Sputnik III To Fall Today

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—The Püllman-car-sized rocket of Sputnik III was expected to burn up and fall to the earth today. Scientists at Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory indications were it would fall somewhere between central Europe and the Middle East. The rocket has been orbiting since it fired Sputnik III into orbit last May 15. Sputnik itself is expected to continue circling the globe for another year because its more compact shape offers less atmospheric drag. Smithsonian scientists said probably very little would remain of the carrier rocket as it hit the earth since it would burn up through friction on entering the earth's atmosphere.

Star Battles Superstition

MADRID (UPI)—Yul Brynner stepped into the costume of the late Tyrone Power today and went out to fight a movie battle against the armies of Egypt and a real-life battle against the forces of superstition. The brawny film star, his bald head capped with a luxuriant wig, was certain to win the first fight as well as the second as he well and bring to a triumphant conclusion the Biblical epic for which Power gave his life.

Today was Brynner's first appearance on the set of "Solomon and Sheba" outside of a brief visit Monday to chat with co-star Gina Lollobrigida. By chance then he walked by the spot where Power fell dying of a heart attack after a duelling scene 17 days ago. "I am very cognizant of the superstitions involved," he said. "I will do my best to dispel them."

In five furious days packed with behind-the-scenes drama, the dynamic star has come a long way toward convincing extras and technicians that the film, 70 per cent completed when Power died, bears no hard-luck taint.

LA To Bid For Demos

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A formal bid to the Democratic party to hold its 1960 convention in Los Angeles will be made in Washington this weekend. Representatives of the city are flying to Washington today to present their case to the party's Convention Site Committee. The Democratic National Committee is expected to make a decision Saturday.

LONDON (AP)—"No hard drinking during the ceremony" was the order Tuesday when Queen Mother Elizabeth opened a new bungalow colony for retired barkeeps. A ribbon was cut and the Queen Mother strolled round the pleasant rows of little homes. Not a bottle in sight. Under a marquee she sipped tea with a jolly vintage of old pint pullers, each with more than 20 years' service at the bar, and their wives. Only occasionally did some of the men's eyes stray to a silk curtain directly behind the Queen Mother's chair.

Thieves Steal Actress' Car

ROME (UPI)—Two bandits stole Anita Ekberg's sleek Mercedes sports car and then used it to stage a holdup, police reported Tuesday night. They said the men took the car from in front of Miss Ekberg's home on the Aventine Hill and headed toward Maccarese on the Mediterranean coast, 20 miles west of Rome. There they robbed a gasoline station and last were seen heading back toward Rome.

Woman's Body Discovered In Mountains By Police

THE DALLES, Ore. (AP)—Police Tuesday found the frozen body of a woman who went into the mountains to fast with her husband and young daughter. In a cold, crudely-built shelter, two state policemen found the body of Charlotte Elmore Durbin, 45, of Yakima, Wash. With her in the clearing high in the chill Mt. Hood National Forest were her husband, Dudley H. Durbin, 45, and their daughter, Polly Jean, 17. The teen-ager was rushed to a hospital here. She was suffering from malnutrition, attendants said.

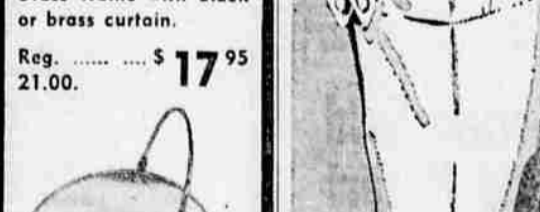
Durbin was lodged in the county jail without formal charge. He also looked emaciated, and was placed under a doctor's care. The tall, skinny Durbin wolfed down soup in the jail and told reporters that the family had been in the mountains fasting since Oct. 1. When asked why he had gone up on the mountain, Durbin told reporters:

"The Lord told me to go." Then he added: "The Lord took everything away. Now I have nothing left but my life. I'm ready to give that away any time." Durbin said he was a prosperous handyman and carpenter in Yakima until two years ago, when he began having visions. His wife had them, too, Durbin said, and earlier this year had gone on fasts of nine and four weeks.

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Nine Passengers Injured As Bus Smacks Power Pole

AURORA, Ore. (AP)—A Greyhound bus Tuesday night veered off a highway near here, climbed up an embankment and then hit a power pole. Nine of the 21 passengers were hospitalized. The others all complained of being shaken up. The driver of the bus was Robert L. Barnett, about 50, of Eugene. He was not hurt. When police asked Barnett about the cause of the accident, he replied: "I can't explain it. I might have been blinded by the light. I've been on the route almost 30 years." State police said the bus failed to negotiate a curve, and shot off the road. Eleven feet from the pavement, it hit the 5-foot-high embankment, and climbed to its top. After striking the power pole atop the sloping bank, the bus came to a stop. No power lines were knocked down. The door of the bus was readily opened, but state police said the vehicle's awkward, tilted position made it difficult to remove the injured.

The accident occurred on Highway 99E near this Western Oregon town. The bus was en route from California to Portland. The injured all were taken to Oregon City hospitals, where attendants said none of the injuries appeared to be serious. Hours after the accident, the bus still was hooked upon the embankment. State police released this list of those hospitalized: Howard Ellis, 21, Portland, bruises. Mrs. Blanche Thompson, 55, West Linn, Ore., bruises. Mrs. Vivian Hawley, 67, Portland, chest injuries. 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New Position As Producer Termed Exciting By Negro

By BOB THOMAS HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Henry Scott, who served with distinction as a fighter pilot in World War II, is finding success not only as a movie actor, but as a writer, director and producer in TV. What's unusual about this? Henry is a Negro. He's a handsome, articulate man of 32, once a promising student of the American Theater Wing and the Actor's Studio. But Henry had plenty of lean days before enjoying his present success. He was born in East Over, S.C., and grew up in Jersey City. A bright student, he won a chance to train as a fighter pilot with a pioneering all-Negro squadron that won honors in the Mediterranean. He won the Air Medal with seven battle stars.

Henry had had a taste of dramatics in Jersey City, and he wanted to try his hand at acting when he returned. He was lucky at first, being cast in such stage successes as "Deep Are the Roots," "Anna Lucasta" and "Member of the Wedding." But there were periods when he couldn't find work as an actor. "Then I took other jobs," he said.

New Reactor Is Dedicated

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho (AP)—A new type portable atomic reactor was dedicated at the National Reactor Testing Station Tuesday. Officials promptly put it to practical use, substituting atomic power for the commercial electricity that had lighted the building housing the new reactor. Known as the Argonne Low Power Reactor, the new atomic plant is the first working model of a prototype designed for easy shipment by air to remote areas. Its dedication marked the 16th anniversary of the world's first controlled nuclear chain reaction, which occurred Dec. 2, 1942, at the University of Chicago Stadium.

Chief Asked To Aid Scribe

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)—President Eisenhower has been asked to write a happy ending to the life story of author O. Henry, who served a prison term for embezzlement. The Texas Heritage Foundation appealed to the President Tuesday to grant a full pardon for the famed short story writer. O. Henry, whose real name was William Sydney Porter, served a five-year sentence after being convicted 60 years ago of embezzling \$834.08 from an Austin bank. He died in 1910 at the age of 48. Paul Wakefield, foundation president, said in a telegram to Eisenhower: "While he stands convicted under the records of federal court 60 years ago, there exists today abundant proof of his innocence and of his conviction purely on circumstantial evidence." The author's widow, Mrs. Sara Coleman Porter, lives at Weaver-ville, N.C.

Police Probe Bomb On Bus

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Police investigated today what looked like a small, homemade grenade found on a school bus. Homicide Capt. W. R. Waycott said the tube was about an inch and a half long and as big around as half a dollar, and held buckshot, wadded notebook paper and an unidentified sticky substance. The bus took about 85 white children to school Tuesday morning. A cleaning man found the device at midday. Waycott said one end of the tube appeared charred and indicated an effort to explode it. Houston's public schools are segregated. There was no indication this had anything to do with the gadget, police said.

LEG BROKEN

MOUNT SHASTA — A Mount Shasta hardware dealer, Eldon Ramshaw, suffered a broken leg Sunday, November 30, while waterfowl hunting at Sheepy Lake. The young man was swinging for a shot at passing geese when he lost his balance and fell from a box on which he was standing. His right leg was broken in three places, with a section of bone being badly splintered. Ramshaw and his hunting companion, Russell Laddon, are each experts in first aid treatment. The injured man was transported to his car by use of a sled, and taken to the Mount Shasta Community Hospital.
