

Medic Says Debt Paid

TACOMA, Wash. (AP) — Dave Beck's doctor told a federal court jury Tuesday he paid a \$25,500 debt he owed the Teamster leader after he went on the payroll of the Western Conference of Teamsters.

Dr. Alex Grinstein, longtime friend of Beck's, testified he was hired by the conference to set up a health and welfare program for the Teamsters.

When he began drawing his salary in 1950, Dr. Grinstein said he received \$750 monthly. He endorsed these checks, Dr. Grinstein testified, and turned them over to Beck until the debt—run up over a long period of time—was paid in full.

The loan was paid in January, 1953, the doctor said. In August his salary was reduced to \$250 monthly and his employment was terminated in April, 1954, he said. Earlier, Dr. Grinstein testified concerning several profitable business ventures in which he and Beck had engaged. They included real estate transactions and investment in a beer distributing concern.

New Obstacles Hint Clash For State, U.S. Courts

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — New obstacles foreshadowing a possible clash between state and federal courts stood in the path of the Civil Rights Commission today as it sought access to registration records for next week's hearing on Negro voting.

Subpoenas demanding all available voter registration files dating back to Jan. 1, 1955, have been served on officials in at least three south Alabama counties.

The new federal agency's first public hearing since its creation by Congress more than a year ago opens here Monday.

Resistance in one form or another threatened, meanwhile, to keep the contested voter registration files out of the commission's hands unless it gets a federal court order to produce them.

In two of the three counties, a federal judge, if asked to order local officials to surrender the voter records, would find his authority challenged by that of a state court.

All existing registration files in Barbour and Bullock counties, where Negroes outnumber white residents, have been impounded by Circuit Judge George Wallace.

The petitions charged that unqualified voters have been registered in Barbour County by misrepresenting themselves to the Board of Registrars, and that "they tried unsuccessfully to register as voters in Bullock County by the use of fraud."

Acting on the petitions, Wallace impounded the files in Barbour Oct. 29 and in Bullock Nov. 21. He insisted no effort was made to interfere with the federal investigation, but that "we have an investigation pending here (state court) which we think is more important than the civil rights hearing."

Civil rights agents, since their arrival here last weekend, also subpoenaed the files of the Macon County Board of Registrars, which refused last month to surrender them willingly.

The acting welfare director, Carolyn Nixon, does not have the state rating necessary to hold the job permanently. Her temporary appointment ended November 28.

The office became vacant on July 1 with the resignation of Dorothy Hill who had held the post for 22 years. Joseph O'Neil, Westwood, accepted the appointment, but resigned after only three days to return to Westwood where he continued in his former position as Lassen County welfare director.

The Siskiyou County board objected to the directive requiring a permanent appointment because they would "personally" prefer to keep Mrs. Nixon.

The list of eligibles from which the new director must be selected are Leland F. Seid, San Francisco; Wilbur M. Vanover, Jackson; David C. Echols, Madera; David F. Smith, Concord; and Mrs. Dolores W. Doltz, Santa Cruz.

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Welfare Group Advises Board
