Oregon St. Cagers Trip Wichita 72-55

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Oregon State ran away from Wichita in the second half for a 72-55 victory in an intercollegiate basketball game here Saturday night.

Oregon State saw a 9-2 lead it took early in the game dwindle to two points four different times in the first half. But a late Oregon State rally just before intermission gave the home team a 30-25 advantage as the second half opened.

Wichita crept to within three points early in the second half. At that point, Oregon State cracked the visitors' zone defense

with some fine shooting by Jim Anderson and strong backboard work by Gary Goble and Karl Anderson.

The Beavers gradually built their margin, which at one point reached 20 points, 66-46, with less than five minutes to go in the game.

Goble, who was high scorer for the winners with 17 points, and Jim Anderson, who tossed in 15, paced Oregon State, but Wichita's 6-9 Al Tate was the game's high point man with 18.

Oregon State, with 27 field goals in 63 attempts, had a shooting percentage from the floor of .429 and hit 16 for 21 free throws.

Wichita shot .380, hitting on 22 of 58 field goal attempts.

A crowd of 2,826 watched.

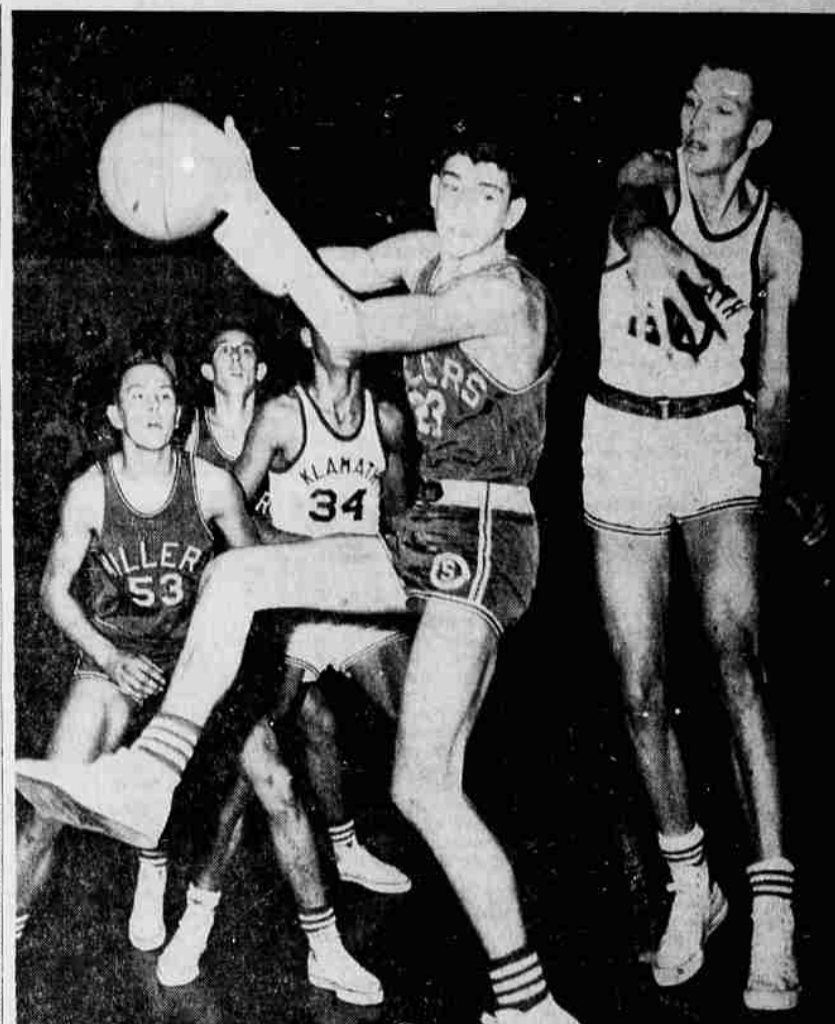

Oregon Tech Owls Win Two From U.S. Plywood Cagers

Oregon Tech's Owls took time to get warmed up Saturday night, but when they got on the right track, they rallied to capture a 58-56 overtime basketball win from U.S. Plywood, the Redding California semi-pro basketballers.

The win was the second in as many nights for the Owls over the U.S. Plywood quintet. Friday night, Tech managed to hold on in the closing minutes to pick off a 55-50 triumph. The series sweep

gives the Techmen a 3-1 season record as they await a two-game non-conference meeting with Northwest Nazarene College here Monday and Tuesday nights.

Saturday night's hardwork action on the Mile High Campus opened like a cold winter breeze as neither of the two clubs could find the basket. But on the part of the Owls, the case of jitters was serious as they stumbled and staggered through the first 13 and a half minutes of the game with only two field goals. But by half-

time they began to move, and at the midway mark in the second half the Owls were battling the Plywood cagers on even terms.

Ardell Hamilton and Roy Johnson picked up the Owl bootstraps and spurred the Tech come-from-behind, overtime victory. Hamilton broke a 34-34 deadlock with 8:45 left in the game by hitting on a tip-in basket, giving the Owls a 36-34 lead. But Mike Runge fired home a field goal and two free throws to send USP back into the lead.

Then Johnson picked up the slack and hit on a long pusher to knot the count. USP's Ray Swartz tallied three points on a field goal and free throw, but OTI's Troy Koontz hit one free throw. Hamilton canned another tip-in and Johnson cashed in with a crumple to give the Owls the upper hand 43-41, but the Redding plywooders were not through. Runge and Duffy Adams, a Tulelake High School product, each tallied from the field as USP recaptured the lead, 46-43. But Hamilton was still alive and kicking as he hit on a jumper from the top of the key with 1:40 left in regulation play to tie the count.

And that's the way it remained up to the overtime buzzer.

In the final period, Hamilton scored seven points on two field goals and three free throws and Johnson fired home a pair of shots from the floor to lead the Owls' extra period assault. The Owls led throughout the overtime play after Johnson hit first on a jumper from the base line, but the score was tied at 47-47, 49-49 and 51-51. Hamilton hit on a lay-in basket then added a free throw that gave Tech its deciding margin, 54-51. U.S. Plywood never drew up even with the Owls in the remaining two minutes and 14 seconds.

Hamilton paced the Tech scorers with 19 points. Johnson finished with 12, all coming in the roll of a reserve. High for U.S. Plywood was Adams with 14. Runge and Doug McClary, the ex-University of Washington basketball standout, each had 11, the same number claimed by Tech center Paul Laylor.

Friday night, Palmberg's Owls withstood a second half bid by the Plywood cagers to overtake an 11-point halftime bulge. But the Redding semi-pros fell short of their goal after Tech closed the game out of reach in the closing minutes.

Little Leon Wilson fired home two field goals and a free throw and teammate Charlie Genter hit on a long push shot from side court as the Owls moved into a 7-0 lead with three minutes gone in the game. From this point on, the Owls led through the halftime intermission with U.S. Plywood drawing to within five points at the nearest point.

In the second half, Tech pulled 13 points ahead, 43-30 with 12 minutes remaining in the game. Then some fine outside shooting by the Northern California independent club sliced the OTI margin.

Dick Friebel hit on two long set shots and added a duce from close in to lead the U.S. Plywood drive. Dick Dallajacomo tallied on a pair of long push shots while Oregon Tech was getting a single free throw from Genter as the scoreboard found the Owls leading by four points, 44-40.

The Plywood quintet cut the margin to three — 49-46, 51-48 and 53-50 before Genter put the game out of reach in the closing seconds of play. The junior forward from Portland hit two free throws with only 18 seconds remaining to "ice" the Tech triumph.

The jury is in debate at this moment in the case of the Oregon Collegiate Conference vs. Oregon Technical Institute. An answer is expected to come Monday afternoon or evening.

What will happen to the Mile High Campus as a result of their football ineligibility remains to be seen. The conference coaches and athletic directors have already made recommendations for punishment that should be dealt to the Owls. Whether or not their action is followed by the OCC presidents' council — which meets Monday — is not known.

There is some speculation that the coaches' recommendations might be bypassed and the presidents take even more action against OTI. A move to oust the school from the conference was started prior to the coaches meeting, but nothing came of it. No one will venture a guess as to the possibilities of this move coming alive again in the president's meeting.

If it does, Oregon Tech's chances are slim of surviving. Not that the Mile High Campus school has done so many bad things "under the table," but the other members of the conference are under the arm of higher education within the state and claim "academic respectability" that OTI is not supposed to have, as a child under the state department of education.

We can not go along with this dream of academic respectability. The other members of the conference have broken a rule or two since moving under the OCC constitution. One line of thought has it that Oregon Tech has come alive not only athletically, but also academically, and the other conference members do not want to compete with the local school.

Oregon Tech's athletic program has not differed much this year from what it has in the past. The only change in the script this year was that Rex Hunsaker's Owl football team not only beat every conference member, but ripped the OCC football slate wide open—including 40-0 and 66-7 wins over Southern Oregon and Oregon College, something that no other conference member does not want to compete with the local school.

The pot has been boiling. Wally Palmberg's Tech basketball team has won two straight conference titles. George Miller's track team has won two OCC cinder championships. Now Hunsaker wins the first clear-cut football title for the school, and that was all that it took to light the fuse.

We feel that Oregon Tech officials made a mistake this year. But this error—whether it be accidental or intentional—does not seem to carry enough weight to suspend the school from the conference—if such action is taken by

the conference presidents.

The fate of OTI lies in the hands of the four conference presidents—OTI director Winston D. Purvine, the fifth president, may not take part in the voting—and they will make some sort of a decision Monday afternoon. We'll just wait and see what happens, and in the meantime hope for the best.

Local high school sports fans were pleased to note that C. B. Simons, a former KUHS football and wrestling standout, was named to the Portland Oregonian's 1958 all-state football team.

The 6-2, 215-pound senior tackle, played his prep football this year at Roseburg, and is one of the top prospects in the state to continue his football playing at the college level in the next few years.

C. B. is the son of Dutch Simons.

KU Pels Grab Double Win In '58 Cage Season Opener

The 1958 version of the Klamath Union Pelicans got off to a shaky start but smoothed out in the crucial spots to pick up a pair of nerve-racking wins from the Springfield Millers in the season opener on Pelican Court Friday and Saturday nights.

The defending state champions subdued a serious Miller challenge to win 54-53 Saturday after coming from behind in the closing minutes Friday to grab a 48-44 triumph.

The victories marked wins number 29 and 30 in 31 games for KUHS and number one and two for coach Dean White who is in his first year as head of the Pel basketball team.

Saturday night the Pelicans, paced by big Bob Petersen, a veteran of the state championship squad, and Don DeLap overcame a five point deficit and at one time held a seven point bulge themselves as the lead swapped hands nine times during the test.

Playing a less nervous brand of ball than the night previously the Pels broke even with the Millers, 16-16 at the close of the first quarter then slipped to a 36-31 deficit at the half. At the close of the third stanza the Pels were out from 48-43 and seemed to be on their way.

It almost didn't work out that way. Little Ron Kelso, the sparkplug of the Springfield squad, singlehandedly boosted his club right back in the game as he narrowed the score to 54-53 with 30 seconds left.

In the closing seconds of the game the Pels were whistled down three times for traveling and that was all Kelso needed.

A jump ball with five seconds left gave the ball to the Pels and DeLap was fouled as he tried to stall. He missed the final free toss just as the horn sounded.

DeLap was the high scorer for the night with 15 while Springfield's Larry King, with 14, was 13, Kelso with 12, Pelican Bob Drace and Miller Fred Willis each with 10.

Following the game, jubilant coach White commented, "The squad looks as if they will be dangerous for any one we meet. They made mistakes — but they also did a 'lot of things right. I'd say we did 'it the hard way'."

He added, "I was not entirely pleased with our defense—but you can't take anything from the Miller's offense, especially that Kelso and Larry King. Springfield is a real well coached club—we may meet better teams but none will be any better coached. We played better ball tonight than last; both clubs did. Of course we may still make some adjustments."

The ding dong battle saw the Pels hit 21 of 60 tries from the field and the Millers hit 22 of 60. Petersen was the top rebounder for the game although the shorter Millers cleared the boards more total times.

Despite the fact that they had to do without the services of veteran Bob Petersen for better than a full quarter of the game Friday night the Pelicans climbed the "steep" hill in the closing seconds of the contest to eke out a narrow 48-44 victory over the determined Millers.

After moving out to a four point lead with 3:50 left in the ball game the Pels gave the Millers a chance to catch up; which they did with only 2:35 left. With 2 minutes left the Millers regained command at 44-42.

Dave DeLap stepped into the breach and calmly sank two free losses to retie the count with 1:35 remaining. Forty seconds later he was back at the free throw line and repeated the performance to give the Pels a 46-44 lead.

Here the Pels went into a half court stall and Miller Ron Kelso intentionally fouled Paul Bishop in order to give Springfield a chance at the ball.

Bishop neatly canned the two gibbies to put the icing on the cake with just five seconds left. The Millers cleared the board but the damage was done.

High scorer for the night was the Pelican's Don DeLap with 13 followed by Miller Don Johnson with 10. Kelso counted 10 for Springfield while the Pel's Jim Hall and Petersen shared the next position with Bill Karp and Fred Willis of Springfield; each of the four counting six.

Being overly cautious and conservative in the first quarter the Pels were on the short end of 4-0 count before Don DeLap and Dean Dunson collaborated to bring the score to 10-all at the close of the frame. Petersen collected two fouls in the period.

In the second stanza Don DeLap counted a two-pointer to give the Pels a 12-10 bulge but it didn't last as sophomore Miller reserve Fred Willis potted a pair of quick ones to snatch the lead again. Johnson, Karp and Willis contrived to give the Millers a six-point margin but Don DeLap and Bob Lewis kept the KU club in the game and at the half the scoreboard read Springfield 25, KU 23. Petersen collected his third personal in the frame.

In the third canto the Millers garnered their longest lead of the match as they moved out to 30-23 with three minutes gone. Petersen was awarded his fourth foul and

went to the bench two minutes later but Bishop, Bob Drace and Lewis went to work and slowly boosted the Pels to within one point, 34-33 at the whistle.

Thirty seconds after the start of the fourth frame Petersen headed for the showers with his fifth foul but not before Bishop had canned one from the outside to give the Pelicans the lead again. From here on it was anybody's ball game, almost.

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
