

'Junior Miss Oregon' To Be Chosen Tonight

Six popular and talented high school senior girls from Oregon communities will take part in the final competition for the "Junior Miss Oregon" title, at a dance at the Klamath Auditorium tonight.

The awards to the winner and two runnersup will be presented at 11 p.m., during the course of a 9 to 1 o'clock dance with music by the Starlighters. The event is sponsored, as in years-past, by the Klamath Junior Chamber of Commerce. Bob Flamme is chairman.

The award is made on the basis of poise, personality, intelligence, charm and beauty of face and figure. The judging begins at a

dinner scheduled for 6:30 at the Willard Hotel, at which judges will have a chance to evaluate the girls' appearance in sports clothes, and will have an opportunity to talk with them.

The girls will appear in formal dress at the dance, and will again be judged on the basis of appearance. They will also display a three-minute routine of some talent—singing, dancing, musicianship, dramatic reading, painting, dress designing, etc., or they may speak for three minutes on the careers they wish to pursue.

Judges for the contest will include "Corky" Carbett of Bend, a director of the State Junior Chamber of Commerce, and Mr. and Mrs. Harold Thurston, Medford. It is also hoped that Ed Bennett, Springfield, Jaycees' state president, will be able to attend to take part in the judging.

The finalists include:

Kathy Heinzman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Heinzman, Ashland, a student at Ashland High School. Kathy, who plans to become a teacher after attending Southern Oregon College or Oregon State College, is sponsored in this contest by the Ashland Jaycees.

Mary Evins, Crescent, is sponsored by the Bend Jaycees. She attends Gilchrist High School where she is cheerleader for the basketball team, and expects to attend business college in Eugene.

Donna Burnett of Crater High School, Central Point, bears the title "Miss Crater High." A resident of Gold Hill, her entry is sponsored by Central Point Jaycees.

Joy Lee Parkinson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Kellert, Kervin, also has a title—"Miss Illinois Valley High"—from the school in

Cave Junction which she attends. Joy, who plans to major in English for secondary teaching at Willamette University, is sponsored by the Grants Pass and Josephine County Jaycees.

Leslie Leake is the candidate of the Reservoir Jaycees. She comes from Chiloquin and attends Chiloquin High School.

Sandra Phelps, the Klamath Jaycees' own candidate, is a senior at Klamath Union High School and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Phelps of this city. Sandra, whose portrait appeared on the front page of yesterday's Herald and News, says that she likes music, drama, reading and dancing. She adds that she "loves to talk," and plans to go to Los Angeles after her graduation to study music and drama part-time while working as a phone operator.

The winner of the Junior Miss Oregon title will receive, in addition to a coronet, an all-expense trip to Mobile, Alabama, where she will compete for the title of Junior Miss America and \$10,000 in college scholarships. This contest will take place in March, 1959. Admission to the dance is \$1.25 for adults, 75 cents for students.

Children Return As Valuable Reds

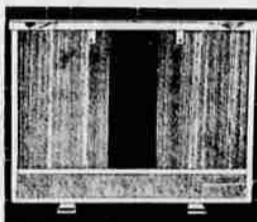
ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Some of the Greek children taken behind the Iron Curtain by the Communists in the postwar revolt are proving first-rate propagandists for their kidnappers.

Only a select 200 of the estimated 27,000 taken away as babies and teen-agers have been allowed to come home. They returned to isolated mountain villages where their parents still live, and were disillusioned by the primitive surroundings.

During 10 years in Communist custody, the youngsters had been given favored treatment. They now are dazzling villagers with the tales of the wonderful places they have seen.
