STOCKS WALL STREET NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market closed lower in slackened trading today. Final prices, at around the day's low, were down fractions to about one point. There were some good gainers. Steels, metals, oils, motors and rails declined. Aircrafts, electronics and tobaccos were mixed. Rubber stocks and chemicals tilted higher. Volume for the full session was estimated at 3,200,000 shares compared with 3,300,000 Monday. Goodyear ran up more than four points at one time and held more than three points of this gain late in the day. Goodrich gained more than one point. Radio Corp., which went through the previous 1953 high of 42 1/2 Monday, rose two more points today. Other electronic issues rested after Monday's advances. Among the steels Youngstown was weakest down one point. American Motors, up 1/2, was strong among the motors to gain. Metals lost minor fractions. In oils Standard Oil (New Jersey) declined more than 1/2 point. Martin was down about 1/2 point at times while Douglas led one. General Dynamics made a small gain. U.S. governments firmed.

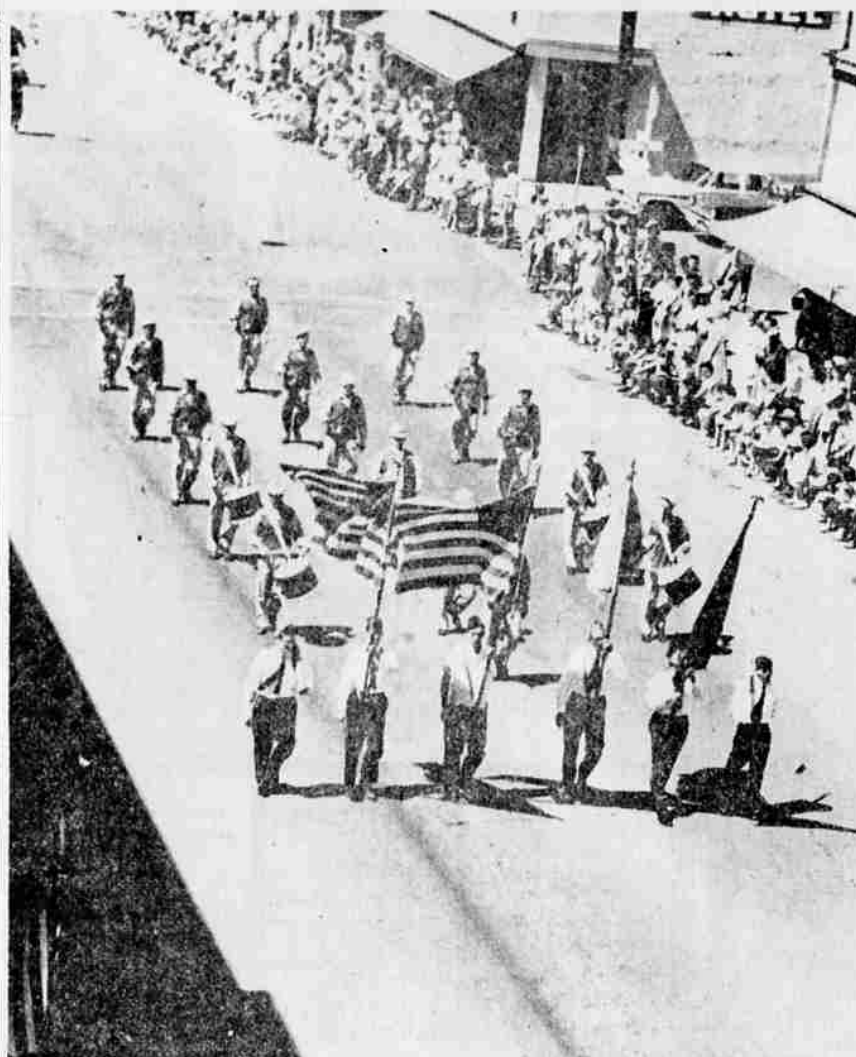
