Things Will Be Better If 7-Year Plan Success

MOSCOW (UPI) — If Russia's new seven-year plan to be launched next year succeeds, the Soviet citizen will be somewhat better off in 1965 than he was in 1958.

He will have more food and clothing, shorter work hours and more elbow room. His children will have only eight instead of ten years of compulsory schooling.

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But the political developments of 1958 in the USSR do not give hope of lessening tensions in 1959.

City police said a truck driven by Edgar J. Gifford, 3440 Cottage Avenue, collided with the city pickup driven by Roy Harris, 2247 Applegate Avenue, at 8:21 a.m. Monday at the intersection of Oak and Broad streets.

Police also were asked to look for a 1950 Chevrolet flat bed truck which Jerry Edgerton Gaither of Red Bluff, said he had taken from his employers, the Fair Market in Red Bluff, a few days ago.

Police in Oregon City messaged that Gaither had confessed taking the truck and \$52. He said he abandoned the truck on Klamath Avenue here after the block cracked. But a look up and down the avenue produced no such truck.

Youths To Be Sentenced On Charges Of Vagrancy

Three youths arrested after a gang fight at The Oasis on South U.S. 97 December 20 appear before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor for sentencing Tuesday.

The trio pleaded guilty to vagrancy charges before the judge Monday. They were Richard Herbers, Dennis Crane and Robert Bramwell, all 18.

Officers said the trio was arrested by state police after the fight in a parking lot and were released to their parents pending hearing. Herrera was lodged briefly in the county jail. The sentencing was scheduled for 1 p.m. Tuesday.

Other district court cases: William Robert Brehm, 21, 5305 South Sixth Street, was sentenced Tuesday to 15 days in jail and a \$100 fine after having been found guilty of driving during a suspended period.

KF Officer Finds Answer

When Officer Ray Howard of city police called in two teen-age boys in connection with a burglary last week, he soon found that a number of crimes, extending back months in time and including several which had never been reported to police, were in the process of being solved.

The boys, one 14, the other 15, were called out of school for questioning in connection with the December 20 burglary of the H. E. Fyeatt residence, 1502 Austin Street, in which the contents of a plaster of paris bank were taken.

Officers say that the boys eventually admitted this burglary and then went on to confess to two December 7 burglaries: one of half a pie and some \$3 in change from the James Anderson residence, 2253 Reclamation Avenue, the other of a watch from the Roy Galoway home, 909 Division Street.

Police also report that the boys confessed to stealing \$5 from meter pay boxes, taking the money out of envelopes which they destroyed.

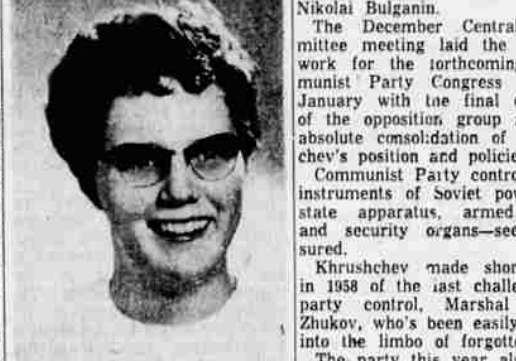
The boys also allegedly admitted their implication, separately or together, in several instances of joyriding in other people's cars and theft, as well as in other burglaries, including some in the surrounding area.

Both boys were being held Monday at the juvenile home. Juvenile Officer Francis Mathews said that he expected their hearings would be scheduled for early in January.

Pair Taken To Prison — The sheriff's office sponsored some free transportation between Klamath Falls and Salem Saturday and Sunday under the supervision of Deputy Sheriff Delbert Summers.

Northbound, to the Oregon State Penitentiary, went Ethel Mae Lugo, 25, Chiloquin, and Earl Nolte, 30, Klamath Falls. Miss Lugo was recently sentenced to one year in prison after being found guilty in circuit court on a charge of assault and battery. Nolte was recently given two years on a charge of burglary, not in a dwelling, to which he pleaded guilty in circuit court. The two prisoners left here with Summers on Saturday and arrived in Salem on Sunday, somewhat delayed by the bad weather.

Returning here with Summers on Sunday was Clifford Barkley, 45, Chiloquin. He was released to the deputy's custody by the state hospital in order to come here for sentencing on a charge of statutory rape. The charge involved a July 30 attack on a 4-year-old girl, to which the prisoner pleaded guilty in circuit court before being sent to the hospital for observation. Date of his sentencing will shortly be set by Judge David R. Vandenberg.

Orb's Radio To Die Soon — WASHINGTON (AP) — America's Atlas satellite is expected to slip in orbit more than twice as long as the 20 days first predicted.

But the radio voice which relayed President Eisenhower's recorded message of peace and good will to the world is expected to die within the next 10 days.

The Defense Department now says the 8,000-pound Atlas may continue to orbit until about Feb. 1.

The Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory at Cambridge, Mass., says most watchers in the United States should be able to see the Atlas during the next few days.

Smithsonian Moonwatch teams have estimated the Atlas has brightness ranging up to the brightest star in the heavens, depending on distance.
