Western Actor Blasts At Modern Day Costuming

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Audie Murphy, a mighty decorated young man in World War II, is crusading for simplicity in the clothing of civilians—specifically the civilians in Westerns.

"I'm a little shook every time I see a new Western character developed for, say, a TV series," he said. "What they should be wearing is homemade pants and the top of a union suit to cover chest and arms. Instead each guy is trying to come up with a distinctive rig."

"There's one guy with a tricky vest and hat. There's another guy with an outfit appropriate for burial—and there are lots more of them. The next one probably will have some deal like a gold belt or maybe even a gold gun with gold bullets."

Murphy said his remark about a union suit is absolutely correct. The famous plains heroes depicted on the screen and on TV usually rode around with the upper half of the union suit visible, he said.

"Kids are getting the wrong idea

from these guys," he said. "They're getting incorrect historical values. They think our pioneer heroes had \$200 Stetsons, Western-style shirts with lots of color and other fancy gear. They didn't, of course."

"I don't think Western heroes should ride the range in long johns—even if it's more accurate historically—but I do think they can be a little closer to reality with less gimmicky clothes."

Murphy said he himself wears faded blue jeans, a torn and tattered shirt and a hat which could not have seen worse days in his new Universal-International film, "No Name on the Bullet."

Murphy said another point of realism in his film concerns his leading lady, Joan Evans.

"I kiss her," he said. "Just the way plainsmen kissed women—not on the cheek or forehead, I mean the way a boy might do it if he were going overseas—you know, as if he wanted to and as if he meant it."

American Explorer Aids In Mapping Amazon Area

NEW YORK (UPI) — An American explorer who knows his way around the Andes has returned from the wilds of the Upper Amazon, where he helped map a mountain peak that has lured airmen to their deaths.

George Michanowsky of New York, has been exploring mountains northeast of La Paz, the capital of Bolivia, for several summers. It is part of his program, as founder and president of the Amazonia Foundation, to shed new light on the ancient Aymaras, presumed antecedents of the dynasty of the Inca Empire.

Last year, Michanowsky's expedition made news by discovering an ancient road which is now part of a chain of strong evidence that the Aymaras, contrary to accepted belief, did have a written language.

This year, still poking around the 100-by-50 mile area northeast of La Paz, Michanowsky's six-member Amazonia team spent two and a half months performing a valuable task.

The team mapped a 15,000-foot mountain peak known to airmen as "El Centinela," or "The Sentinel," which guards the Amazon-Andean approaches to the Andes. The peak is a deadly menace to aviation because it is concealed by cloud formations and "sneaks up" on unsuspecting pilots who have their eyes on the more distant Andean peaks. Last winter, 11 persons were killed when a Bolivian Army transport smashed into the peak.

Despite the need, "The Sentinel" had never before been mapped. "The makers were discouraged because the area is so desolate, so impenetrable," Michanowsky explained.

His team completed a preparatory mapping of the peak by working from the ground and air. With the information thus obtained, "The Sentinel" now can be pinpointed on maps. Michanowsky plans to return to Bolivia next year and, possibly with the aid of a helicopter, develop a still more detailed map of "The Sentinel" and its eye-deceiving approaches. Along with Bolivian newspaper

acclaim, Michanowsky received a unanimously-adopted citation from the nation's Chamber of Deputies in recognition of his cultural and good-will activities. Latin American officials have called the citation an unprecedented event in inter-American relations.

Ancient Bowl Valued At Half Million

TEHERAN (UPI) — An archaeological team from the University of Pennsylvania has accomplished what a horde of Assyrian raiders couldn't manage to do almost 3,000 years ago—although some of them died trying.

As a consequence, the Americans and their Iranian associates have come up with one of the biggest archaeological discoveries in recent years, a golden bowl just under eight and a half inches high and valued at half a million dollars.

It was located in September by a team under Robert Harris Dyson Jr., curator of the Pennsylvania University museum. The expedition, composed of three Americans and two Iranians, worked for nearly two years on the project.

According to the archaeologists, a band of nomadic Assyrians heard of the same vase 2,800 years ago and came to the little village of Hassanlou in northern Iran in an attempt to snatch it from the peaceful Mannaeans tribesmen who lived there.

The team from the University of Pennsylvania found out what happened in that scuffle. They discovered the \$500,000 bowl clutched in the skeleton hand of one Mannaeen. Two other skeletons lay near by. One was holding a dagger stuck into the back of the other.
