Scribes Eye Uniform Set Of Pigskin Rules

For the first time since the 1870s, college football operated under more than one set of rules in 1958. The National Assn. of Intercollegiate Athletics, composed mainly of smaller colleges, adopted a set that differed slightly from those of the national Collegiate Athletic Assn.

Then there was another set of rules for high schools and one for the pros and some colleges were required to follow different rules in different games.

It was a confusing situation at best and today sports writers and broadcasters stand a firm vote against its continuation.

Nearly 200 sports writers and broadcasters were asked in the Associated Press post-season questionnaire to voice their reaction to the double-rule situation in college football. They also were asked if they thought all football rules — from high school right up to the pro game — should be standardized.

More than half voted "yes" on both questions, but there was a vast difference in the reactions to the two.

On the matter of uniform college rules, 125 writers and broadcasters favored a single code. Only 19 approved having two different ones, most of them pointing out that large colleges and small ones had different problems. The rest — about 50 — expressed no opinion at all.

Several said they had seen college teams play only under NCAA rules and one commented: "Didn't know it."

A dozen writers expressed preference for the NCAA code, with its limited substitutions and two-point conversion. Seven said all colleges should adopt the NAIA code.

The vote on standardized rules was 106 yes and 71 no, but there were many "yes-but" and otherwise qualified answers.

There was a strong undercurrent of feeling that younger, lighter and less mature high school players should be protected by the rules.

"They are not as sturdy at 150 as they are at 240," one writer commented.

This was one reason why most of the 71 negative voters preferred separate codes.

One of the big objections to the present multiple setup was that high schools and some colleges have free substitution and platoon football, most colleges have limited substitution and two-way players and the pros platoon to the limit. This, many experts pointed out, hampers the development of a player as he advances.

Another objection was that having four sets of rules confuses the spectators.

One writer summed it up: "It's a complicated game at its best but four different sets of rules have added to its woes." Another added: "A pro fan who sees one college game a year comes away convinced the officials are nuts."

KU Frosh Blast Bly JV's 65-26

Every player on coach Bob Johnson's bench saw action Tuesday night as his Klamath Union frosh basketball team bombarded the Bly Jayvees 65-26 in a preliminary to the Bly-Wildcat game on Pelican Court.

Paced by a pair of sharpshooters, Garys, Patzke and Buchholz, the baby Pels leaped out to a 13-4 first quarter bulge, stretched it to 24-10 at the halfway mark, 41-19 at the three-quarter pole, then notched 24 markers in the fourth period while holding the tiring Bobkittens to a meager seven.

Patzke and Buchholz each potted 10, while teammate Bob Dearing was next with eight. Bill Hall was high for the young Bobcats with six.

The shape of things to come began to appear in the County B League basketball race Tuesday night as four of the entrants matched talents in league contests while the other four mixed it up in "non-counters."

The win-minded Merrill Huskies slipped into a tie for first place with the Bly Bobcats by pounding a convincing 52-39 win over the Malin Mustangs; the loss plummeting the Mustangs to the basement.

In the other corner the Chiloquin Panthers staged a come-from-behind victory, 47-46, over the Bonanza Antlers on the Chiloquin court.

Non-conference tests saw the Bly Bobcats give the powerful KU Sophomore Wildcats all they wanted to handle before bowing 58-50 on Pelican Court while at Henley the Hornets regained their winning form by powdering the Sacred Heart Trojans 55-43. The loss to Henley is not charged against the Trojans as far as the league ladder is concerned. Henley, the only A2 school in the county, will play a full league schedule with the B's but will get their only playoff chance in the Little Rogue Conference.

Chiloquin Nabs Win

The Panthers overcame a 13-point halftime deficit to collect their second win in three league starts as Paul Harris potted a long one from the side in the last 15 seconds of the game to give Chiloquin a 47-46 edge over the Antlers.

Bonanza had the big first half while the Antlers' chance came in the last two stanzas. Only fractions separated the overall percentage comparisons.

After a 9-all count at the quarter post, the Antlers roared out a 30-17 lead at intermission. By the end of the third frame, the Antlers, paced by John Ochoa and Ron Hogarth who each counted 12 points, had moved up to within one marker, 34-33.

Merrill 52, Malin 39

Merrill added another win to its unbeaten string as they carved out a 52-39 victory over the Mustangs on the Malin court. The Malin loss was the second suffered at the hands of the Huskies this season. Their last meeting ended in 44-43 decision.

Led by high pointer Bud Maupin, the Huskies scrambled off to 13-3 bulge in the first period and then relaxed a shade to see the half end on a 24-16 count.

The Mustangs, encouraged by the fact that they had moved to within four points shortly before the close of the half, came back in the third to once more narrow the count to the same point, however the Huskies took hold again and the frame ended 39-30 for Merrill.

Rick Illian was high for the Mustangs with nine tallies; Maupin, with 13, was top gunner while John Haskins and sophomore Bruce Brickner added 11 and 10 respectively.

Both clubs used a zone defense and notched almost identical percentages from the foul line; the big difference was in the field goal department.
