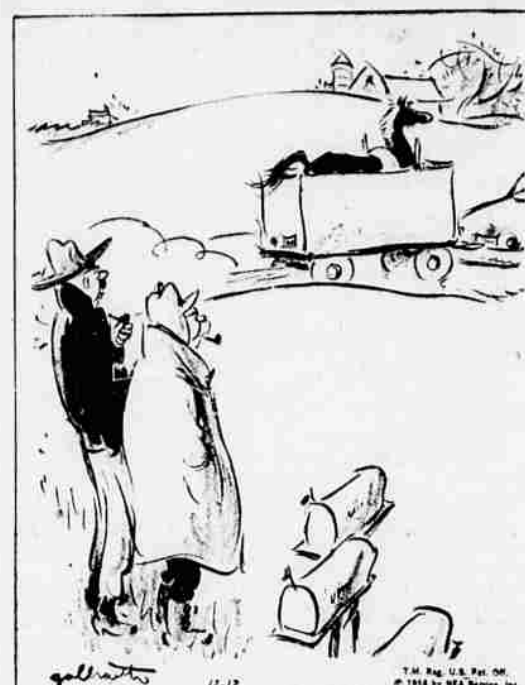

Mike saw only an edition of a local paper which carried two of his stories, along with a resume of his writing career. He didn't see a later edition which told of him having leukemia — cancer of the blood — and that he only had a short time to live.

The 8-year-old died Thursday never knowing he had leukemia.

"We made certain he never found out," said his father, James Rollins of Marion, Ohio. "Mike had a rough enough time as it was."
