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KRAFT MARSHMALLOWS and Kellogg's Rice Krispies combine to produce any number of Christmas favors and decorations that are easy to make, attractive to look at and good to eat. Shown are a few ideas you can whip up in the kitchen after the dinner dishes are done. They should be allowed to set for a couple of days to let the last vestiges of stickiness harden. Easier to make than popcorn balls, the youngsters will love to help.

KUHS BAND BENEFIT

Free tickets for Friday's Klamath Union High School Band benefit smorgasbord are available at the Big Y Market, 4710 South Sixth Street.

See the coupon in the Big Y advertisement which offers a free ticket to any adult bringing in the coupon to the Big Y Market this evening until closing hour at 9 p.m. or tomorrow.

The smorgasbord will be held in the Town and Country Shopping Center from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Friday. Salesmen representing food companies who have distribution in this area will serve the food furnished by their companies. Plans are to have up to four serving lines, under cover if weather indicates.

Tickets may be purchased at the shopping center in case you don't get out to the Big Y for free tickets.

SALAD

For a good luncheon salad, arrange mounds of cottage cheese on crisp greens and serve with fruit added to the plate. The fruit may be canned peach halves, pineapple chunks, fresh persimmon or orange sections and seedless green grapes. Salad dressing may be added or not as desired.

CRANBERRY RELISH

Refrigerate raw cranberry relish for a couple of days before you serve it to permit flavors to blend.

CHRISTMAS TREATS

The Kraft Foods line is distributed in Klamath Falls by Klamath Falls Creamery Company.

The Kraft Kitchens in Chicago have been developing more and more tested recipes for making the homemaker's work easier — and fun. For example, on your grocery shelves before Halloween were free packages of sticks to use with Kraft's Dairy Fresh Caramels to make Caramel Apples. The recipe is simple and Caramel Apples are fun for Christmas, too. Just melt 1 pound Kraft Caramels (approximately 56 caramels) with 2 tablespoons of hot water in the top of the double boiler. Stick a wooden skewer into the stem of each well-scrubbed apple and dip the apple, with twirling motion, into the hot coating. Put on wax paper and place in the refrigerator until firm. (The apples should be well-scrubbed, not only to remove any soil from the apple, but also to remove the natural wax on the apple skin to permit the caramel coat to adhere.)

The same recipe can be used to make candy. Simply stir in Kellogg's Rice Krispies, peanuts and coconut and pat out flat onto a plate or pan. Cut into bars.

CHRISTMAS TREES

In the top of the double boiler, melt 1 pound of Kraft Marshmallows and 1-3 cup of butter. Pour over Kellogg's Rice Krispies in a buttered (and warmed) bowl. Fill cone shaped paper drinking cups and insert wooden skewer in the bottom. Allow to harden overnight, then remove paper cup and decorate the tree. For snow-frosted effect, drizzle with more of the melted marshmallow mixture and then decorate with colored sugar, silver shot or tiny candies. A silver foil star can top the tree (if you want to get fancy) and its base is a big gumdrop. If you are using for individual favors at the table, insert the base in a thick slice of apple and set on a tiny doily on your smallest plates. The gumdrops aren't quite heavy enough to hold up the trees for any length of time.

Holiday Candies

Unusual candies make holiday sweets more interesting. "Fig Acorns" are an attention getter whenever they appear in gift boxes or in the candy dish. Although quite simple to prepare, they look as though they were made by a professional candy maker.

To make "Fig Acorns" simply stuff plump dried figs with almonds and chill thoroughly. Then dip each fig into melted chocolate or fondant and allow to set. The figs may be dipped only half way or to the stem. Anyway you make them, these fabulous sweets are mighty handsome.

FIG ACORNS

2 cups dried figs
Blanching roasted almonds
1/2 pound dipping chocolate or fondant
Cover figs with boiling water 5 to 10 minutes, or steam. Cool and dry free of moisture. Slit one side of each fig and insert an almond, closing fig opening. Chill thoroughly. Melt chocolate or fondant over warm, not hot, water. Lift each fig by stem and dip into melted chocolate, or in fondant tinted as desired. Place on waxed paper to set.

SAVORY

Try a dash of garlic powder in your next batch of egg salad or egg salad sandwich spread. Different, but good.

ANTIPASTO

Put together your own antipasto tray. It should have crisp raw vegetables such as celery, cauliflower and carrots; shiny ripe Wyandotte olives, little green peppers, radishes and thinly sliced salami. Serve as the first course before spaghetti or ravioli dinner.

WREATHS

Use the marshmallow mixture with Rice Krispies and press into a buttered ring mold. Invert mold and put the wreath on a plate to decorate with decorations of your choice. Colored gumdrops snipped into pieces are formed into patterns produces a beautiful della robia effect. A shiny bow completes the wreath.

The tiny Christmas tree shown at right, front in the picture was formed in a tree-shaped cookie cutter and then frosted with Kraft Marshmallow mixture.

BEAUTY TIP

KING CHARLES baked pie shells are now available at Klamath Falls grocery stores and markets. They are an Oregon product, made by Lane Products Company, Inc., at Eugene and T. W. Charles, president-manager of the company, was in Klamath Falls last week to complete arrangements for distribution of the product through Bowers Food Sales and Hudson House.

BAKED PIE SHELLS

Experiments and research conducted in the shortening field during World War II have resulted in its being possible to turn out prebaked pastry which will stay fresh for a considerable length of time on the grocer's shelves.

Lane Products Company, Inc., makers of King Charles frozen English Muffins and baked pie shells, uses a shortening developed through government research to keep its products fresh.

The next hurdle to overcome was packaging. The first packages broke down. The next ones held the shells in such a rigid position that they shattered because they are flaky and tender like the ones you would like to bake at home.

The new package, shown in the accompanying picture, has a window front to show the baked pie shells, each in its own fluted paper cup. The package has a lift, top and bottom, however, to serve as a shock absorber so the pie shells do not break so readily.

The new product is ready-made for filling with ice cream or fruit for a quick dessert or for using for meat or chicken pies. The

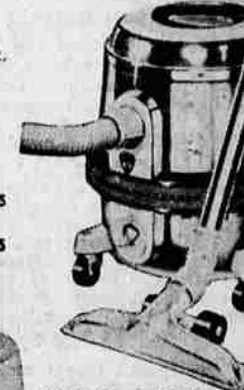
