Summer Near In Antarctic

McMURDO SOUND, Antarctica (AP)—The weather in this part of Antarctica is comparatively mild in the summer, which is approaching its peak here. The average temperature during the past two Januarys was 26. Once, in January 1957, it went to 40. The minimum that month was 10.

At the South Pole, some 800 miles from here, it's a different story. Year before last, somebody at the pole recorded 102.1 below zero.

The warmest it's ever been at the pole, since humans began poking around there, is 7 above zero. This happened during a heat wave last year.

McMurdo is only a few feet above sea level. In the summer it is not uncommon to see men walking about camp here in wool shirts, light shoes and then caps with the ear flaps loose. Even in summer, however, the wind can become a hostile intruder, snapping the warmth out of the air and piercing bare cheeks and ears.

In the winter, when the sun quits the sky altogether, McMurdo is invested with something less than a resort atmosphere. It was 47.9 below zero one day last August.

Nobody seems to know exactly how much it snows here. The stuff gets blown around so much it's difficult to measure. One guess is that the average is 15 inches a year — considerably less than in many parts of the United States.
