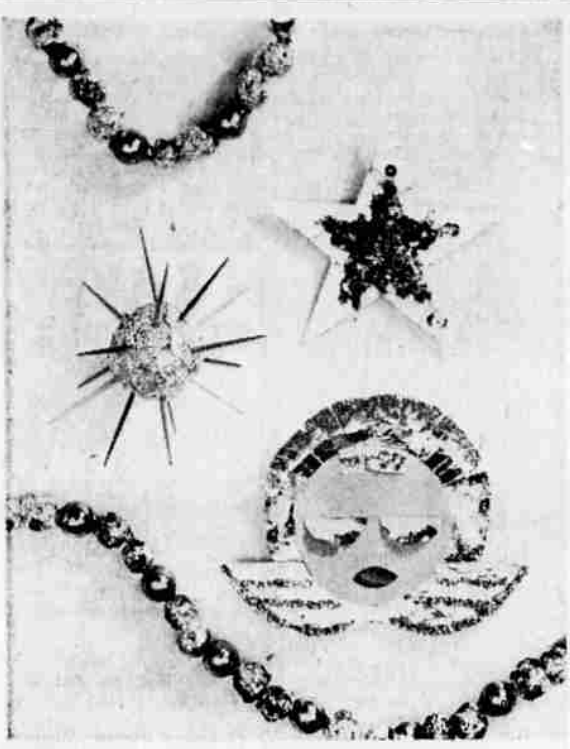

FOIL FUN

Making gay trimmings for the Christmas tree and decorating the home is something the whole family enjoys. Everyone gathers around a big table. . . . Father stands by, ready to help with the hanging, and the youngest children are delighted to cut and snip at gay materials for hours on end. There are wonderful sparkling things you can easily make . . . stars to hang from the Christmas tree branches, necklaces to drape, little cherubs that can fly; even shining "satellites" to orbit around the tree. All are made from aluminum foil embellished with bright things likely to be in last year's box of leftover trimmings or which can be purchased inexpensively at the store. We've used "glitter" to decorate the foil ornaments . . . this is the inexpensive material sold in kits, containing several vials of the glitter powder and tubes of all-purpose glue. It is fun to use . . . just draw designs with the glue, shake on the glitter and it will adhere. Here is the way to make these sparkling and beautiful ornaments: Sparkling Chain: Make small balls about the size of a marble, by crushing foil. You can use leftover foil from the kitchen. Rub each one with glue-all; then roll in glitter. When you have a lot of them, use a needle and thread to string them. Alternate small Christmas balls with the foil balls—cranberries and popcorn too—for a sparkling version of the old-fashioned garland. Christmas Star: Cut stars from heavy paper or lightweight cardboard. Cover with foil. Rub with glue-all and sprinkle on glitter. Shake to remove excess. Cherub: Cut a round circle of heavy paper—pink paper or white, colored with pink crayon. Cut a small circle of foil and fold in half. Fringe with the scissors; then cut in half. Paste each half in position to make eyes. Cut the mouth from red paper and the hair from a small strip of foil. For the wings, cut two circles of foil a little larger than the face. Fold in half and paste in back of the face with glue-all. For the halo, cut two circles, one a little larger than the other. Fringe the edges and paste in back of the face. Decorate the halo and the wings with glitter as shown in the photograph. "Satellite": Make a ball by crushing aluminum foil. Decorate with glue-all and glitter. Stick it with colored cocktail tooth picks. To Hang Ornaments: Use black sewing thread. Attach a small length of thread to back of ornaments by placing a drop of glue-all over end of thread. Let dry thoroughly or use cellophane tape. To hang "satellite," tie thread to a common pin and stick in ball.

ARRANGED on this snack table is a platter of crispy "ABC Patties." They are Philadelphia cream cheese balls rolled in ABC letters and stuck on pretzels. The alphabet oat cereal spells out Happy Holiday on the star gelatin mold. The cereal becomes tasty nibbling fare in the sleigh when it is buttered and seasoned with curry powder, celery salt and a dash of liquid smoke. Alpha-Bits

Something new and easy to do! Just what you'll want for your snack tray when young friends come calling Christmas Day.

You'll set a light-hearted mood when you start with these confections, called "ABC Patties," made with crispy little alphabet oat cereal letters. A cute sight to look upon—and easy to make—are these patties which combine this new cereal with melted marshmallows and peanut butter.

You can count on this cereal, too, for spelling out holiday greetings on molded desserts or cakes. And, for another quick snack idea,

try rolling cream cheese—which, incidentally you can tint to suit the occasion with a few drops of food coloring—in the ABC cereal. Then with toothpicks stick them on large rosy apples.

Gay snacks, all of these!

ALPHABET CHEESE BALLS
1 package (3 ounces) cream cheese
1/2 teaspoon grated orange rind (optional)
1 or 2 drops food coloring (optional)
1/2 to 3/4 cup alphabet oat cereal

Combine cream cheese, orange rind, and food coloring, mixing well. Form cheese into 4 balls. Roll

in cereal. Serve at once with fruit or salad greens.

ABC PATTIES
1 1/2 cups marshmallows
1 tablespoon water
1/2 cup peanut butter
2 cups alphabet oat cereal

Combine marshmallows and water in top of a double boiler. Heat over hot water until marshmallows are melted. Blend well. Remove from heat. Add peanut butter and 1 cup of the cereal, mixing well. Sprinkle wax paper with 1/2 cup cereal. Drop peanut butter mixture 1/2 teaspoonfuls onto the cereal. Sprinkle with remaining 1/2 cup cereal. Cool. Makes 14 to 16 patties.

YAM FRITTERS
Combine 2 cups biscuit mix, 1/4 teaspoon allspice, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg, 1 egg (beaten) and 2-3 cup milk and mix lightly. Fold in 1/4 cups diced, cooked yams (or 1 one-pound can). Drop by spoonfuls into hot deep oil (375 degrees) and cook 2-4 minutes or until lightly browned on all sides. Drain on absorbent paper towel.

HOUSEHOLD HINT
Apply a small cross patch of cellophane tape over the exact spot on your plastered wall in which you want to drive a nail or tack to hold a picture. Then hammer the nail in and you will not have cracked the plaster.

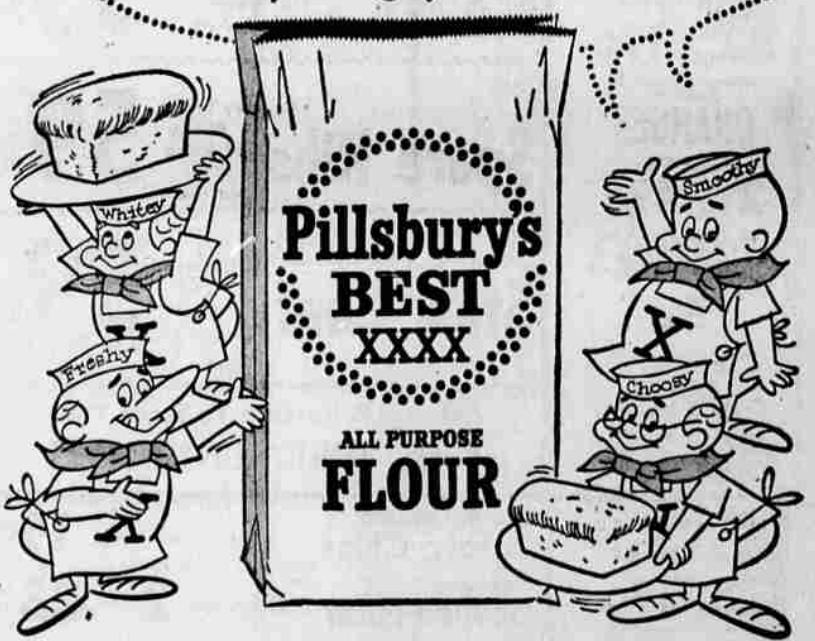
