

Building Move Given Okay

YREKA — With the provision that the old Mono School building would be available to the entire community for a recreation center, the Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors granted permission to the Mono Community Club members to move the structure to a site of land owned by the U.S. Forest Service.

Tentative approval for the use of the building as a community center had already been given by the Yreka Elementary School trustees, governing body of the Mono district, since a recent merger.

Another action taken by the board of supervisors, during Tuesday's session, was the reappointment of Tony Cansino as county surveyor for a four year term, effective January 5. He had previously been appointed to fill the unexpired term of former county surveyor Orel E. Lewis.

The board also approved an increase in the county surveyor's budget in the amount of \$1,400 to handle an increased work load on county projects.

Another reappointment made by the board was that of Erling Hjertager of Callahan, and Felix Gropi of Weed to the county planning commission for a four year term, effective January 5.

Under a recommendation by Supervisor W. C. (Bill) Ealy, the board took under consideration that the public administrator be named public guardian, as permitted under a recent change in state law, which would mean that some 36 mentally deficient county residents would receive up to \$106 each per month, and be transferred from the county general relief rolls.

District Attorney Floyd Merrill is Siskiyou County's public administrator.

A letter, protesting road conditions between Mayten and Machado Lane near Four Corners, was received by the board from the Big Springs Irrigation District, and was referred to county road commissioner, Al Powers.

More than 500 employees at the Klamath Falls operation of Weyerhaeuser Timber Company received an extra bonus last week in the form of free Christmas trees, according to T. S. Durnutt, of the local Weyerhaeuser office.

The trees were seized by state police, FBI and other officers after having been cut by unauthorized persons without permit on Weyerhaeuser land.

More than 5,000 young trees have been recovered this winter by FBI on private, federal, state and Indian Service forest lands and Bureau of Land Management property.

Thousands more, which were stolen, have been hauled to California markets.

Courts Note Violation Hike

District and municipal courts and justices of the peace throughout Oregon reported 11,812 driver convictions during the month of November according to figures released today by the Department of Motor Vehicles.

This is nearly 1,000 more than were reported for the same period in 1957.

Two hundred forty seven persons received mandatory license suspensions for driving while intoxicated, an action automatic with a conviction. Additional suspensions of one year were ordered in 89 cases for drivers found operating a car while already under a previous suspension.

Recommendation of the courts resulted in 140 suspensions, dealing with offenses such as reckless driving, violation of the basic rule, no operator's license and others.

This figure showed a drop from November, 1957, in which 192 such recommendations were put into effect.

Discretionary action on the part of the driver license division of the department lifted the driving privileges of 182 drivers in the state.

Driving records were the basis for 126 of these suspensions while the majority of the balance were attributed to failure to pass tests and failure to appear at interviews after due notice.

Total suspensions ordered by the drivers license division numbered 29 more than for the same month last year.

Oregon sugar beet growers threw their full support behind the American beet sugar industry's move to win extension of the federal Sugar Act, without change, early in the forthcoming session of Congress, at the 13th annual meeting of the National Beet Growers Federation, held earlier this month at Denver.

Dudley Smith, vice president of the Puerto Rican Sugar Producers Assn., Washington, told the delegates that the U.S. beet sugar industry is 40 years ahead of the beet sugar producers elsewhere in the world and at least that far ahead of several cane sugar producing areas.

"The willingness of your industry to invest significant amounts of money, time and effort in research and testing programs resulting in steady agricultural and technological progress has made yours the most efficient beet sugar industry in the world," Smith declared.

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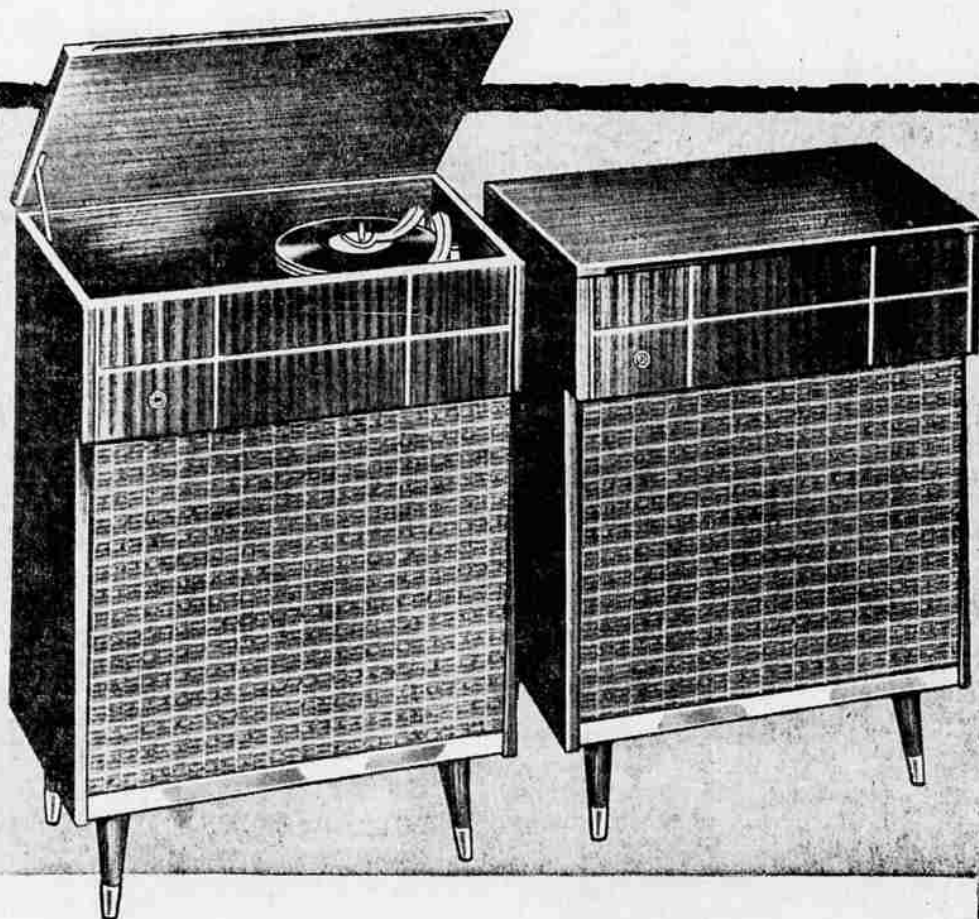
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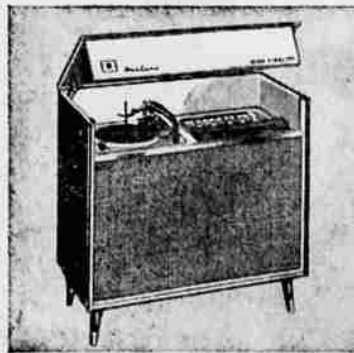


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
