

Showdown Battle On In Diamond Meet

WASHINGTON (AP)—A battle between the haves and have-nots over baseball's bonus and draft practices built up to its first showdown at the major-minor league meetings today.

The minors scheduled a vote on three proposals designed in different fashion to reduce what Commissioner Ford Frick has described as crazy handouts of thousands of dollars in bonuses to young players.

Major league clubs will act later this week.

The clubs that have—those with well-stocked treasuries and farm systems—want to limit the draft. The clubs that haven't want more of a chance to pick up prom-

Pension Foes Set To Fight

WASHINGTON (AP)—Baseball magnates today formed an angry, united front against the major league players' bid for a cut of the owners' income and minor leaguers' demands for a pension plan.

The big league players, already balked by a pension plan supported by World Series radio and television money, jolted their employers Tuesday with a salary proposal calling for 20 per cent of each club's gross revenue.

At the same time, International League executives were shocked by the threat of a strike by their players after the officials' refusal to buckle to an ultimatum by the athletes' lawyer.

"You will accept the pension plan or you will not have International League baseball," Atty. James Durante was reported as saying.

"The International League directors are fully sympathetic to the players' request," said Frank Horton, president of the Rochester club, who reported Durante's words.

But Horton added the directors "could find no way, within the economic framework of the league to raise the more than a quarter of a million dollars to underwrite a pension plan."

Durante had informed the International League the players had resolved not to sign 1959 contracts nor to report to spring training until the pension plan, as outlined by Durante, would cost \$200,000 annually. The blueprint called for the players to pay \$37,000 (\$1.30 a day per player) with the league putting up the remaining \$256,000, or \$32,000 per club.

Major league magnates were reeling over what they called "unthinkable and unreasonable demands" by the players.

At least one owner, Tom Yawkey of the Boston Red Sox, hinted he might pull out of baseball if the players continued to press for what he termed exorbitant demands.

Earlier, the players changed tactics when their attorney J. Norman Lewis and their 16 team representatives withdrew their original request for 25 per cent of the regular season radio and television receipts of the two leagues.

The players then shot back with their 20 per cent of gross receipts plan.

Henley Squad Trims Jayvees

The Henley Hornets successfully warded off a fourth quarter surge to hand the Klamath Union Jayvees a 36-48 beating on Pelican Court Tuesday night as the two teams raised the curtain on the local 1958-59 basketball season.

After an on-again, off-again style of play on the parts of both clubs for the major portion of the first half the Hornets, sparked by high-pointers Phil Swisher and Burrell Gober, moved out to a 27-16 lead at the halfway point. The first period ended 12-9 in favor of Henley.

During the third stanza the squads battled to a scoring stand-off, the period closing on a 40-29 count for Henley.

In the last frame the young Pels slapped a full court press on the Hornets, a move that seemed to unnerve the Henleyites to the point that they hit a virtual standstill long enough to allow the Jayvees to move to within three points, 47-44, with three minutes remaining. Here the melee thickened as numerous fouls were charged against each team. Successful free throws by Gober and Floyd Kendall led the affair for the Hornets. In the closing seconds, J.V. high-scorer Paul Bishop, who had sparked the KU rally during the last stanza, jumped a long one from mid-court at the final gun.

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Brown Stopped; Still Tops

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The defenses caught up with Cleveland's Jimmy Brown.

The powerful back gained only 12 yards last Sunday, his lowest output in the two seasons he's been in the National Football League.

But the brilliant Brown still leads in the ground gaining division with a record 1,241 yards, 95 better than the previous record set by Steve Van Buren.

He also didn't score in Cleveland's victory over Washington, but he still leads the individual scoring with 102 points. Lenny Moore, Baltimore, scored once to lead second place with 78 points.

Back in ground gaining, Alan Ameche of Baltimore is way behind Brown in second place with 685 yards, five more than Joe Perry of San Francisco, according to league statistics released today.

Perry, incidentally, has gained 6,471 yards during his pro career, the most for any player in NFL history. Like Brown, his average is 5.9, but Brown has carried the ball 210 times and Perry only 115.

Tom Tracy, ninth last week, jumped to fourth with 611 yards after gaining 156 yards for Pittsburgh Sunday, the best effort of his pro career. Joe Arnett, Los Angeles, dropped to fifth with 589 yards.

One of the more interesting statistics is that between Washington quarterback Eddie LeBaron and Pittsburgh's Bobby Layne. In two weeks Layne has jumped from eighth to second place in the passing department and is only a yard behind LeBaron. LeBaron's average gain is 9.23 yards, Layne's, 8.41.

The Steelers quarterback has attempted 213 passes and completed 104 for 1,792 yards. LeBaron has thrown 128 and completed 72 for 1,181 yards. Each has thrown 10 touchdown passes.

Milt Plum, Cleveland, sixth last week, is behind Layne with an 8.24 average. Then come John Unitas, Baltimore, with 8.18 and Billy Wade, Los Angeles, with 8.13. Wade was second last week.

Wade and Unitas are tied for the most TD passes—15 each. Wade leads in most yards gained with 2,375. Norm Van Brocklin, Philadelphia, has thrown the most passes, 337, and completed the most, 181.

Army placed three men on the squad — guard Bob Novogratz and backs Bob Anderson and Pete Dawkins. This marked the first time that three players from the same team were picked on the squad since Notre Dame turned the trick in 1947 and in 1949, both years when an 11-man team was picked.

The squad was picked by a seven-man selection committee of the Football Writers Association.
