**School Committee Reports Heard By Siskiyou Jury**

**DUNSMUIR**—Far reaching recommendations were made by the school committee of the 1958 Siskiyou County Grand Jury which issued its final report this week.

Study of equalization of the school tax load by the board of supervisors and other county officials concerned was suggested by the school committee in a 14-point report, by far the lengthiest of the committee reports submitted.

Either a state-wide or county-wide tax was suggested as a means of avoiding penalizing those children living in remote or impoverished districts. Within the last few months various school districts in Siskiyou County have been on the verge of dissolution, annexation or separation. The Yreka Chamber of Commerce has sponsored a petition to withdraw from the Siskiyou County Joint Union High School District embracing within the proposed new district a large portion of highly assessed property and leaving a fringe to function independently. This petition is being withheld temporarily until the present building program is a full time building inspector was also suggested by the schools' group. The

Overcrowded conditions were noted at Yreka and Tulelake elementary schools. The Dunsmuir Elementary School was declared overcrowded and obsolete. Otherwise Siskiyou County was commended on its school plants.

Commendation was also given the superintendent of education's office for undertaking a standard curriculum study for elementary schools in Siskiyou County. This need was discussed at a grand jury committee meeting in May. The need for vigilance that the forest reserve fund allocation be maintained in the benefit of counties in which national forest lands are located, of the value of various school holidays, the need of counseling and guidance at the high school level and commendation of the Siskiyou County Science Fair were other matters covered in the school report.

That all concerned be informed of the report, that the 1959 grand jury school committee make inquiry into progress of matters mentioned in the 1958 report and that all school boards be asked to submit matters worthy of inquiry to the school committee next year were recommendations also included by the 1958 school committee.
