



Although this past Oregon Tech football season was soiled by a conference championship forfeiture, we are still inclined to think that this was the best football year in the school's history. Especially in the sense of individual standouts.

Two firsts were established this past week. Allen Jones, senior guard, became the first Oregon Tech football player in the school's history to be named to a four-year college all-America football team. He was given an honorable mention spot on the Associated Press Little All-America. In past years, Tech has been represented on Junior College All-America teams, but never before on a four-year nationwide star team.

Second such honor was the naming of defensive end Norman Hooper to the first team Little All-Northwest football team. Hooper's nomination was the first time Oregon Tech has been represented on this team. But this was the first year that Tech has thrown off the junior college classification and played a four-year college schedule all the way.

The honor picked up by Hooper was especially pleasing to us. Here is a case where a truly great defensive player wasn't overlooked. Norm played very little offense this year, but we have yet to see a defensive end turn in the job he did for the Owls.

Against the two service teams Tech played, the Eagle Point sophomore, was outstanding. Hamilton Air Force backs—many of whom had played at least one year in pro football—were talking about his effort against them. Moffett's Calvin Campbell was jarred two or three times when he attempted to circle Hooper's wing. Southern Oregon and Oregon College ball carriers know what it's like to run up against him.

But his defensive effort was sometimes overlooked which is the case of most fans who look for offensive standouts. Now, with the Little All-Northwest selections out, Hooper has gained back the tribute that should go to such an outstanding ball player.

On the subject of individual football awards, official notification was received this past week that Allen Siegner, 1956-57 graduate of Klamath Union High School, has been selected a member of the West team to play in the third annual East-West Junior College All-America football game. The game will be played in Stockton, California, December 20.

Al was one of 22 boys selected to play for the West. His selection is magnified when you take into consideration that the West team gridders come from junior colleges west of the Mississippi.

The 210-pound tackle leaves for Stockton December 14. He will receive a watch and jacket, plus all expenses paid as a squad member.

Al is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Siegner, 4518 Crosby. His parents are planning to take in the East-West clash, then return home for a big family Christmas vacation.

Oregon State College's Ted Bates is giving Oregon State College its second consensus all-American in three years. In 1956, Klamath Falls' own John Witte was named to 21 different all-America teams for his great tackle play for the Beavers. Now, Bates is piling up the honors, having made 11 at the last count, with several minor selections still to come.

Oregon State athletic officials will miss Bates—he is a senior—but the Corvallis school may have

another Bates in their ranks next year. At least they are trying, and with Ted's great show this fall, OSC has high hopes of getting brother Jim Bates this coming spring term or next fall.

Jim is a freshman football and track star at Los Angeles Junior College. The 6-3, 195-pound brother of all-American Ted is one of the most highly sought-after athletes in Southern California. Bidding high for him now is Oregon State and USC—the field has narrowed to these two.

Young Bates has been clocked at 9.4 in the 100-yard dash. As a football prospect, he was selected as the player of the year in Los Angeles prep ranks last year.

Not only would football coach Tommy Prothro be interested in the boy, but track coach Sam Bell would like to work him into the Beaver cinder program. Prospects like young Jim don't come along every day.

As for Ted, his future plans hope for a crack at pro football. Two NFL teams have reportedly made contact with the big tackle. Green Bay and Los Angeles are said to be interested in him as a defensive end. In the first four rounds of draft choices, Ted was bypassed, but he should go quickly when the pro football chiefs meet to draft again at the close of the season.

Every year there is a new type of all-America selection announced. Here's one for your records: The

Trojans, Huskies Net Jamboree Victories

If victories in a two-day, two-count jamboree mean anything the Merrill Huskies and the Sacred Heart Trojans are the teams to watch in the coming Klamath County basketball season.

The Huskies, only six days removed from a successful quest for the Oregon State Class B football championship, pounded out victories over the Malin Mustangs Friday night and the Henley Hornets Saturday night to win top honors in one half of the double county jamboree while the Sacred Heart Trojans stymied the Bly Bobcats 47-45. Saturday night after beating the Chiloquin Panthers on Friday to become the victors in the other.

The Huskies, behind a 13 point scoring effort by Bud Maupin, caught up with the Hornets with four minutes left in the third stanza and went on to keep their distance and wrap up the win.

Center Bruce Brickner (6-4) potted two free throws in the third stanza to give the Huskies a 20-18 edge and from here on Merrill retained command.

The top scorer for the Hornets was Phil Swisher with 10 points followed by Larson and Jackson with six markers each.

At Chiloquin the SHA Trojans asserted their rights by dropping the Bly Bobcats 47-45 in the feature game of the doubleheader while the Chiloquin Panthers handed the Gilechrist Grizzlies a 38-13 trouncing in the opener.

Sacred Heart, sparked by a 15 point stint by guard George Hurley, jumped off to a 12-5 lead in the first quarter, then hit the drums to lead the Bobcats move out front 26-20 at the intermission. The Bobcats continued their edge through the third period which ended 39-27 in favor of Bly.

The Chiloquin Panthers saved their pride on their home court by dumping the Grizzlies 38-13 after losing to Sacred Heart Friday night.

Center Ron Hoggarth was the top gun for the Panthers with 14,

while Russell with six was the head man for the Grizzlies.

Coach Bob Croft's Malin Mustangs made up for a 1 point trimming the night before by bombing the Bonanza Antlers 82-54 in the opening game of Saturday night's action on the Henley court, thus earning a third place finish in one half of the county basketball jamboree.

Paced by guard Randy Miller, a junior, who notched 20 points, the Mustangs overcame a first quarter Bonanza lead to end the period on a 17-16 count for Malin. In the second period the Mustangs continued the pace and left the Antlers on the short end of a 49-30 count.

Fourteen of Miller's 20 points came via the free throw line as the Malin sharpshooter hit 14 for 14 to pace his team to a 74 per cent foul shot average.

Beavers Blasted By Utes

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—Oregon State appeared more interested in practicing ball control than scoring Saturday night and lost a second straight game to Utah, 62-38.

Friday night the Utes beat Oregon State 70-41.

Utah's fast break and better shooting kept the Beavers ahead by a substantial margin throughout the game.

Oregon State again was cold on its shooting. The Beavers' 6-foot senior, Lee Harman, was the key man in the Oregon State attack.

While he drew repeated hoots from the crowd for his ball control tactics, he succeeded in breaking through often and scored 10 points.

Utah's 6-7 Carney Crisler and 6-4 Delye Condie led the Redskins with help from the smallest man on the Utah squad, 5-11 Dick Shores.

Oregon State pulled within five points at 20-15 but was the closest the Beavers got. The half ended 27-18 and Utah pulled steadily away in the second half.

Crisler was the top Utah scorer with 19.

Utah hit a commendable 42.6 of its field goal tries. Oregon State had 31.9.

Owls Win Saturday Tilt, Earn Season-Opener Split

Led by big Paul Layher and little Dennis "The Menace" McKee, Oregon Tech managed to salvage a split in their two game weekend basketball series with visiting Humboldt State College here Saturday night winning 47-30. The win evened the series — which opened the Tech 1958 season — after the Lumberjacks captured Friday night's encounter 51-48.

Saturday night's meeting found the Owls coming to life in the second half to pull away from the taller "Jacks" and steam their way to win No. 1 of the year. Friday night and the first half of the second game was only mediocre as far as the Techmen were concerned, but with Layher and McKee sparking the attack, the white-clad Owls showed signs of being potentially a fine club.

San Francisco Hosts Packers

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Between the two of them, the San Francisco Forty Niners and the Green Bay Packers have won only five games in the National Football League this year, but they'll play to 47,000 fans in Kezar Stadium Sunday.

San Francisco has been installed as an 11-point favorite, but coach Frankie Albert says he'll be satisfied "just to win."

The Forty Niners will stick pretty much with the lineup that licked Green Bay two weeks ago and nearly turned back the Baltimore Colts last week.

This will mean that veteran Y. A. Tittle again will get the call at quarterback over sophomore John Brodie. Hugh McElhenny and R. C. Owens will be the halfbacks and Joe Perry the fullback.

Bob Skousen, the game's leading scorer, led the visitors' attack in the opening half, picking up 16 of the 22 points that made him the game's high scorer.

Stu Robertson led Oregon with 21 and Dale Herron scored 16.

Early in the second half Oregon started to hit from the floor and drew within three points to 43-42, then took the lead 53-45 with an 11-point scoring spree while BYU failed to hit.

After that Brigham Young was able to pull up to 61-59 with five minutes to play. But after that the visitors could not get closer than four points.

Brigham Young outscored Oregon from the floor for the second straight night. But superiority from the free throw line prevailed for Oregon. In the two nights it made 42 of 50 free shots while Brigham Young could only convert 26 of 48 chances.

The teams were about even on field goal accuracy. Brigham Young hit 27 of 73 shots for a percentage of 37. Oregon had 36 per cent, on 26 of 72 attempts.

Denny Strickland, a sophomore, contributed 14 points to the Oregon cause before he fouled out with less than 3 minutes to play.

John Nicholl, high-scoring Brigham Young center, suffered a cut in the forehead early in the going. He left the action in the second half with only 9 points.

A crowd of 3,710 was on hand.

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in the first half, OTI pulled a 17-16 lead with a little more than two minutes left in the first period and led 20-16 at halftime. A rush of 27 points in the final 20 minutes while holding Humboldt to 14 salted away the Owls' triumph.

Between the two of them — Layher and McKee — they tallied 18 of the Owls 27 points in the last half, with the big 6-7 transfer from American River JC potting 11, which included four long jumpers in and around the lane. Layher, Ardel Hamilton and Dell Francis each chipped in points to boost the Tech lead to a 30-19 margin with a little more than five minutes gone in the final half.

Humboldt's attack faltered in the last six minutes with the "Jacks" collecting only two points, both on free throws. Meanwhile, McKee was getting a field goal and a free throw. Layher had two field goals and a free throw and Hamilton tossed in a shot from the floor as the Owls zoomed into their final 17 point advantage.

Layher finished the game with 20 points, McKee had 13.

Friday night's win by the Lumberjacks came in the closing minutes of the second half, after the Owls had carried the lead spot for most of the game. The contest was a typical opening season fracas, especially on the part of the Owls, filled with loose play and many mistakes.

Humboldt trailed 27-19 after a slow moving first half, but pecked away at the Owl lead until the visiting Lumberjacks finally overhauled their hosts in the late stages of the game. Humboldt fell behind 10-9 in the opening minutes of the first half, and wasn't in the lead until a field goal by Billy Caver put the "Jacks" ahead 43-42 with 4:39 left in the game.

But OTI's Ardel Hamilton pumped home two free throws as the Techmen again forged ahead, this time, 44-43. At this point Humboldt broke loose for four consecutive baskets by Joye Miller, George Milonis, Bill Crichton and Eddie Thomas to stretch their lead to an insurmountable 51-44 margin.

In the closing minute's play OTI's Charlie Gantner and Charlie Wilson found the range for field goals, but it was too late and the Owls were unable to come closer than the final three points.

Humboldt lost 6-5 center Grant

Erhart with only four minutes of the second half played on five personal fouls. But the play of Milonis and Caver sparked the Lumberjacks come-from-behind victory. Milonis scored eight of his nine points in the final period, and Caver collected 8 of his 10 in the last half.

Hamilton and Gantner led the OTI and game scoring. Hamilton scored 17; Gantner 12, all coming from
