Vet Seaman Terms Rescue 'Beautiful Seamanship'

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—A War II when torpedoes struck two ships on which he was serving, veteran seaman who fell over-board from the liner Mariposa in mid-Pacific today called his quick rescue 17 minutes later "a beau-tiful piece of seamanship."

The story of the mishap and subsequent rescue last Thursday was revealed when the ship reached port Sunday.

Hans Randrup, a carpenter's mate from Sausalito, was working in a lifeboat when a line parted. He was smashed into the boat and then tossed 65 feet into the sea. "I came to the surface just as the propeller chopped by four feet away," he recalled while resting in a hospital bed today.

He credited his survival to the lesson he learned during World

War II when torpedoes struck two ships on which he was serving. "Don't panic and don't try to swim. Just float."

Meanwhile, aboard the ship, the cry "Man overboard" sounded al-most immediately.

On the bridge the mate of watch heard the cry and immediately ordered a "Williamson turn," an emergency maneuver which puts a steaming vessel back on its track.

Seventeen minutes after the rope snapped, Randrup was haul-ed in from the choppy water by a lifeboat crew, according to Capt. M. R. Peters.

The rescued man himself called the quick turnabout "a beautiful piece of seamanship." It was high praise coming from a man who has spent 34 of his 50 years on the sea.

Doctors said today that Randrup had received a leg cut and pos-sible back injuries in his fall, but was otherwise uninjured.

Matson Navigation Co. and the Coast Guard have promised to in-vestigate the accident.

The population of this smallest incorporated community in Geor-gia has jumped from two to four persons.

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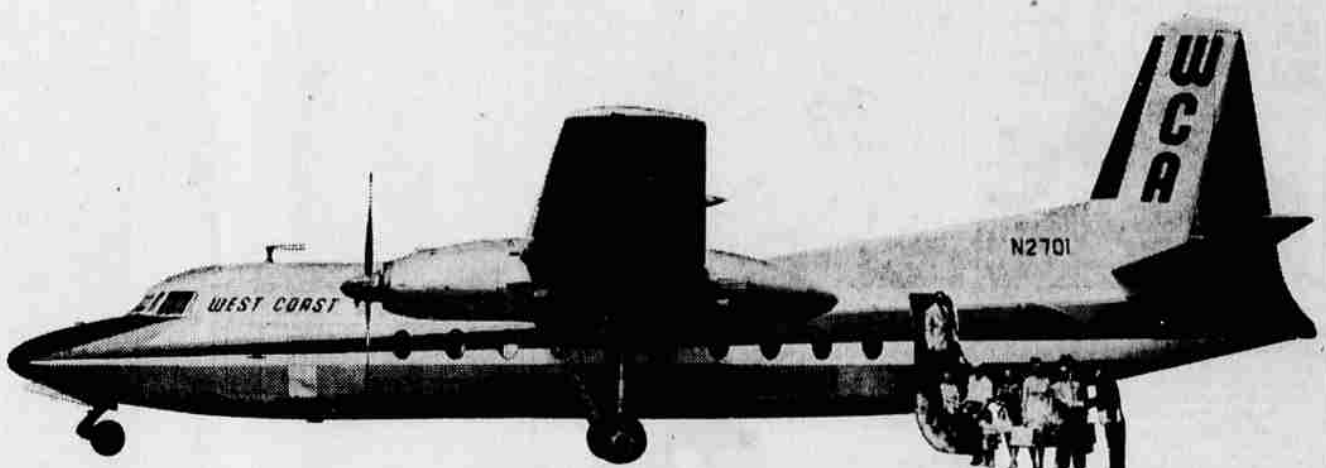
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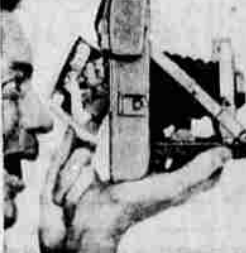
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
