

Pros Hold Draft Today

Duncan Packer Selection

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The Green Bay Packers made Iowa's quarterback, Randy Duncan, the No. 1 choice in the annual National Football League's player draft today.

Packers Coach Ray McLean claimed the pinpoint passing Duncan, prize quarterback of the Big Ten, immediately after NFL Commissioner Bert Bell opened the draft meeting.

The 12 NFL teams met to select the first four rounds of their annual 30-round player draft. In all, 48 players were to be selected from the 1958 college player grab bag.

The rest of the draft was scheduled for the league's winter meeting next month.

Green Bay had first choice under the draft rules which provide that the teams pick from last to first as shown in the standings the day before the meeting. Green Bay currently is last in the league.

The Packers, badly in need of a good passing quarterback, felt they got him in the 21-year-old Duncan. In the past three years he has passed Big Ten opposition dizzily.

The 6-foot, 180-pounder key man on the Rose Bowl-bound Iowa team, led the Big Ten in total offense with 1,705 yards in nine games. He completed 101 of 172 passes for 1,347 yards, 11 touchdowns and an excellent 58.7 completion percentage.

Second choice was made by the Los Angeles Rams who took the nation's total offense leader, halfback Dick Bass of the College of the Pacific. The Rams get Bass with a choice obtained from the Philadelphia Eagles in last winter's deal which sent quarterback Norm Van Brocklin to Philadelphia.

The Chicago Cardinals, third in line, grabbed Bill Stacy of Mississippi State; Washington selected Don Allard, Boston College quarterback; San Francisco picked Dave Baker, Oklahoma back; and the Detroit Lions took Notre Dame fullback, Nick Pietrosante.

The rest of the first round:

The Chicago Bears took Don Clark, Ohio State back; San Francisco, using a choice obtained from Pittsburgh, selected Dan James, Ohio State center; Los Angeles picked Paul Dickson, Baylor tackle; New York named Lee C. Ross, Utah quarterback; Cleveland grabbed Rich Kretzing, Illinois end; and Baltimore selected Jackie Burkett, Auburn center.

Vale Retains A-2 Grid Title

McMINNVILLE, Ore. (AP)—Vale retained its Oregon Class A-2 high school football championship and its perfect two-season record with a 13-6 victory over Willamina here Saturday night.

The teams entered the game with 11-0 marks for the season, but it did not take Vale long to display superior power.

Dick Fulwyler, a crumpling fullback who did all of Vale's scoring, completed a 48-yard, eleven-play drive by plunging six yards to a touchdown, then bulging across for the conversion.

Bob Nokleby, ace Willamina halfback who defeated Fulwyler for the state prep scoring championship, countered for the losers in the second period. He took a 23-yard pass from Bill McMillan and scampered 30 yards to the Vale end zone. McMillan missed the conversion.

Late in the third period, Vale held Nokleby on fourth down and took over on the Willamina 39.

It took Vale only eleven plays from there to send Fulwyler powering one yard for a touchdown. Vale had 14 first downs and 191 yards to 5 first downs and 152 yards for Willamina.

Fulwyler covered 11 yards on 37 rushing plays. He wound up the season with 265 points.

Nokleby, who was held to 23 yards on eleven carries, finished with 221 points.

Vale, which defeated Seaside for the A-2 title in 1957, now has won 24 consecutive games.

Diamond Meeting Eyes Plan

WASHINGTON (AP)—The major leagues' annual draft and the expected realignment agreement between the American Assn. and the Texas League highlighted the opening of the annual Minor League Convention today.

Another important event was the scheduled meeting of the major league player representatives to plan their campaign to obtain a percentage of television and radio fees for regular season games.

Because of the new rule requiring a big league club to shell out \$25,000 for a selective, little draft activity was expected.

There could be even less than last year when only 11 minor leaguers were purchased, at a cost of \$135,000. Only three of the players selected then—Kansas City's Harry Chitt, Cleveland's Gary Geiger and the Chicago Cubs' Tony Taylor—remained in the big leagues all year.

The biggest need of the majors, besides pitchers, appeared to be second basemen.

This marks the first year that the rule providing for an unrestricted draft of players with four years in organized baseball is in effect. A brand new draft proposal, one that would make all players eligible after only one year of pro ball, is on the agenda.

Perhaps more eagerly awaited than the player draft was the announcement of a deal that would transfer the franchises of the Double A Texas League's Houston, Dallas and Fort Worth clubs to the Triple A American Assn.

The two leagues, after weeks of negotiation, finally reached a point where only a matter of \$35,000 stood between them.

The AA, anxious to stabilize its circuit which now constitutes only seven clubs, offered to pay \$30,000 indemnity to the Texas League for its three top clubs. The Texas League countered with a request for \$85,000 after originally demanding \$120,000. The two leagues were scheduled to meet again today to settle the difference.

A provision of the agreement was that the Texas League, which expected to turn to the western league for its replacements, would be guaranteed major league working agreements.

Although no mention was made regarding the replacements, it was reported that Amarillo, Albuquerque, and Wichita stood high on the list.

Ducks, Oregon State To Open Maple Play

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Oregon State, a power last year in the Pacific Coast Conference, tonight will meet Oregon in the first basketball game of the season for both teams.

Oregon State last season ended with a 12-4 conference record, good enough for a co-championship with California. Oregon, far out of the running, ended in seventh at 6-10.

Things may be a little different this year for Oregon State.

The Beavers were paced to a 20-6 season record last year by 6-7 Dave Gambee, the squad's leading scorer. He was lost by graduation.

Oregon also lost heavily at graduation. Gone are Charlie Franklin and Hal Duffy, the squad's top scorers.

Oregon State coach Stas Gill said the Beavers this season will rely heavily on a sophomore, 6-9 Karl Anderson.

With him on the first team tonight will be 6-8 Gary Goble, 6-2 Ted Miller and two speedy backcourt men, Lee Harman and Jimmy Anderson.

Oregon Coach Steve Belko said he also will have some tall men in the starting lineup—though none are as big as OSC's Anderson and Goble.

Dale Herron, Denny Strickland and Stu Robertson all are 6-5, and all will open tonight's game for the Ducks.

Oregon's slickest ball-handlers, Bud Kaykendall and Chuck Rask, will line up at the guard positions.

A newcomer to the Oregon varsity, which had a season record of 13-11 last year, will be Butch Kimpton of Klamath Falls. Belko said that Kimpton, a member of the Fresh last season, probably will alternate with either Rask or Kaykendall.

Tonight's contest will be a non-conference game.

Oregon will swing back into action Friday and Saturday at Eugene against Brigham Young. Oregon State will travel to play Utah those nights.

Oregon will open its conference season against Southern California Jan. 2 at Eugene. OSC's PC opponent will be against Southern California Jan. 3 at Corvallis.

College basketball opens with a bang tonight.

Kentucky, the NCAA champion, and West Virginia, ranked No. 1 in the final Associated Press poll last season, take the floor to top the action.

Kentucky entertains Florida State while West Virginia is on the road at Furman.

Other games (ind Cincinnati) and its famed Oscar Robertson pitted against Indiana State, Indiana's defending Big Ten champs against Drake, Pitt at Michigan, Penn State at North Carolina State, Gettysburg at Temple, Rice at Kansas, Colorado at Iowa, Purdue at Kansas State and Western Michigan at Northwestern.

By Saturday night, virtually all major teams will be in action.

The Kent State (Ohio) and Idaho State invitational tournaments start Friday.

Tennessee meets Michigan and Kent State battles Wyoming in the first round of the Kent State tourney. It's Utah State vs. Idaho State and Portland vs. Montana in the first of the Idaho State each tourney battle for the championship Saturday night.

Robertson, who will appear in New York's Madison Square Garden Thursday against St. John's, is expected to dominate the headlines during the season along with Pat's little Don Hennon.

Kentucky, the surprise of last season, is expected to get stiff opposition for the Southeastern Conference title this year from Mississippi State and Auburn. Northwestern and Purdue are the early favorites in the Big Ten while Texas A&M, Texas Christian and Texas Tech are donep to battle it out for the Southwest Conference title.

Dartmouth is rated high in the Ivy League and Kansas State is rated the choice in the Big Eight. Cincinnati, of course, is favored in the Missouri Valley, with the Atlantic Coast Conference race between Duke, Maryland, North Carolina and N. C. State. West Virginia, as usual, is expected to retain its Southern Conference crown.

LSU, Cal, Syracuse Want Bowl Victories

Bowl-bound college football teams began pointing toward postseason games today.

Bill one couldn't blame Louisiana State, California and Syracuse for showing more determination than the others.

LSU, the nation's only major undefeated and untied team, will make its fifth appearance in the Sugar Bowl. The Bayou Tigers have yet to win a bowl game. This will be their sixth bowl trip (fifth to the New Orleans classic, Cleuson, LSU's opponent, will be playing in the Sugar Bowl for the first time, but has a 3-2 record in other bowl competition).

California is 2-4 in the Rose Bowl. Iowa, the Bears' New Year's Day foe, has a 35-19 victory over Oregon State in 1957 to show for its only outing in Pasadena.

Both teams have 9-0 records, with the Oklahomaans running their two-year victory string to 18 straight.

Army, which crowns on postseason competition, put away its first unbeaten season since 1949 by licking Navy 22-6. The Cadets, with only an Oct. 25 tie with Pittsburgh to mar their record, finished strong against the Mid-dies. Bob Anderson scored twice for Army.

Auburn, second to LSU in the current Associated Press rankings but banned from bowl play, nipped Alabama 14-8; Southern Methodist beat Texas Christian 20-13; Oklahoma defeated Oklahoma State 7-0; and Notre Dame came from behind to beat Southern California 20-13.

Only two games remain on the regular season schedule. Boston College meets Holy Cross and Oregon engages Miami this Saturday.

Rosenbluth Aids Warriors

Lennie Rosenbluth, the lanky former All-America scoring whiz from North Carolina, has been a mere benchwarmer with the Philadelphia Warriors of the National Basketball Assn.

In his first pro season a year ago, he averaged about four points a game. The latest NBA statistics show him with a 3-point average and five minutes played each game.

Sunday, however, Rosenbluth produced when the Warriors needed him. He scored four points in the final 37 seconds and Philadelphia nailed a 103-100 victory over the New York Knickerbockers.

Rosenbluth dropped in a long one-hander and two free throws to enable the Warriors to snap a two-game losing streak. Woody Saundersberry paced the Warriors with 25 points while Richie Guerin led New York with 23.

In another NBA game, Elgin Baylor, an All-America last year at Seattle, paced a fourth quarter drive that carried Minneapolis to an 84-77 triumph over Cincinnati Sunday night.

Baylor tied the score at 68-all with a jump shot and a basket by Boo Ellis sent the Lakers into the lead. Baylor finished with 21 points. Dave Piontek had 22 points for the Royals who have lost 15 of 18 games.

Saturday night, the Lakers beat Syracuse 108-103. In other Saturday games, New York defeated Philadelphia 113-103. St. Louis whipped Cincinnati 98-86 and Boston turned back Detroit 110-96.
