

British Critics Laud Play Where Negro Kisses White

LONDON (UPI) — The first play on the British stage in which a white girl is kissed by a Negro man was hailed by critics today for its "honesty and dignity."

The play, "Hot Summer Night" by British playwright Ted Willis, opened at the West End New Theatre Wednesday night. Its theme of colored boy and white girl falling in love struck home to many Britons who still are disturbed by race riots in London's Notting Hill District less than three months ago.

Plane Search Has Halted

SALEM (AP) — A search, mainly concentrated in the Columbia River gorge, for a missing plane with two persons aboard was halted Wednesday.

Earl Snyder, Oregon Aeronautics Board director, said rough weather in the gorge hindered the search.

"We have risked the lives of enough people already in the search," he said.

A plane piloted by Lowell Adams, 42, and carrying Mrs. Eloise Koonz, 31, both of Yakima, vanished Saturday en route from Richland, Wash., to Portland.

Snyder said planes will scan the route when the weather clears.

Fall Victim Files Charge

A customer of Kimball's Glass Shop has filed suit in circuit court for \$10,000 damages allegedly resulting from a fall in the store two years ago.

Katherine E. Bryson claims she was looking at merchandise in the store November 24, 1956, when she fell in a portion of the store being remodeled. The fall, her suit claims, resulted in a broken wrist and other injuries.

She seeks from Donald P. Smith and an unidentified employee, \$10,000 general damages, \$286 drug expenses, \$400 doctors' expenses, \$47 back brace costs, \$265 costs for care and \$200 medical travel expenses.

PLANES BREAK RECORDS NEW YORK (UPI) — Two Pan American World Airways Boeing 707 jet airliners broke transatlantic speed records in flights from New York to Europe, the airlines said Wednesday.

Pan Am said one of its jets made it from New York to Shannon, Ireland, in 5 hours and 39 minutes. Another flew from New York to Le Bourget Airfield outside Paris in 6 hours and 32 minutes.

SAC Bomber Explodes

LAKE CHARLES, La. (UPI) — A Strategic Air Command B47 Stratofortjet armed with a nuclear device exploded and burned Wednesday on the flight line at Chennault Air Force Base, killing the pilot and burning a crewman.

At the time, the B47 was on alert for nuclear retaliation in the event of enemy attack. However, the Air Force said there was no danger of a nuclear explosion and no harmful radiation was present.

The pilot, Capt. Joseph T. Lyles, of Bossier City, La., was killed instantly. The navigator, 1st Lt. Robert R. Simpson of Sacramento, Calif., was burned severely.

Col. T. S. Walters, base commander, said the plane caught fire and burned while parked on the flight line. Other aircraft in the area were moved as a precaution, he said.

All personnel except firefighters were evacuated from the base, and military and Lake Charles municipal fire and police units set up roadblocks around the base. The roadblocks were removed when the fire was brought under control.

Some Lame Duck Senators Eating Crow, Not Turkey

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Some "lame duck" senators were eating crow instead of turkey this Thanksgiving. But not Sen. George W. Malone.

Seated among his saddles, lassos and six-shooters, the barrel-chested, strong-voiced Nevada Republican was as buoyant as ever as he discussed his departure from the Senate with a holiday eve caller.

This might indicate there is some compensation in being beaten at the polls, as Malone was by Democrat Howard W. Cannon three weeks ago.

Some of his detractors have gleefully pointed out the defeat relieves Malone of the burden of making 12-hour speeches against the foreign aid bills each year.

But Malone was not subdued by the loss of his Senate forum. He still got in a few anti-aid licks while talking over plans to return to Nevada and his first love — engineering.

Of all the senators defeated or retiring this year, Malone has probably the biggest packing job. "I brought back something from every country I visited," he said, "and I've visited every country in the world."

What he brought back most of was saddles. One end of his office is banked with enough riding equipment to take care of the logistics for a small cavalry charge.

Malone credits the Hoover Dam and the gambling law with bringing prosperity to Nevada. He had a hand in both projects and thus

Two other collisions occurred in the tunnel after the fatal crash, but no one was seriously injured.

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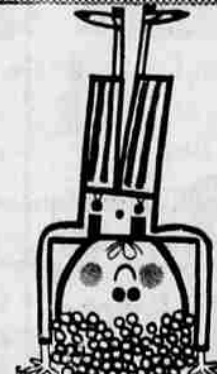
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
