

Judge Honors Paper's Plea

RED BLUFF (UPI)—A Superior Court judge has ordered a hearing next Monday in an attempt to settle a dispute between the local newspaper, the Corning Daily Observer, and the Tehama County Board of Supervisors.

Judge Charles E. Wetter issued the order Friday on request of the newspaper, which quoted from the minutes of the supervisors' Monday meeting in which it said Board Chairman Al Pryor threatened to bar the Observer's reporter from future meetings.

Pryor was quoted as saying, "I want this officially entered in the minutes. . . . We can and we will keep this newspaper or anyone else from impeding legislative action by the Board of Supervisors."

Pryor was fired by a story in the newspaper on the passage of a county ordinance creating the office of county clerk.

"This story is clouded, colored and slanted," Pryor was quoted as saying. "If it occurs again, I am going to ask the board to bar the present representative of the Corning Observer."

Copies of the order to appear at the hearing were to be served on all five members of the County Board. At the hearing, the board will be asked to show cause why they should bar the reporter from their meetings.

\$25,000 Fire Razes Church

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—A two-alarm fire destroyed the organ at Good Samaritan Episcopal Church here Friday night and caused an estimated \$25,000 damage.

Investigators said the blaze apparently broke out in the organ loft and spread to the altar area and the roof. The cause was not immediately determined.

The organ, valued at \$12,000, was damaged beyond repair. Firemen had to chop holes in the roof and smash out a number of windows because of heavy smoke, and most of the interior was damaged by fire, smoke or water.

The church is located at 23th and Potrero streets.

2,000 Expected For Bridge Play

DETROIT (UPI)—Charles Goren headed the list of players Saturday for the annual Fall National Championship tournament of the American Contract Bridge League.

About 2,000 players were expected for the tournament which runs through Dec. 7.

Goren, 57, is the world's top bridge player. He has won a record number of 31 national championships and has been the No. 1 ranking master for the last 15 years.

For the first time, the tournament will include the two major individual events, the life masters individual and the senior and advanced senior master individual. Each player has 52 different sets of opponents in the events.

Pilot Ducks To Avoid Jet

EL PASO, Tex. (UPI)—A charter pilot reported Friday night that he was forced to throw his plane carrying 24 high school football players into a sharp 1,000-foot dive to avoid a collision with a T-33 jet trainer.

The pilot, Charles L. Kugeler, said the near-collision occurred Friday on a flight from Abilene, Tex., to El Paso. In his DC3 were the football players and their coaches, on their way to Yuletta, Tex., for a game.

Kugeler said in a report to the Civil Aeronautics Administration that in order to miss the oncoming jet he put his ship into a violent roll and dive, but still missed the jet by only about 25 feet.

Five players and line coach Wally Bullington suffered head bumps when they were tossed into the aisle by the sudden dive. "We had a pretty good spill," Bullington said.

Arrest 'Relieves' Navy Deserter

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—"I just lived in an outer world by myself," said Carlton Vance (Jiggs) Mings, describing his life since deserting the Navy during World War II.

The 37-year-old Yuba City, Calif., ranch hand—who before his desertion at Vallejo in 1945 had seen action in the Aleutians, at two Jima and Tarawa—technically could receive the death penalty. During his long absence without leave, Mings fathered three children. After his arrest he married the mother of his children in the brig at Treasure Island.

SENTENCES SUSPENDED

CHARLESTON, S.C. (UPI)—Magistrate W. D. Dickey gave suspended sentences Friday to 13 teen-agers arrested after a gang fight Tuesday night which sent two youths to a hospital with stab wounds. Officers said about 75 white youths took part in the brawl but only 13 were arrested.

Lincoln, Lee Names Picked For Submarines

PORTSMOUTH, N.H. (AP)—Th illustrious names of Abraham Lincoln and Robert E. Lee have been assigned to two nuclear powered ballistic missile submarines now under construction, the Navy said Saturday.

One 100-million-dollar submarine is being built at the Portsmouth Shipyard and will be named Abraham Lincoln. It is expected to be launched in the spring of 1960.

A sister ship being constructed at the Newport News Shipbuilding and Drydock Co. will be called Robert E. Lee.

ERRANT DISCHARGE

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho (AP)—The discharge of some radioactive material at the national reactor testing station near here has caused a brief shutdown of one reactor being used in the program to design a nuclear aircraft engine.

The Atomic Energy Commission said the accidental release of the radioactive material Nov. 18 was confined to about 1,500 acres of the 431,000-acre testing station. An AEC spokesman said no employees were exposed and the short-lived radioactive particles posed no danger to the public. He said the reactor's instrumentation deviated at low power and caused the mishap.
