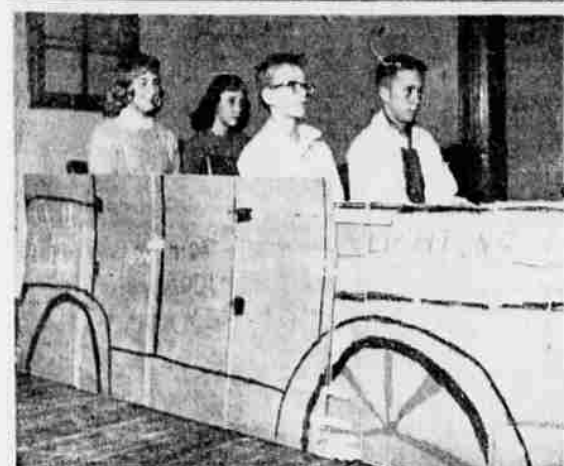

Princeton University Prof Wins Fermi Physics Award

WASHINGTON (UPI)—All but one of those present knew why Eugene P. Wigner was getting the \$50,000 and the solid gold medal.

The exception was Dr. Wigner, a slightly built, friendly little man whose expressive eyes alternately registered mystification and joy.

If you pinned Wigner down, he'd probably tell you he was picked to receive this year's Enrico Fermi physics award solely because the pickers are good and kind.

The truth is that this little man, born in Budapest, Hungary, 56 years ago, was chosen because he is one of the world's greatest physicists, because he contributed immeasurably to the success of the U.S. atomic project in World War II, and because his ideas underlie the great premise of atoms for peace.

Wigner, professor of physics at Princeton University, received the Fermi award Tuesday in ceremonies at the Atomic Energy Commission Headquarters, Germantown, Md. Among the hundreds present were other great atomic scientists, a representative of the President, scores of high government officials and, happier almost than her husband, Mrs. Wigner.

The award was named after the brilliant Italian-born physicist who presided 16 years ago in Chicago at the birth of the first atomic chain reaction brought about by man. Fermi died four years ago.

Among his wartime co-workers had been Eugene Wigner whose calculations made possible the great plutonium production plant at Hanford, Wash., and the growing family of power and propulsion reactors descended from Hanford.

The Fermi award is conferred annually by the Atomic Energy Commission on the recommendation of its general advisory committee and with the approval of the President.

The schedule follows: 9:30 - 10 a.m., registration coffee hour, getting acquainted period; 10 a.m. to 12 noon, disaster policies of the American National Red Cross, (a) basis of responsibility, (b) general policies, (c) medical-nursing policies.

Committee structure, (a) disaster committee, (b) medical-nursing committee; specific roles, (a) physician chairman, (b) nurse chairman, (c) nurse enrollment chairman.

The meeting will recess from 12 noon to 1 p.m. The 1 to 2 p.m. period will be devoted to shelter display and role of shelter nurses; 2 to 4 p.m., group participation in solving specific disaster problems and evaluation.
