Dads of Camp Fire Girls are being royally entertained this year at the organization's annual Dad-Daughter dinners. 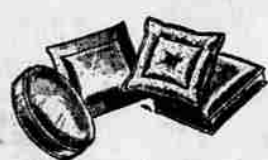
