Timely Tip For Santa's Helpers

NEW YORK (UPI) — You can help agencies that collect used toys for underprivileged and hospitalized children at Christmas by first cleaning and reconditioning your donations, says the Baking Powder Institute.

Turn the cleaning assignment over to the youngest member of the family, the institute suggested. Give him a basin of water, a sponge and a box of baking soda. A soda solution will clean all types of toy material, including rubber, plastic and wood, and it won't roughen small hands or upset stomachs if curiosity leads to tasting. Older children can help by mending doll clothes and clothing together toys that have become unstuck. Junior artists of 12 years and up may be assigned to the painting detail. With small jars of enamel, a brush and a paper plate palette, they can mix their own colors for touching up chipped spots.

Besides being a fine record of how the house and artist looked in '58, a snapshot tucked into Christmas thank-you notes can be a post-Christmas treat for dear friends or family.

Bright with red, green and white and not too difficult to make are a Santa-sit-by-the-fire and holiday greetings spelled out in lollipops over a fireplace or doorway. Basic ingredients are 14 lollipops, a grocery carton, gift wrapping paper or colored shelf paper, cellulose and plastic tape.

Merry Christmas lollipops are made by covering the 14 candy suckers with clear cellulose.

Use red plastic tape, cut in 1/2-inch strips, to form one letter on the front of each lollipop. Spell out the greeting.

Take the suckers about two inches apart to a length of red ribbon and tape or thumbtack into position.

A jolly Santa that serves as decoration, a container for gifts before Christmas and a collection depot for gift wrappings on the big day, owes his origin to a tall, slim carton, about 24 x 10 inches.

Take or paste a piece of pink paper about eight inches wide around the top part of the box for the face.

Give him blue star eyes, a Christmas tree half nose and a fluffy beard made from cotton or white sashie ribbon bows.

The body is red paper taped or pasted around the box and marked with a black plastic or paper belt. A cone-shaped, red paper hat about 12 inches tall trimmed with cotton or ribbon bows caps the figure.

If there's a camera fan in the house, he will be equipped with all kinds of film, bulbs, cameras and directions.

For your own peace of mind, and I speak from experience, I'd suggest you quietly take your own pictures with a simple, box-type camera; the newer ones can literally be aimed and shot.

All you need to remember is to coordinate the bulbs with the film type (color or black and white) and to check the recommended working distance from subject to lens.

Correct Gloves Wardrobe Must

The reason that some women are able to make gloves a point of elegance in a costume is that they are careful both about selecting them and wearing them.

It isn't enough to tell a saleslady your glove size. Always try them on before you buy. French glove makers advise. They should fit snugly with no room left at the fingertips. The gauntlet part should fit the arm as well.

Rows of stitching will give your hands an illusion of slenderness if they tend to be wide. And if you do not consider that you have a pretty wrist, don't wear a shorty glove. A glove that covers the wrist is your best bet.

A basic glove wardrobe should include shorties, elbow-length gloves and the longer evening lengths in white, black and pale beige. To these you can add the pastel and vibrant colors for wear with particular costumes.

For the most part, keep decorated gloves for evening wear. The classic white kid glove with beavals embroidery or seed pearl trim is lovely. But highly trimmed gloves look out of place in the daytime.

The tentative date for installation of these officers is set for December 29.

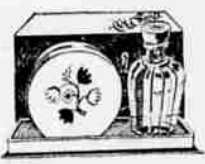

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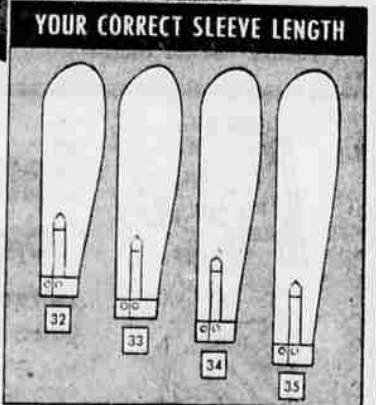
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
