

NY Has 11 Hangmen

Giants Win Eastern Crown

NEW YORK (AP) — Notre Dame had its Four Horsemen, Fordham its Seven Blocks of Granite. Now we have the 11 Hangmen of the New York football Giants.

The 11 Hangmen who form the defensive unit of the Giants, tightened the noose around the neck of Jimmy Brown Sunday afternoon and sprung the trap on Coach Paul Brown's Cleveland Browns.

Because of their inspired defensive play and the opportunistic offense of Chuck Conerly, Frank Gifford, Alex Webster and Co., the Giants have won the Eastern Conference title of the National Football League.

The 10-0 shutout of Cleveland engineered by Conerly's first touchdown of the season—on a lateral from a double reverse—

and Pat Summerall's 13th field goal, sent the Giants into the championship game next Sunday with the Baltimore Colts.

FURIOUS ATTACK The title game also will be played at Yankee Stadium, scene of the Giants' two exciting games with the Browns. It will be carried on network television (NBC) with New York and a 75-mile area blacked out. The Giants are braced for a furious attack from would-be ticket buyers. There was no advance sale.

Once again it was the grudging defense of the 11 hangmen that thrilled the icy crowd of 61,274. They sang the praises of Conerly, Gifford and Webster, but most of all they roared approval for the 11 hangmen who carried out so expertly the pattern designed by

Tom Landry, the defensive coach. The Giants' four-man defensive line was tremendous. Andy Robustelli and Jim Katcavage at the ends and Rosey Grier and Dick (Little Mo) Modzelewski at the tackles simply wrecked the Cleveland offense. With Sam Huff backing up the middle, taking dead aim at the great Jimmy Brown, and Cliff Livingston and Harland Svare adding their brawn as linebackers rushing Jimmy Brown, who set a league record with 1,327 yards in regular season play, was held to eight yards in seven carries.

EXCELLENT JOB The alert deep defense of Lindon Crow (the intercepted two), Carl Karlvicz, Jim Patton and Em Tunnell turned in an excellent job when Cleveland's badly rushed passers took to the air. Milk Plum, who was injured in the first half, and Jim Ninowski, completed 10 of 27.

But all the defense in the world wouldn't have helped the Giants if they hadn't been able to score. The only touchdown was a tricky thing on a frozen field, an 18-yard play late in the first period.

Conerly took the ball from center and handed off to Webster, coming around from right halfback. Webster gave it to Gifford, reversing from his left halfback spot. Gifford cut through the right side of the line to the 10 and then tossed a basketball-type lateral that carried about 15 or 20 yards to Conerly, who went all the way.

"I don't know when I scored before," said Conerly, the 37-year-old quarterback from Ole Miss who has thrown 144 touchdowns passes.

"It was something new we put in this week," said Conerly. "The lateral on the end was optional. I'm out there and he (Gifford) knows I'm there."

The Giants' other points came on Summerall's 26-yard field goal, set up by a 35-yard pass from Conerly to Bob Schnelker.

Jimmy Brown simply was defended right out of the ballpark, with Huff his particular tormentor.

"That's the end of Brown for this year and am I glad," said Huff as friends crowded around his locker.

In the other clubhouse, Jimmy had no excuses. "They just played even harder than last week, more determined," he said.

Coach Paul Brown, whose Browns were blanked for the first time since 1950 and beaten three times by the same team for the first time in any one season, was generous with praise.

"You saw a fine team today, men," he said. "It was a tough, hard nosed game. We were just overpowered in the line. They had a full head of steam up. We had to pass and it had to be excellent. We weren't excellent."

PRASED LANDRY Coach Jim Lee Howell, already "scared to death" about the title game with Baltimore, couldn't say enough in praise of Landry's work with the defensive unit.

"They played the best defensive ball I ever saw a club play against a real good team," said Howell.

Terry Brennan Fired As ND Grid Coach

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP)—Joe Kuharich, coach of the professional Washington Redskins, has been named to replace Terry Brennan as head coach of the Notre Dame football team, Athletic Director Edward Mooney announced today.

Krause told the Indianapolis News in a telephone conversation that Kuharich has agreed to a four-year contract and will come here Tuesday for a talk with Brennan's assistants. No contract terms were announced.

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP)—Terry Brennan, Notre Dame's sixth football coach since the death of Knute Rockne in 1931, was fired Sunday night after a five-year record of 32 victories and 18 defeats.

No definite reason was given for the dismissal other than the action had been recommended to Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh, C.S.C., president of Notre Dame, by the faculty board in control of athletics.

Father Hesburgh, who said he accepted the board's recommendation "with great reluctance," gave no indication who would succeed Brennan.

The Associated Press, however, learned that Joe Kuharich, who coached the Irish from 1935-37 and was freshman coach in 1938, will take over. Kuharich, a native of South Bend, is currently head coach of the professional Washington Redskins with whom he recently signed a five-year contract.

Kuharich could not be reached for comment but George Preston Marshall, owner of the Redskins, said "I don't know anything about it—I ought to hear something in the morning."

Other names which popped up included Frank Leahy, Brennan's predecessor; Bernie Crummins, former Indiana coach and one of Brennan's assistants; Hugh Devore, who coached the Irish in 1945 while Leahy was on military leave and has been a Brennan assistant, and Andy Pliney, Tulane's head coach.

Brennan, 30, who admitted having known of his dismissal for a couple of days, said he did not know whom his successor would be but added "I can only say it will not be someone at Notre Dame."

Brennan said he is not sure what his plans are but "I'd like to remain in coaching. It all happened so fast, I haven't had time to reflect. I'll think about it for a couple of days and decide after that."

Although he experienced only one losing season, Brennan's stay at Notre Dame was turbulent. After a successful tenure with Mt. Carmel High School in Chicago where his teams won an unprecedented three straight city championships, Brennan went to Notre Dame as freshman coach in 1933.

Early in 1934, he was named to succeed Leahy who quit with a record of 87-11-9 — second only to Rockne's 105-12-5.

Because Brennan was only 25 then, there was some rumbling but this died out quickly when Notre Dame finished with a 9-1 record, losing only to Purdue. In 1935, Notre Dame had a respectable 8-2 record.

Then came what actually started Brennan's downfall. Notre Dame completed the 1936 season with two victories and eight defeats.

The wolves were howling but Brennan bounced back in 1937 with a 7-3 which included victories over Army and Oklahoma. With the entire squad back this year great things were expected. However, the Irish lost to Army, Purdue, Pitt and Iowa and finished with a 6-4 record.
