Andrea Doria To Be Brought To Surface If Bold New Plan Succeeds

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—A plaque
on "A" deck of the 29,000-ton And-
rea Doria honored her designers
for creating a ship that could not
sink.

On a bright summer's day in 1960,
if salvage master Dick Meyers
has his way, the Doria will rise
from her watery grave 40 miles
off Nantucket Island and the bar-
nacle-encrusted plaque will be
removed before the leviathan re-
turns to the sea lanes.

The Italian sea queen has been
resting 240 feet down on the ocean
bottom since the morning of July
27 1956, less than 12 hours after
she collided with the Swedish liner
Stockholm with the loss of 50 lives.

Meyers, who negotiated with the
Doria's insurers for rights to the
hulk, regards his task as "rou-
tine."

"There is really not too much
to it once you have studied the
wreck and know what is to be
done," said Meyers, interviewed
during a Hollywood visit with his
actress-fiancee Carole Mathews.

The bearded diver explained
that approximately 100 inflatable
rubber caissons, each with a lift-
ing power of 212 tons, would be
secured to the sunken vessel.

"The caissons are secured by
knocking most of the 400 port-
holes out of the Doria, then insert-
ing clamps through the openings.
Once they are in place we'll start
lifting."

"We plan to lift it by degrees,
then tow it toward Nantucket with
two ships, allowing it to settle to
the boom periodically until we
are in only 30 feet of water."

"At that point a gang of men
will swarm over the exposed parts
of the Doria to smear grease over
her. While she is submerged the
only real oxidation damage will
be that suffered by the light met-
als such as aluminum," Meyers
said.

Meyers discounted any hopes
that money and valuables left
aboard the Doria would be sal-
vaged.

"At the most there would have
been possibly \$100,000 and I sup-
pose that was taken off in the 11
hours before she sank," he said.

"The big money is in the sal-
vage. We figure the whole opera-
tion will cost us less than four mil-
lion dollars and when the Doria
is raised she will be worth three-
fourths of her \$33,000,000 cost,"
the 41-year-old diver said.

Up to 600 men will be involved
at times in the project although

WRAPPING IT UP

CHICAGO (UPI)—Plastic tape
— 42 million square feet of the
stuff — is being wrapped around
a 1,570-mile pipeline between Ba-
ton Rouge, La., and Cutler,
Fla. The three-million-dollar job
is being done for the pipeline's
owner, the Houston Texas Gas
and Oil Co., by the Kendall Corp.
of Chicago, which calls it the
largest order ever placed for a
protective pipe coating. The ma-
terial being used is a polyethy-
lene tape called Polyken. The job
is scheduled for completion by
next June 1, after workmen have
covered the pipeline as it runs
through swamps, across rivers and
through forests.

the crew will be restricted by
weather to working only from late
spring until mid-December. Mey-
ers hopes to have the Doria out
of the water by the end of summer
in 1960.

Meyers' 20-year career of rais-
ing ships all over the globe in-
cludes salvage work in Subic Bay
of the Philippines during World
War II.

He prepared for the Doria job
by the salvage of a Dutch ship,
the 250-foot Prinz Willem V, sunk
in 100-foot waters of Lake Michi-
gan.

"The Willem suffered the same
kind of damage as the Doria on
the same side," Meyers explained.
"Raising her solves many of the
problems we'll face with the
Doria."

Red Youth Held To Be Healthiest

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)—Obey-
ing the party line is health habit
No. 1 in Russia—and one result
is a crop of children who are
American counterparts.

This is the diagnosis of Dr. Jo-
seph Stokes Jr., president of the
American Pediatric Society, who
recently returned from a study
tour of Russia to lay the ground-
work for a long-range cultural ex-
change program.

"It seemed to me that the Rus-
sians do a much better job of
preventive care than we do here,"
he explained, "and the result is
that you have generally healthier
children."

Dr. Stokes observed that chil-
dren in the "lower-economic
groups" in America often do not
receive proper care because they
are not taken to physicians or
clinics.

"But in Russia," he said, "every
baby must be brought to the ho-
spital once a month for the first
six months, then every other
month up to one year, and then
two to four times a year after
that until the age of seven, when
the school authorities take over.
At that time their medical case
histories are turned over to the
school doctors."

A number of phases of our
medical research, however, are
more advanced than over there,"
Dr. Stokes said, explaining that
we have made greater strides, for
example, in the field of rheumatic
fever, which is one of the top
child killers in Russia.

The No. 1 killer in the United
States, he said, is accidents.

"We have so many more auto-
mobiles on the streets than in
Russia. There they have more
trucks, and the trucks move much
slower. I can't say what it will
be like two years from now."

Dr. Stokes, who is Physician-
in-Chief at Children's Hospital of
Philadelphia, traveled in Russia
under the auspices of the Ameri-
can Friends Service Committee.
He exchanged, which included oth-
er U.S. doctors, was arranged in
cooperation with the Soviet Soci-
eties for Cultural Relations with
Foreign Countries.
