Charges Dropped Against Fireman

Charges against Stanley Hasey, a 48-year-old city fireman accused of delinquency to a minor, were dropped in circuit court because complaining witnesses refused to testify against him.

District Attorney Arthur Beddoe said both the minor girl involved and her mother signed affidavits to the effect they would not appear in court as witnesses against Hasey.

They, however, were the persons who brought charges against him, the district attorney said. Hasey was named in a secret indictment returned by the November grand jury, accused of having intimate relations with a teen-aged girl.

He subsequently was released on \$2,500 bond.

Appraisal Slated For High School

DUNSMUIR — Appraisal of the high school curriculum and the school plant under a program set up by the California Association of Secondary School Administrators will begin this week at the Dunsmuir Joint Union High School.

The school board will meet on Wednesday evening as the administrative committee. Other data will be gathered from the students, faculty members and other high school employees in preparation for a meeting March 6 with the evaluation committee of the state association.

The purpose of this appraisal is to provide a base for curriculum development, provide organized data for interpreting the program to the community and provide a basis for a new accreditation program, Delwin Poe, superintendent explained.

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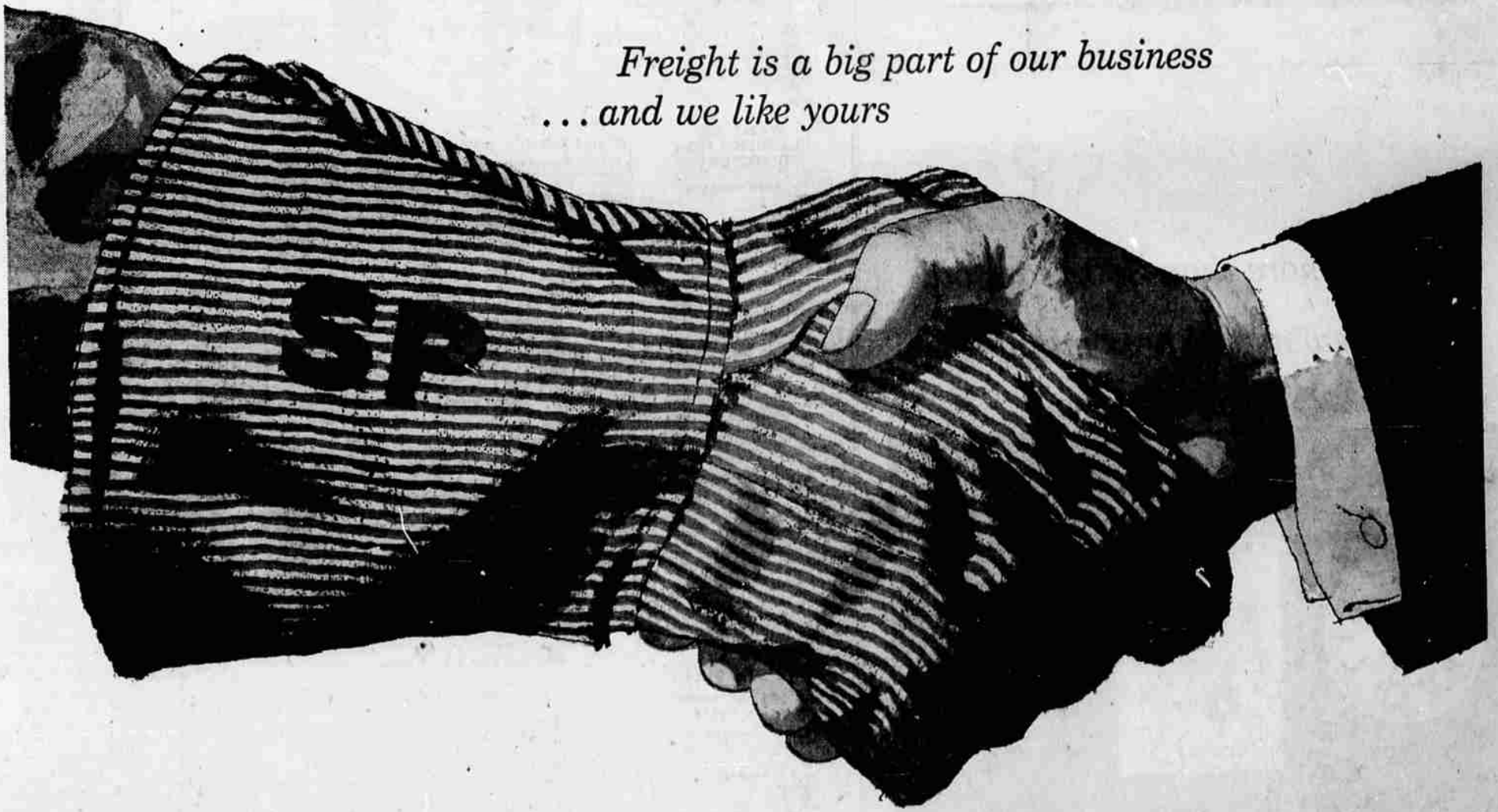
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
