

Missing Minister Found; Shills For Vegas Casino

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — A missing Baptist minister from Kansas, found working as a shill in a gambling casino, says: "I've never been happier. For the first time in my life I have peace of mind."

The Rev. Maurice D. Tulloch, 50, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Sabetha, Kan., vanished there two months ago. Located Wednesday at a downtown rooming house by a reporter, he said he abandoned his church and home to get away from his wife. The minister said he came here to get a divorce because "I'm tired of my wife after 25 years." He added: "I left because I felt the walls closing in." He said he referred to his wife and the church.

For 18 years he had been a church troubleshooter, a pastor assigned to churches in financial or morale trouble in communities of 1,500 to 2,000.

Last Sept. 29, he said, he walked out in the middle of a church seminar and went to a bus station. He stood in line behind a woman he heard order a ticket to Las Vegas and, on the spur of the moment, ordered the same.

Arriving in this desert gambling resort, he had only \$20 in his pocket. He asked a waitress if she knew of any work. She advised him to seek work as a shill

—a casino employee who poses as a customer to drum up trade.

"I walked into the first casino I passed, told the boss I had never been gambling and would like to learn, so he put me to work as a shill," he said.

"I'm going to write a book about gambling. It's fascinating, the characters you meet here."

He said he's also writing a book on "Practical Thinking for Christian People," which he described as a common-sense approach to world problems.

Spectacled, with graying, crew-cut hair, the pastor looks closer to 40 than 50. He talked rationally and appeared healthy and in good spirits.

Tulloch said his wife Nellie, had been nervous and under a doctor's care. He has a son, 23, and a daughter, 19.

He said he had talked with his wife by telephone and she had asked him to return and start a new life. He said he told her that was impossible and he's happy now.

Tulloch earns \$1 an hour, six or seven days a week. He said he still attends church—the Church of Christ—every Sunday.

He said he doesn't plan to continue working in the casino and has applied for a job with the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation at nearby Hoover Dam.

CIT Chemistry Professor Says Smog Worst Since '55

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Smog in the Los Angeles basin area has been worse this year than any year since 1955—despite some 70 million dollars spent on control devices, according to Dr. A. J. Hansen-Smit.

Hansen-Smit, professor of bio-organic chemistry at California Institute of Technology at Pasadena and consultant to the county Air Pollution Control District (APCD), Wednesday said climate conditions were mostly to blame for this year's dense smog which has brought outeries from citizens.

"One effect of unusually high temperatures is a heavy loss of gasoline vapors from carburetors and automobile gas tank vents because gasoline starts boiling at about 92 degrees Fahrenheit."

He said another weather phenomenon causing intensity of smog in the area was low inversion levels — bands of hot air hovering near the earth that act like lids over the basin, preventing air pollutants from escaping.

Hansen-Smit said a new county ordinance limiting the use of fuel oil in generating plants during smog months will eliminate "all but one of the major sources of smog."

"We will have only the automobile still uncontrolled," he noted. Meanwhile, angry protests from residents following a three-day smog attack which abruptly ended Wednesday has spurred the city council to urge the holding of a second national conference on air pollution to be held under the supervision of the U. S. Department of Public Health.

President Eisenhower has been appealed to directly by a Citizen's Anti-smog Action Committee which in a telegram asked the chief executive "for protection from the oil industry."

Francis Packard, chairman of the committee, sent the telegram which in part said, "We need immediate relief and plead that you take drastic action. Our troops were rushed to the Middle East to protect the oil interests. Now we Americans appeal for protection from the oil industry."

Squanto Taught Pilgrims Planting

He was the Indian Saint of Plymouth and Governor Bradford called him "a special instrument sent by God for their good beyond expectation"—but few people would recognize his name today.

Historians say that without him, there would have been no first Thanksgiving Day 337 years ago.

very little information on these years—and he was sent back to America in 1614 with Capt. John Smith.

Freedom was short.

One of Smith's ships was instructed to tarry in what is now Plymouth Harbor and trade with the Indians for fish and furs. When ready to depart, the captain lured some Indians on board, threw

with the neighboring Wampanoag tribe, also much weakened by disease. Several months after the Pilgrims landed Squanto attached himself to the European colony.

Squanto's personal tragedy was life-saving good fortune for the Pilgrims.

If the little band of Englishmen had landed in territory held by a strong tribe of Indians, they would probably have been killed or driven off immediately.

But they happened upon the empty Patuxet lands. Then came Squanto, Governor Bradford's "special instrument sent by God," to show the Pilgrims how to plant the seed corn they had found hidden by a tribe on Cape Cod where they stopped before coming to Plymouth.

The Patuxet lands were old and not too fertile, but Squanto showed the Pilgrims how to plant the corn in properly spaced hillocks with three herrings in each to fertilize the plants.

Squanto showed his new friends how to hunt and fish in the strange woods, what crops were good to eat and how they could be grown and he acted as a tireless interpreter between the Pilgrims and neighboring Indians.

Squanto was the interpreter who negotiated the treaty with Massachusetts — an important chief in the Massachusetts area. That treaty gave the Pilgrims peace and the opportunity to build their first little settlement into a thriving town.

He died of an "Indian fever" about two years after the Pilgrims arrived.

Squanto's title of the Indian Saint of Plymouth was earned—not given. Those who could stick to the most stern regulations of the hard Pilgrim life were called Saints. Those families who did not quite measure up were known as Strangers.

Squanto, the one-time slave and captive, lived up to the most rigid rules . . . and earned his title of Saint.

Despite Work, Flag To Fly

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Wrecking crews are fast tearing down the east front of the U.S. Capitol but the American flag, which flies there 24 hours a day, will wave through it all.

J. George Stewart, architect of the Capitol rebuilding, said plans have been made to keep the flag flying night and day through the reconstruction of the east front. Initially a temporary staff will be erected just behind the traditional location, at the base of the dome and angled outward.

The east front is being rebuilt exactly duplicating the old front except it will be made of marble instead of the crumbling sandstone it now consists of. The job will take two years.

Squanto was captured in 1605 by an English exploring party led by Capt. George Weymouth who wanted a souvenir of his trip to the New World.

Squanto was one of the unfortunate. Luckily for him, he was bought by a kindly group of friars who treated him well and converted him to Christianity.

After several years, he escaped and made his way to England where kind-hearted men sent him back to America with Capt. Thomas Dermer. He landed at Plymouth about six months before the Pilgrims. With two round trips to Europe behind him, he undoubtedly was the most traveled Indian in New England.

But homecoming this time was sad. Disease—probably measles or smallpox—had killed Squanto's entire family and tribe. He stayed

Injuries Kill Coos Woman

Oregon's Thanksgiving holiday death toll stood at one today. The lone victim was Mrs. Evelyn Foss, 32, of Coos Bay, who died Wednesday night of injuries suffered in a head-on automobile collision.

Mrs. Foss was injured in an accident on U.S. Highway 99 near Crescent, which also injured a couple and their three sons in the other car involved.

State Policeman Norman Adams said Mrs. Foss apparently lost control of her car after passing another northbound car and swerved across the center line into the path of a southbound vehicle.

The southbound car carried Donald Clocksin, 36; his wife, 33; and their three sons, 12, 10 and 9. Mr. and Mrs. Clocksin suffered head injuries and the three boys suffered minor injuries. They were taken to the Cottage Grove Hospital.

Adams said seven other cars were involved in accidents in a traffic tie-up following the head-on collision. Five cars were involved in one pile-up and two in another. A college student, identified only as Diana Dayton of Grants Pass, suffered back injuries and was hospitalized in Eugene.

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
