

Browns, NY Giants Face Struggle; Bob Layne, Steelers Beat Cardinals

More than 70,000 spectators are expected to pack Yankee Stadium Sunday to see whether the New York Giants can clinch an almost season-long struggle to catch the Cleveland Browns in the Eastern Conference of the National Football League.

This game is the most important of five on the final program of the regular season.

A victory for the Giants would put them in a 9-3 deadlock with the Browns for first place. This would necessitate a playoff in New York next Sunday for the right to meet the Baltimore Colts, Western Conference titleholders, Dec. 28.

The Colts wind up their season schedule against the San Francisco 49ers. In the other games, the Green Bay Packers are at Los Angeles, Philadelphia at Washington and Detroit at the Chicago Bears.

Pittsburgh defeated the Chicago Cardinals 38-21 as both teams completed their schedules Saturday.

The Giants will be bucking Cleveland's perfect (5-0) road record.

To win Sunday, New York probably will have to get another superlative effort from veteran quarterback Charley Conerly. He was the outstanding performer when the Giants beat the Browns 21-17 in Cleveland Nov. 2.

Second place in the Western Conference rests on the results of the Bears-Lions and Rams-Packers games. Los Angeles and the Bears are tied for second place.

The Rams already hold a 20-7 decision over the Packers this season. The Bears beat the Lions earlier by the same score.

High-scoring Baltimore will attempt to repeat an early season triumph over San Francisco. The Colts won that one with a fine second half rally that overcame a 27-7 halftime deficit.

Johnny Unitas, Baltimore's quarterback, will be pitching to extend the NFL record set last week when he threw a touchdown pass in his 24th consecutive game.

PITTSBURGH (AP)—The passing wizardry of quarterback Bob Layne and the passing thievery of teammate Dean Derby gave the Pittsburgh Steelers a 38-21 victory over the Chicago Cardinals in a National Football League game on the frozen turf of Pitt Stadium Saturday.

Layne pitched two touchdown passes to Jimmy Orr and Derby intercepted three Chicago passes as the two teams wound up their seasons before a chilled crowd of 16,660 and a national television (CBS) audience.

Two of Derby's interceptions touched off Steele touchdown drives and the other a 13-yard field goal by Tom Miner. Halfback Tom Tracy, who gained only 35 yards rushing Saturday, nevertheless set a Steelers season record of 714 yards. His biggest play was a spectacular 72-yard touchdown pass that found Orr in the clear with an easy track to the goal line.

For the day, the Steelers piled up 663 yards gained, second only to the Los Angeles Rams record of 735 yards in NFL history.

Layne hit on 23 of 49 pass attempts, gaining a total of 409 yards and once, fading to pass, he found a clear route and ran 17 yards for a touchdown.

Ollie Matson, the great Chicago halfback, scored two of the Cardinals TDs—one on a 92-yard kickoff runback. His second score, a one-yard plunge, gave him 10 for this season, surpassing his previous mark of nine.

The victory gave the Steelers a 7-4 record. The loss was the ninth for the Cardinals, having one of the worst seasons in their record. They won two and tied one game.

In the second half of the match the pace quickened considerably as the Huskies, paced by high-point John Haskins who collected 12, outscored the Henley five 26-19.

Trailing Haskins was Bruce Brickner with nine markers while Dean Haskins matched the six point efforts of Hornet's Joe Tachini and Phil Swisher.

In the preliminary game the Hornet JV's squeaked out a 32-31 win over the Merrill JV's. Three players—Lawrence Lugo, Bob Chapman and Floyd Kendall—did all the scoring for the winners as they tallied 12, 10 and 10 points respectively.

Cowboys Defeat Seminoles

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — The Cowboys of Oklahoma State, spurred on by halfback Duane Wood, rode to a 15-6 victory over Florida State University Saturday in the first annual Bluegrass Bowl football game.

Wood bulled over for one touchdown in the second quarter, another in the third and killed a major scoring threat by Florida State in the last period when he intercepted a pass in the end zone and carried the ball out 18 yards.

Florida State, a stranger to the 12-degree temperature that limited the crowd to 5,000, picked up its lone tally early in the fourth quarter when Joe Majors hit Carl Meyer in the end zone with a 17-yard pass.

The Seminoles also tried two field goal attempts early in the first period but both of John Shepard's boots went wide of the mark.

Florida State made an impressive showing in the first quarter but thereafter was no match for the Cowboys, who outgained them nearly 12 pounds a man.

Oklahoma State, thwarting out as the second quarter opened, moved in three plays from its own 47 to the 17, where Wood carried the ball over on a pitchout.

Jim Wood's kick gave the Cowboys a 7-0 edge with only 29 seconds gone in the quarter.

Late in the third quarter, Dick Soergel connected with Wood on a long pass that carried to the one-foot line. Wood then scored on another pitchout.

After the touchdown, Soergel again flipped to Wood in the end zone for two points, making it 15-0.

When the final small college football statistics were made public this past week, it was interesting to note that the "50-50" Whittier College team, which Oregon Tech fell before in the season's finale, finished high team and individual offensive leaders throughout the country.

Whittier—as a team—placed 10th on the passing offensive list, averaging 154 yards per game.

Also included in the small college stats was the fact that Gary Campbell, Whittier halfback, was second in the nation for total offense. Campbell, the rushing and passing wizard that helped to beat OTI 27-8, was second only to Stan "The Man" Jackson of Cal Poly (Pomona). Campbell netted 1,659 yards to Jackson's 2,478.

Campbell's passing accuracy was the best in the nation, even though he finished number eight in the total yardage. The Whittier junior threw 87 times and completed 139 for a .626 percentage.

Franny Givins, Humboldt State College basketball coach, was full of praise for his freshman coach at the Arcata school last weekend when he was in town for a two-game basketball series with Oregon Tech.

Franny's freshman coach is Tom Schubert, ex-KUHS and OTI athlete. Tom, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Schubert, is finishing up his physical education degree at Humboldt, and although his playing eligibility is expired, he keeps pace with the sports program by coaching the Humboldt Rebels.

Givins informed us that Tom is doing a real fine job, and is expecting him to become a fine coach when he leaves school. As of this writing, Tom's club has won three of four games, losing only to Shasta Junior College last weekend when the clubs split a two-game series.

United Press International reports that fight fans who watched the Archie Moore-Yvon Durelle fight last Wednesday night on television couldn't believe their eyes.

After Archie flattened Durelle in 49 seconds of the 11th round of their championship fight, it was announced the knockout round would be repeated via video tape. What followed was one of the beautiful boo-boos of the TV year.

Anderson Collects Net Title

MELBOURNE (AP) — Mal Anderson's tennis racket is hot again, and that is depressing news to the U.S. Davis Cup team.

The lean Queenslander, who has been in a prolonged slump since his impressive victory in the American nationals at Forest Hills in 1957, rounded back to top form Saturday with a 68-minute, straight-set victory over his Australian teammate, Ashley Cooper, for the Victorian championship.

The score was 7-5, 6-4, 6-3. It tells little of the superiority of the quick, nimble-footed Anderson held over his more cumbersome countrymen.

Perry Jones, 70-year-old U.S. Davis Cup captain, and Jack Kramer, who is advising him, both delayed their trip to Perth to watch the all-Australian final. They were impressed, but Jones refused to concede that the bristling match dimmed America's hopes of recapturing the huge silver bowl.

"Any time Anderson hits form it is bad news for us," said Kramer, who reportedly will sign both of Saturday's finalists to pro contracts after the Davis Cup challenge round.

"I thought Anderson looked the best I have seen him since Forest Hills in '57. When he is right he probably is the best amateur tennis player in the world."

Jones said both Cooper and Anderson played good tennis, but he saw nothing to make him think the Aussies are unbeatable.

"The match proved to me that Cooper can be beaten if pressure is applied," the American captain said. "I still believe we can best them if our boys get in the right attitude."

Anderson and Cooper both were assured of singles assignments in the challenge round before the match, but Anderson was regarded as second to his hard-hitting teammate. Cooper beat him in the finals for both the U.S. and Australian championships and added Wimbledon to this season's list of laurels.

Now the situation may be reversed. Anderson may be the strongest bet for keeping the cup at home.

Cox Sparks Kentucky Win

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Johnny Cox, a holdover from Kentucky's NCAA champions, fired in 27 points to lead the nation's No. 2 basketball team to a 76-57 romp over ninth-ranked St. Louis Saturday.

Kentucky had to call on all of its resources before it was able to shake the taller Billkens and pull away in the last eight minutes.

St. Louis led only once and trailed by only 34-30 at halftime. But it was unable to stand off Kentucky's stretch drive as a partisan crowd of 11,400 roared approval.

The game opened college basketball's televised game of the week.

The ace for St. Louis was 6 feet 8 Bob Ferry who poured through 23 points and gave the Kentuckians plenty of anxiety.

Kentucky, at a disadvantage in size, battled St. Louis even on the boards and helped itself with a terrific 50 per cent shooting performance in the first half.

Coming back in the last half, the Billkens never came closer than two points and saw their opportunities fade when they attempted to press the Wildcats with the score at 52-48 and about eight minutes left to play.

Bayer Leads At Sanford; Total 204

SANFORD, Fla. (AP)—Shooting a two-under-par 69 for his third straight sub-par round, large George Bayer of Glen Eagles, Ill., took the undisputed lead at the three-quarter mark of the Sanford Open Golf Tournament Saturday with a total of 204.

Two strokes back in second place was Wes Ellis Jr., of Alderess, N.J., who started the day three strokes behind and came in with a 68 to add to his previous rounds of 68 and 70.

Joy Hebert of Sanford with a five-under-par 66; Bo Winger of Odessa, Tex.; Chick Harbert of Northville, Mich.; Dow Finsterwald of Tequesta, Fla., and National Open Champion Tomory Bolt of Paradise, Fla., were deadlocked for third place at 107.

Nineteen players were 210 or better for three rounds, assuring a real battle down the stretch Sunday.

Young Bob Keller, Eglin Air Force Base pro who tied with Bayer at 133 starting Saturday's play, blew to a 75 and dropped back to the 210 bracket.
