Board Okays Bond Election

YREKA — An agreement was reached by the Yreka Union Elementary School District Board of Trustees, to hold a bond election some time in February for construction of a senior elementary school. This will be a second attempt to obtain two-thirds approval of the voters for the project that was defeated last July 15 at the polls.

Robert Reynolds, district superintendent of schools, stated he told trustees that plans to hold an earlier election were deterred until after it was disclosed, that the bonds would have to be sold and the money deposited with the state by February 6.

Another reason for holding back the election, Reynolds said, was with the recent addition of Mono Elementary School District to the Yreka District, a revised application must be presented to the state allocations board for certain portions of the planned construction. He stated that with the increased assessed valuation, the elementary district will probably be able to sell bonds in the amount of \$123,000 instead of the original \$113,000.

Reynolds further said that the state has already allowed an additional five per cent for increased building costs due to the delay. He estimated the district will, in addition, be able to borrow around \$300,000 from the state, instead of the \$235,000 proposed earlier.

Other matters taken up by the board of trustees at Tuesday's meeting were relative to moving the unused Mono schoolhouse to a new location to be used by the Mono Community Club. The board agreed to allow moving of the building as soon as the district is able to secure its own use-permit for the new site, and liability insurance covering the move is purchased by the club.

Reynolds also suggested the board to investigate available church facilities for possible use as emergency classrooms. According to Reynolds, kindergarten classes may have to be curtailed unless additional classrooms are obtained.

Farm Bureau Federation To Back President's Slate

BOSTON (AP)—A federal farm official left the convention of the American Farm Bureau Federation today reassured of continued strong support of Eisenhower administration farm policies by the big farm organization.

Asst. Secretary of Agriculture Marvin L. McLain, here to speak before convention meetings, said he found virtually no opposition to a gradual withdrawal of government controls.

The Farm Bureau itself had advocated such policies, but recent Republican election setbacks in some farming areas had stirred speculation that farmers wanted more rather than less government aid.

Yreka Mulls Traffic Tieup

YREKA—Yreka city councilmen again sought to solve the problem of traffic congestion on Miner Street by converting it to a one-way street, as had been proposed a year ago.

Councilman Matt McNeil, who has one of his own business establishments on Miner Street, and is in favor of converting it to one-way traffic, suggested that the one-way traffic should extend from Main to Oregon streets, and he also suggested parallel parking along some portions. Mayor Jim Cummings suggested that Center Street could be converted to one-way traffic, directing the flow in the opposite direction to that on Miner.

Also agreeing that conversion to one-way traffic on Miner might solve the present traffic congestion, Councilman Harry Friedman, opined that it was too drastic a move at the present time.

McNeil made another proposal about parking congestion on Center and Oregon streets near the courthouse, which has developed since the installation of parking meters on city lots. He pointed out that the streets were made narrower by parked cars, presenting a possible hazard to the passage of fire trucks in case of emergencies.

An agreement was reached by the councilmen to appoint McNeil, Charles Cooley and Pete Potter, city superintendent of streets, to study the possibility of widening the two streets, and agreed to study the traffic problem of Miner Street at the next meeting.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Westerners will be in position to exert more political power in the new Congress than in recent sessions. Democratic victories in 1958 elections climaxed a shift in the balance of political power that has been building for years.

Youth Scares Town Again

TYLER, Tex. (AP)—Johnny Pierce, 19, the amateur scientist who gave this east Texas city a radioactive scare several weeks ago, turned off radioactivity Monday.

"It was just water and a little stuff I washed off my fingers," Pierce explained. "You didn't even have to be shielded against it. It was less dangerous than a radium dial on a watch."

"When they decontaminated my house after the accident, they overlooked a little bottle I had," he said.

The youth, a technical student at a hospital, said he was going to get the container sealed and then bury it. But when he took it to a venetian blind firm to have the can sealed, the owner's wife remembered the earlier incident and called police.

Several weeks ago Pierce told officials he had contaminated himself with a cobalt capsule, which touched off a lot of testing for radioactivity and a lot of washing to eliminate contamination.

But he later admitted it was a radium needle he had taken from a hospital. That type of radioactivity is not as dangerous as cobalt.

Dr. Jesse Goldfeder of the City-County Health Service said Pierce's possession of the radioactive material will be investigated.

Among its members will be: Two new Democrats from Alaska, Ernest Gruening and E. L. (Bob) Bartlett; Frank E. Moss (D-Utah), who unseated Sen. Arthur V. Watkins (R); Howard W. Cannon (D-Nev.), replacing Sen. George W. Malone (R); Dale McGeen (D-Wyo.), who defeated Sen. Frank Barrett (R), and Clair Engle (D-Calif.), succeeding Sen. William F. Knowland (R).

Oregon, represented by two Republicans a few sessions ago, will have Democrats Richard Neuberger and Wayne Morse a convert, in the Senate again next year.

Sens. Warren G. Magnuson and Henry M. Jackson, both Democrats, will continue to represent Washington state.

Idaho, which had two Republicans in the Senate a few sessions ago, will be represented next session by Sens. Frank Church (D) and Henry Dworshak (R).

Montana, which once had a split delegation, again will be represented by two Democrats, Sens. James E. Murray and Mike Mansfield.

Sens. Dennis Chavez and Clinton Anderson, both Democrats, will continue to represent New Mexico and there has been no change in Colorado's senatorial delegation consisting of Sens. John A. Carroll (D) and Gordon Allott (R).

Others continuing in office include Sens. Wallace F. Bennett (R-Utah), Alan Bible (D-Nev.), Jo-
