Underground Atomic Tests Promise New Science Info

WASHINGTON (AP)—Underground atomic tests in Nevada last fall promise to improve scientists' picture of distant earthquakes and add to their knowledge of the earth's crust.

One Nevada explosion Oct. 30 shook delicate instruments far away in Japan, Sweden, Peru and Czechoslovakia.

The first figures on the recording of this and three other blasts in the underground series were given to a reporter by earthquake sleuths of the U.S. Coast and Geodetic Survey.

The Oct. 30 shot, code-named Blanca, was the biggest. It packed a wallop equal to 3,000 tons of TNT. It jiggled seismographs 5,500 miles away.

In the United States and Canada most of 110 regular and temporary seismology stations recorded it.

Reports on the three earlier and smaller tests came only from United States territory. However, one of them—equivalent to the

Christmas Business Hikes, But No Runaway Predicted

NEW YORK (AP)—Christmas business will equal last year's and may be a little better, but it's not running away.

This cautiously phrased comment from M. E. Arnet, vice president of Bullock's Department Store in Los Angeles, typifies the attitude of hundreds of retailers across the country interviewed by The Associated Press in a survey of Christmas business prospects.

Most are confident of beating last year's record totals (thanks in part to slightly higher prices and an extra shopping day). But few see anything that resembles a real boom.

"There's more cash in town this year," says Charles E. Boyd of the Detroit Chamber of Commerce, "but people aren't spending the money."

A clinical spot on the 1958 Christmas retail scene is Texas. "There's no doubt but that the buying public has the money and a disposition to spend it," declares a merchant in Fort Worth. "To say business is good is putting it mildly, for if it gets any better it will be terrific."

And an Abilene, Tex., store official states: "If it was any better I don't know what I'd do."

Immunity Argument Slated By Six Alabama Officials

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—Six Alabama officials will argue their immunity Jan. 5 to a U.S. district judge who ordered them to answer Negro charges of discrimination before the U.S. Civil Rights Commission.

A state judge and five voter registrars, who refused to testify at the federal agency's inquiry here last week, had been ordered to produce records and submit to questioning at the next hearing.

The sixth official whose defiance brought federal subpoenas is Circuit Judge George Wallace. He was subpoenaed to produce the Barbour and Bullock records, which he had impounded. He refused even to appear before the civil rights agency.

Disobedience at the second commission inquiry would be at the risk of possible jail terms for contempt of court.

Builder Paid Union Money Constructing Beck Homes

TACOMA, Wash. (AP)—A contractor paid in union money for building five houses for Dave Beck said the former Teamsters union boss told him to make the deposits in his bank account in the thousands of dollars, in the greater number of cases, Lindsay testified, the deposits were Teamsters Union checks.

Government attorneys have contended that Lindsay was paid some \$100,000 of union money.

Lad Who Confessed Thefts Was Actually In Hospital

TACOMA, Wash. (AP)—Three King County sheriff's officers in Seattle Tuesday said he killed Gregory during a holdup of the killing of a grocer in a grocery store at the Western State Hospital at the time of the slaying, the institution's clinical director said Wednesday.

Dr. Robert W. Brown said at a news conference that he was called to the hospital where McLain was a patient, a special "incident report" turned in the night of Nov. 1, 1957, and the hospital's daily report for the 24-hour period ended at 7 a.m.

He said there wasn't "the slightest chance" that all three of the independent records were erroneous.

PORTLAND (AP)—Mines detectors and divers may be pressed into the search for a Portland family of five missing since Dec. 1.

Sheriff Joe Shobe of Clackamas County said the Navy has been asked to send skin divers to search the pool behind North Fork Dam on the Clackamas River.

And Portland General Electric Co., which built the dam, said it would supply detectors to detect mine if a car had plunged into the reservoir.

The search so far has failed to uncover a trace of Mr. and Mrs. Ken Martin and their young daughters.

The family vanished after setting out to find a Christmas tree.

Conductor Accepts Bid

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP)—Piero Bellugi, who has been offered the job as Portland Symphony Orchestra conductor, said Wednesday he accepted tentatively an offer to conduct the San Diego Symphony Orchestra.

Bellugi, who now conducts the Oakland symphony, was presented a concert in San Diego on Dec. 12, according to Mrs. Paul Feldensheimer, Portland and Symphony Society president.

He said he was offered the San Diego position Tuesday night after the Oakland symphony presented a concert in San Diego.

Portland is looking for a successor to Theodore Bloomfield, leaving to conduct the Rochester, N.Y., symphony.

PNW Schools Win Honor

PORTLAND (AP)—Four Oregon schools were among 350 universities and colleges across the nation chosen as sites next summer for institutes to train high school mathematics and science instructors.

The National Science Foundation provided a 21-million dollar grant for the work.

The men named to direct the institutes and the schools are: Robert W. Marston, biology, University of Oregon; Max B. Williams, chemistry, Stanford; H. Hillebrand, zoology, Albert R. Poole, mathematics, and Stanley E. Williamson, science education, Oregon State College; Kenneth E. Davis, physics, and Burrows Hunt, mathematics, Reed College; and Robert Remper, mathematics, Portland State College.
