

Congress Warned By Demo To Beware Of Pressures

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Otto E. Passman (D-La.) told new members of Congress today to look out for heavy pressure from supporters of what he called "fantastic amounts" for foreign aid.

Backers of the overseas assistance program were talking, meanwhile, in terms of a billion-dollar increase in aid funds. They contended a vigorous foreign aid program is particularly important at this time to offset the expanding Soviet program of help to underdeveloped nations.

Passman is chairman of the House Appropriations subcommittee on foreign aid, and has opposed much of the assistance program. In recent years his subcommittee has made sharp cuts in President Eisenhower's money requests, but Congress has refused to go along with the full cuts.

He sent letters to all new members of the 86th Congress saying they probably will find that "the propaganda for fantastic amounts for foreign aid may equal all the pressures you will be subjected to on all other issues combined."

Passman's letter was prepared before administration officials reported informally on their plans for next year's program.

The tentative plans call for between \$4,200,000,000 and \$4,300,000,000 of new foreign aid funds for the year starting next July 1. Congress this year appropriated \$3,300,000,000 after cutting 600 million from the amount Eisenhower requested.

The new program puts more emphasis on economic aid, and somewhat less on military assistance.

Passman told the new congressmen that when the foreign aid program was begun in 1948 it was to have been completed in five years at a cost not to exceed 15 billion dollars. But now, he said, the program is 11 years old "and becoming more uncontrollable each year." He estimated the cost to date at 82 billion dollars.

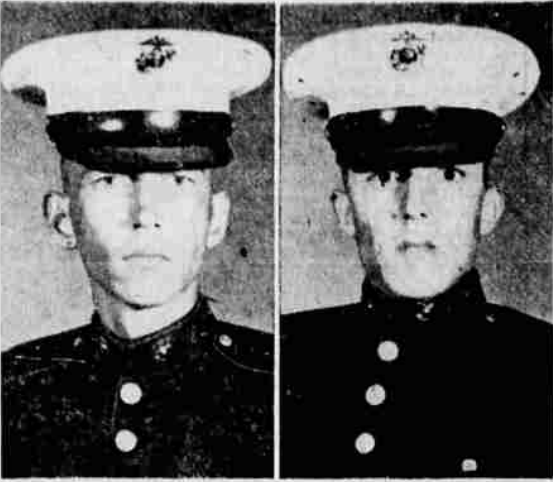

CAMPTON, Ky. (AP)—The Tabor love children. All children.

After raising six of their own and 16 others for working couples, Mr. and Mrs. Otis Tabor, now in their 70s, are still at it.

Their latest undertaking is 74 adopted youngsters at a children's home near this little eastern Kentucky town.

The couple spent Thanksgiving Day with them after making their first trip together in 53 years of marriage.

Kentucky Gov. A. B. Chandler made possible the trip to the Bethany Children's Home from their Belleville, Mich., home.

Chandler read about the couple taking an interest in the children and sent them round-trip tickets. When they got to the home, they were greeted by a big sign reading: "Welcome Grandma and Grandpa Tabor." There were shy smiles on small faces, hugs, and a tear or two.

While Mrs. Tabor read to some of the youngsters, Grandpa, a 75-year-old retired carpenter, put on overalls and went to the dairy barn to see if he could help out.

Mrs. Tabor said they learned about the home from a daughter and "decided to adopt the youngsters."

"I just plain wanted something to do. All my youngsters were grown and gone."

The couple has sent the home food they canned and clothing they made for four years. In return they joined in a big turkey dinner.

They plan to stay with the youngsters until Dec. 5.

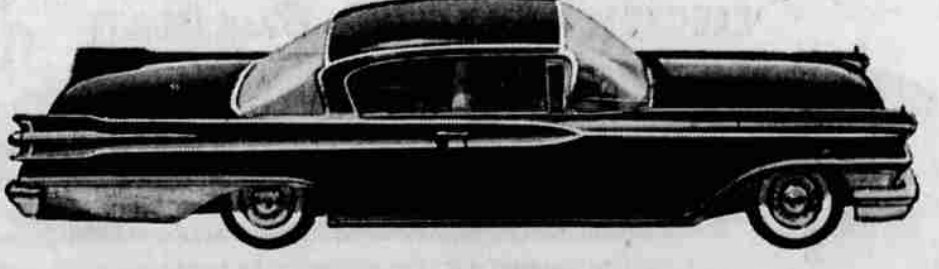
