Districts Hold Joint Meeting

SILVER LAKE — In a joint meeting of patrons of the Fort Rock and Silver Lake school districts here last week Mrs. Maurice Ward, Lake County reorganization committee member, outlined the committee's progress.

Most popular throughout the county in meetings with school boards was a proposal for three administrative units for Lake County, she stated. This provides for divisions as follows: Lakeview and south, Paisley and Summer Lake area and Fort Rock-Silver Lake.

Since the reorganization law states that each district should encompass 12 years of education the North Lake County group hopes that with this division, if approved by the state board, they can continue to send their high school youth to school other than in Lake County in cases where family or close friends will provide a home as is the present situation.

The chief objection to a plan placing all of Lake County in one unit was that the entire county would have only a seven man board and many felt opposed to the small representation districts would have. The three unit plan will be submitted by the reorganization committee if approved by those attending several area meetings now in progress. The group meeting here gave assent to this plan.

In addition to Mrs. Ward of Fort Rock who presided, committee members at the meeting were Jess Pennington, Summer Lake and alternates Frank Pitcher, Silver Lake, and H. C. Harris, Summer Lake. Mrs. Anne Sprague, county superintendent of schools and committee secretary, assisted with the meeting.

Murder Trial Jury Selected

TILLAMOOK (AP)—A jury of five men and seven women was picked Tuesday for the second degree murder trial of 21-year-old Lelani Batke of Tillamook. She is charged with killing a newborn child.

Circuit Judge Jack Bohanan said the jury will be locked up throughout the trial.

The prosecution charged Miss Batke gave birth to the boy, then stabbed him twice shortly afterward.

Trend Toward Wider Cars Leads To Brake Changes

DETROIT (AP)—Several automakers have reduced horsepower ratings in 1959 model cars; practically all the new models are lower; a few are longer and several are wider than last year's models.

These are highlights of an exhaustive report on 1959 car engineering developments in the December issue of the Society of Automotive Engineers Journal.

The report says the trend toward wider cars already has led to significant changes in suspensions and brakes. It may also go a long way toward a solution to the problem of improved underhood ventilation and engine accessibility.

Other findings include: More than a dozen of today's accessories are pushbutton actuated; four out of five new cars have automatic transmissions; more than 40 per cent have power steering; about one-third have power brakes; a large percentage have dual exhausts and air conditioning is climbing rapidly as an accessory.

The report says changes in frame construction had to be made to accommodate today's lower cars. It details engineering changes in virtually every American-made automobile.

Of car engines the study says many power plants have been tailored to bring peak performance

within the normal driving range. It adds: "Reduced compression ratios permit the use of lower priced standard fuel. Refinements for 1959 include improved carburetion, reduced noise level, weight reduction and greater economy."
