

AP Announces All-America

Tackle Nod Goes To Bates

NEW YORK (AP)—Randy Duncan of Iowa, the 1958 No. 1 draft choice of professional football, heads the backfield of The Associated Press All-America team announced today.

Announced today are Pete Dawkins of Army's undefeated team; Billy Cannon of Louisiana State, the national champion; and Bill Austin of Rutgers, who lifted into prominence again the historic school where football was born.

First team ends are James Houston of Ohio State and Buddy Ival of Rice. At tackle are Brock Strom, the key man of the surprising Air Force Academy, and Ted Bates of Oregon State. Zeke Smith of Auburn and George Decker of Vanderbilt are the guards. Bob Harrison of Oklahoma is at center.

The Associated Press All-America is selected on the basis of the recommendations of 12 regional boards composed of newspapermen and newscasters, and takes into account the full season's play through games of Nov. 29.

The second team is composed of Carroll Dale of Virginia Tech and Monte Stickles of Notre Dame at end; Ron Luciano of Syracuse and Don Floyd of Texas Christian at tackle; Jackie Stalcup of Wisconsin and John Guzik of Pitt at guard; Jackie Burkett of Auburn at center; and Don Meredith of Southern Methodist, Dick Bass of the College of the Pacific, Bob Anderson of Army, and Bob White of Ohio State in the backfield.

FIRST TEAM
The strength of the Southeastern Conference is reflected in three first team selections. The East, Midwest, and Southwest each have two, the Rocky Mountain region one and the Far West one.

The backfield is versatile. Duncan, who led the Big Ten in passing with 66 completions in 111 tries for 898 yards and a .595 percentage, is called by his coach, Forrest Evashevski. "By far the best passer I have ever coached," he was drafted by the Green Bay Packers.

Dawkins, who could not win a letter at Army in his sophomore year, developed into the leader of a great team. He is the first captain of cadets, president of his class, and ranks seventh in his class in scholarship. Stricken by polio in the seventh grade, he built himself into an athlete by using weights.

ENGLISH MAJOR
Austin, an English major at Rutgers, made 747 yards on 145 carries, completed 22 of 44 passes for 8 touchdowns and 284 yards, passed for 5 conversions in 6 tries, punted 14 times for an average of 35 yards, and scored 106 points on 16 touchdowns and five conversions.

Cannon, a junior, was the constant threat of LSU's powerful offense. Despite his 200 pounds he has run the 100 in .09.5, and scored 11 touchdowns and 3 conversions for a total of 74 points. He made 668 yards rushing in 115 attempts for a 6-yard average.

Houston, another junior on a team that has eight seniors, is called the greatest end in Ohio State history. Captain elect for 1959, he led his team in playing time with 500.5 minutes out of a possible 540.

Dial, always an excellent receiver, became a standout defensive player at Rice. Over his entire college career he caught 68 passes for 1,205 yards and scored 13 touchdowns.

OUTER SPACE
Strom at tackle is the bulwark of a team that almost literally came from outer space to go through the season undefeated and land in the Cotton Bowl.

Bates of Oregon State, the other tackle, is a 218-pounder described by Coach Tommy Prothro as "extremely quick with great striking power."

Along with Cannon and Houston, Roger Duane (Zeke) Smith is a junior, a 210-pounder at guard who is one of the chief reasons Auburn went through the season with only the blemish of a tie against its record.

George Deiderich of Vanderbilt, the other first team guard, shone even in defeat. He holds the school's high hurdles record and can block as viciously as he tackles.

Oklahoma's center, Bob Harrison, drew only praise from Coach Bud Wilkinson who termed him one of the greatest. He is a farm boy from Stamford, Texas.

Giants Get Sanford In Trade With Phils

WASHINGTON (AP)—The San Francisco Giants, realizing they must strengthen their pitching staff to become a National League pennant factor in 1959, have taken their first step in that direction. Inactive in the first two days of the season, the Giants jumped into the trade mart with both feet Wednesday.

They teamed with Philadelphia to complete a three-player deal involving a pair of pitchers.

The Giants acquired Jack Sanford, hard-throwing right-hander, in exchange for Ruben Gomez, another right-hander, and Valmy Thomas, a catcher.

This was the second player transaction of the day but the only one of importance.

In the other deal, the Phillies sent outfielder Chuck Essegian, former Stanford football star, to the St. Louis Cardinals for shortstop Ruben Amaro.

"Sanford is just the pitcher we wanted," Giants Manager Bill Rigney said.

"Gomez did a fine job for us for several years but as an every fourth day starter Sanford gives us a little more strength. We consider him one of the better pitchers in the league."

Only a year ago, Sanford was perhaps the best right-hander in the league. At least he was voted Rookie of the Year following his 1958 record which included a league-leading 188 strikeouts.

Like so many others, Sanford was hit by the sophomore jinx in 1958. Although at times he appeared as fast as ever, the 29-year-old Wellesley, Mass., hurler slumped to a 10-13 record. His strikeouts dwindled to 106 and his earned run average soared from 3.04 to 4.45.

Gomez wasn't much better. Two years older than Sanford, the Puerto Rican had a 10-12 mark after a splendid first half season, and turned in a lackluster 4.37 ERA.

Although not as famous as his batterymate, Thomas may prove to be more important in Philadelphia's scheme of things. Perhaps the Phils' biggest need is a first-string catcher and Thomas may wrest the No. 1 job from big Stan Lopata.

The Sacred Heart basketball squad, led by coach Jerry Kempf, is preparing away at the maples and backboards in the SHA gym, busily preparing for the County Class B cage season which opens this weekend in a two day jamboree to be held at Chiloquin.

Slated for action Friday night in the first game of a double-header are the Gilchrist Grizzlies and the Bly Bobcats while the Trojans will face the host Chiloquin Panthers in the nightcap.

On Saturday night the winners of the first night's contests will meet in the feature while the losers will pair off in the opener. Game time both nights is 7 o'clock.

County Class B league action begins Tuesday, December 9.

SHA coach Kempf, in his second season as head of the athletic aspirations at the academy, predicts a "break-even 53-59 season." "We'll win some and lose some this year—but, all in all, we should be much better this year than last," stated Kempf as he summoned his squad of 11 varsity players to the court for a full game scrimmage.

"Last year was the first time a lot of these boys had played basketball and the season's experience has proved valuable. We lost three varsity players at graduation but we make up for that by moving up a number of last season's B squad members and they are filling the bill well," Kempf went on.

Topping an 11 man squad are averages 5-10 are six-footers Andre DeBel and Tony Krok. Both will undoubtedly start starting spots on the Trojan lineup. DeBel was a varsity starter last season who gained a lot of respect off the backboards; Krok, blessed with one of the sharpest shooting eyes in the county should prove to be the top scorer through the new season once he overcomes the obvious reluctance to take the shot.

Other regulars scheduled for a lot of action include senior Mike Brumble, 5-11, Tom Amberg, also a senior and 5-11, and junior George Hurley, 5-5.

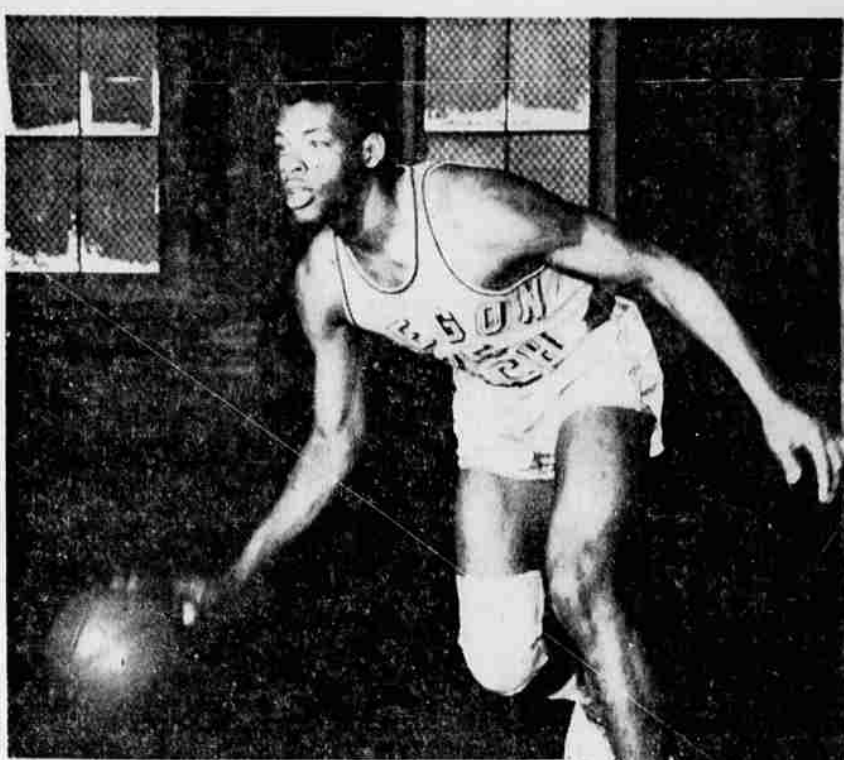
Crowding the five close, are seniors Tom Powell, 5-9, and Larry Jackson, 5-8. Juniors Bill Manning, 5-9, Bob Andersch, 5-10, and Bill Krueger, 5-9, and only sophomore on the Trojan varsity, Bill Wilkinson, 5-10.

Hurley, the club's top scorer, Brumble, Amberg, Powell and Jackson also saw service last year while the remainder of the squad, with the exception of Krueger, worked on the B team. Krueger is a transfer from KUHS.

A working with Coach Kempf and directing the efforts of the Trojan B squad is Hi Hatfield. Hatfield is more widely known for his work on the Klamath Falls baseball scene.

OTI Owls Open Cage Season On Weekend

Coach Wally Palmberg's Oregon Tech Owls open their 1958-59 basketball season here Friday and Saturday nights when they host the tough Humboldt State College Lumberjacks in a two-game, week-end series.

There will be no preliminary games either night, and the varsity clash will start at 8 o'clock.

Palmberg's "rebuilding program" will get its first public showing, as a near-complete changeover in player personnel has been made by the Little High Campus. Only three lettermen from last year's Oregon Collegiate Conference championship club will be on hand this year.

The three returning vets are Charlie Wilson, Dell Francis and Ralph Norgaard. These holdovers will be mixed with several new faces this year in hope of solving a house cleaning job done by last spring's graduation, when Tech lost such standouts as John McCutcheon, Jerry Fasten, Johnny Rhine and Truman Williams.

Six newcomers are figuring strong in Palmberg's plans, along with the holdover lettermen. Paul Layher, Dennis McKeen and Ardel Hamilton seem to be in line for starting spots, although Palmberg said he would not announce a starting unit until later Thursday or early Friday. Layher, a 6-7 transfer from American River JC; McKeen, a 5-11 all-stater from North Salem; and Hamilton, a 6-0 football transfer from Sacramento JC have been looking impressive in practice and are holding the inside lanes for starting jobs.

Others who have been looking good in addition to the lettermen are Charlie Gantner, Don Dick and Leon Wilson. Although Gantner has been in school three years, this is the first time he has played varsity ball. He and Dick, a promising forward from Stockton, Illinois, are battling for a first-
