccine to combat it has been in existence for years. Also, they say the virus is relatively weak and has never been known to cause a nationwide epidemic.

Doctors explain that usually just one type of virus strikes each year. Whether this year's culprit will be the Asian or Bon variety probably won't be known until December, the month that medical intelligence experts believe 1958's flu season will begin.

These experts explain that there are also a few other clans of flu bugs in existence. But these germs are either pretty weak or have been around so long that they're becoming extinct and aren't likely to cause much trouble.

Scientists, however, aren't taking any chances. They have combined several vaccines, including those used to combat Asian and Bon flu, into one potent dose so that people can be prepared for all the known treacherous bugs.

Surgeon General Leroy Burney stresses that the decision of whether a person should be vaccinated should be left up to his doctor. But

he believes that it would be a good idea if the vaccine were given to hospital workers, people who live or work in institutions and workers who hold jobs in a business that would be severely hampered by a

lot of absences at one time. He also believes consideration should be given to vaccinating pregnant women and people who are old or chronically ill. Looking back on last year's epi-

demic, many doctors agree that the danger potential of the Asian bug was overrated. Of course, there's no doubt that it played a part in killing plenty of people. But doctors report that the flu and pneumonia death rate was actually higher in 1953. An epidemic reached its peak in February of that year when about 78 out of every 100,000 persons in the U.S. died from these closely linked diseases. Last year's epidemic reached its peak in November. But flu and pneumonia killed only about 67 out of every 100,000 people.
