LAFAYETTE, Ind. (UPI) - A resurgence of interest in religion on the nation's college campuses has been noted by vice president James A. Lewis of the University of Michigan. ## Molybdenum Fertilizer Shows Mixed Promise

Molybdenum fertilizers may increase crop yields under some conditions in Oregon but also may be toxic to livestock under other conditions, reports a team of Oregon State College Agricultural Experiment Station scientists. OSC scientists this week completed an intensive summary of molybdenum research results in Oregon and elsewhere in an attempt to point out the possible advantages and disadvantages of the chemical under different conditions.

Applications of small amounts of molybdenum have increased legume yields on some acid soils in Oregon and hold considerable promise once science has nailed down proper methods of using it without posing hazards to livestock that eat the forage. Standard practice for boosting legume crop yields on such soil has been through liming.

OSC findings and judgments on the molybdenum problem are summarized in a new publication issued this week by the agricultural experiment station and now available from local county extension service offices. Copies may also be obtained from the Oregon State College bulletin clerk, Corvallis.

## Funds Granted OSC To Give Teacher Institutes In 1959

OREGON STATE COLLEGE - Oregon State College has been selected by the National Science Foundation to give four special institutes next summer for 190 U.S. high school and college teachers. Grants totaling \$225,000 have been given the college to finance the training.

The institutes are part of the nationwide program sponsored by NSF to improve science and mathematics teaching and to increase the U.S. supply of top-flight scientists and teachers.

OSC has been a national leader in the program from the start. It was one of only 16 colleges in the country picked to launch the academic-year institutes two years ago and was selected to offer three summer institutes this past year.

Two of the four 1959 summer institutes at OSC will be for college teachers and two for high school teachers.

The college institutes will include an eight-week training program for 50 biology teachers and a six-week institute for 50 chemistry teachers. High school teacher institutes will include an eight-week training session for 50 science and mathematics teachers and an eight-week institute for 40 math teachers.

Leaders of the institutes will be Dr. Howard H. Hilemann, zoology; Dr. Max B. Williams, chemistry; Dr. Stanley E. Williamson, science education; and Dr. A. R. Poole, mathematics. Special courses of study are planned in each area. Teachers picked to attend eight-

week institutes will receive grants of \$600 plus tuition and fees and dependent and travel allowances. The six-week institute grants are \$450 plus the other allowances.

All U.S. high school and college teachers will receive information about the OSC institutes and the more than 300 planned at other institutions across the nation. They will then have an opportunity to apply at the school of their choice.

Fifty high school science and mathematics teachers from 19 other states are currently taking the academic-year institute training at OSC.

Reactions of both plants and animals to molybdenum are keyed to a variety of complex conditions—soil acidity, available molybdenum, sulfur, phosphorus, iron and manganese and copper in the soil, and molybdenum, copper and sulfate sulfur in the feed. The publication sets forth advantages and disadvantages of the chemical in a detailed "question and answer" section. Farmers interested in using molybdenum are advised to first study these questions and consult with their county agent.

### PEP UP PEPPERS

NEW YORK (UPI) - French fried green peppers add variety to meals. Cut off tops and remove seeds and cores. Cut in 1/4-inch rings. Combine 6 tablespoons fine dry bread crumbs with 1 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese. Dip pepper rings in crumbs, then in 1 beaten egg, then again in crumbs. Chill at least 1 hour. Fry in deep fat heated to 375 degrees. Drain on paper toweling.
