

# OTI Owls Minus Players; Pels Open Conference Play

Klamath Union High School opens District 6A1 basketball competition this weekend, while the Oregon Tech Owls limp out of town for a three-game road trip that takes them to Salt Lake City and Ontario.

Captain Dean White's Pelicans, riding the crest of a four-game winning streak, take on Grants Pass (4-2) here Friday night, then travel to Medford, 15-0, for another conference clash Saturday evening.

Wally Palmberg's Mile High Campus Owls, staggering from blows thrown by injuries, ineptitudes and draft boards, meet Westminster College in Salt Lake City Friday and Saturday nights, then return to Ontario Monday for a return meeting with Northwest Nazarene.

The Owls basketball picture took a sudden turn for the worse Monday.

Palmberg received five big jolts.

1. Arnold Metcalf, 6-4 forward who became eligible to play at the end of fall term, received his draft induction notice and is to report for duty January 7.
2. Charlie Genter, 6-1 forward, finished his commercial arts course at the close of fall term, and decided to stay in Portland and work the remainder of the year. He may return to finish out his football eligibility next fall.
3. Troy Koonz, 6-3 freshman forward who was coming along in fine fashion, informed Palmberg by letter Monday he had fallen and injured his knee during Christmas vacation and has been sent to bed under doctor's orders. He twisted the same knee in the last OTI basketball game against Northwest Nazarene.
4. Ardell Hamilton, the team's leading scorer with 80 points in six games, failed to pass the 12 required hours and is ineligible this coming term.
5. Big Paul Layher, 6-7 center, is still limping on a badly swollen ankle, which he turned in the first meeting with Northwest Nazarene. The injury has failed to respond to treatment and if Layher is ready to go, he will be limited in effort.

With all this bitter news, Palmberg set out Monday and Tuesday in hopes of rebuilding some sort of a starting lineup out of what's left. The Owls are holding two-a-day drills preparing for the road trip. The club will leave early Thursday morning, stopping in Elko, Nevada that night.

Pelican coach White's biggest problem, other than having to make a decision as to whom his starters will be this weekend, is the mumps. The malady has claimed one of his players, Paul Bishop, already this week and the threat of the spreading trouble is casting a shadow over the remainder of the squad. On the brighter side of the picture, however, is the possible return to work Wednesday of Bob Drace who has been down with a severe tooth infection.

The tempo has quickened noticeably on the Pel practice court since the Pelicans shook down their Christmas dinners and reported back to work. Practices are being held daily at 10 a.m. New Year's Day being no exception. The KU club will report for a shooting drill Thursday afternoon.

Still undecided as to who might be the best possible combination to pit against the Cavemen, White must choose between Bob Peterson (6-4), Bob Lewis (6-5), Don DeLap (5-11), Bishop (6-2), Jim Hall (6-2), Bob Drace (6-3), Dave DeLap (5-11), and Dean Dunson (6-0). Each of the above-mentioned has seen action as a starter in one of the Pel's preceding four victories.

Throughout the past four days the Pel mentor has alternated all of his available players in his offensive patterns.

In piling up their four victories against no defeats in the season thus far the Pels have scored 224 points while their opponents have potted 216. Grants Pass, over a six-game route, has counted 307 while their foe have collected 254. Medford, also undefeated, has notched 283 tallies while allowing their competition 231 in five contests.

According to the "experts" the weekend clashes are important tests as far as an indication of what may be expected in the ensuing season. The three clubs are rated almost on a par, with Medford given a slight edge.

## Coach, Player Pass Markers

A couple of milestones have been reached by Paul Arizin and Red Auerbach in the National Basketball Assn.

Arizin, the Philadelphia Warriors' sharpshooter, passed the 10,000 point mark in the NBA, and Boston Coach Red Auerbach was presented with his 500th NBA victory by Bob Cousy.

The Philadelphia star, a 30-year-old ex-Marine, joined a select group of 4 in the 10,000-plus club when he clicked for 25 points in leading the Warriors to a disputed 95-93 victory over Minneapolis in the first game of a doubleheader at St. Louis Monday night.

St. Louis, paced as usual by towering Bob Pettit, whipped Cincinnati in the second contest, 124-112. That move the Hawks 5 1/2 games in front of Detroit in the Western Division. Boston pulled 4 1/2 games ahead of New York in the East with its 107-105 triumph over Syracuse on Cousy's 5 points in the last 90 seconds.

Arizin was just five points short of five figures when he went against Minneapolis. He pumped in 25. That put him into the elite set with George Mikan, the retired Minneapolis great, Dolph Schayes of Syracuse, Ed Macauley, now coach of the St. Louis Hawks, and Cousy.

## Jordan Clear On Dope Rap

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Don Jordan, world welterweight champion, has been cleared by the district attorney's office in a narcotics possession case.

Jordan and four others were arrested Sunday in a car in which police said they found a smoldering marijuana cigarette.

The newly crowned 147-pound champ, who won his title by beating Virgil Akins, denied any knowledge of the cigarette. "If I had known there was any marijuana in that car I wouldn't have been riding in it," he said.

The district attorney's office also declined to issue complaints against three others in the car: boxer Javier Sanchez, 24, Mexican; Pete Padilla, 19, driver; and George Chavez, 21, a fourth youth, Richard Holman, 18, will be charged with narcotics possession, the district attorney said.

## Richardson, Olmedo Rally In Doubles Win

BRISBANE, Australia (AP) — America's Hain Richardson and Alex Olmedo made a dramatic — almost impossible — comeback just when all seemed lost today and won the doubles over Mal Anderson and Neale Fraser to move within one step of recapturing the Davis Cup from Australia.

Behind two sets and their backs squarely up against the wall, Richardson, the No. 1 U.S. player, and Olmedo, the borrowed Peruvian, won an exhausting four-hour marathon 10-12, 3-6, 16-14, 6-3, 7-5.

The triumph gave the underdog Yanks a 2-1 lead in the best-of-five competition and put them in a favorable position to clinch the international tennis trophy in the final singles Wednesday.

Olmedo, who scored a sensational first-day victory over Anderson, will play Wimbledon champion Ashley Cooper in the first match, while Barry MacKay of Dayton, Ohio, will meet weary, harried Anderson in the final set, 6-3, 7-5.

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## Kentucky '5' Runs Streak To 9 Straight

Add St. John's (N.Y.), Oklahoma City, Dartmouth, Texas A&M, and Oregon State to the list of Christmas week tournament champions, but keep Kentucky on top in the reckoning for the team to beat in college basketball this season.

Adolph Rupp's Wildcats, who wrapped up their tournament package weeks ago in the Kentucky Invitational, ran their all-winter streak to nine Monday night with an 82-69 victory over Navy. Johnny Cox ripped in 23 points.

So far the Kentuckians are showing every indication they're able to follow up the championship they nailed in the NCAA Tournament last March, although Cox is the only holdover from the regular unit of a season ago.

Their victory over Navy and Jerry West's 44-point show in fifth-ranked West Virginia's 76-72 decision over Tennessee were the only regular game developments to break through the rash of tournament competition.

No fewer than 16 major tournaments were in action and five crowned their champion.

St. John's, behind a brilliant 33-point show by sophomore Tony Jackson, whipped St. Joseph's (Pa.) 90-79 in the ECAC Holiday Festival at New York's Madison Square Garden.

Oklahoma City was rude host again, bagging its third All-College title at home by turning back Duquesne 75-59 in the final.

Dartmouth, with driving Chuck Kaufmann netting 22 points, won the Queen City Tournament at Buffalo 72-69 over Canisius.

Texas A&M downed Texas Christian 61-45 for the Southwest Conference Tournament title, and Oregon State won the Far West Classic at Corvallis, Ore., topping Iowa 72-71.

Mississippi, a 71-47 winner over Florida, meets LSU in the Gator Bowl windup at Jacksonville tonight. LSU beat Georgia 63-60 Monday night. Defending champion Memphis State and Mississippi State play for the Sugar Bowl championship in New Orleans.

Memphis State nipped Loyola of the South 73-71, and Mississippi State dropped Maryland 56-45.

Kansas State, a 73-59 winner over Oklahoma, plays Colorado for the Big Eight Tournament title at Kansas City, and Utah State meets Ohio University for the All-American city title at Owensboro, Ky.

Finalists in the Providence College Invitational are Boston College and Providence.

Four giants of the hardwoods have reached the semifinals in the tournament of tournaments — the power-packed Dixie Classic in Raleigh. It's Cincinnati against North Carolina State, and a pair of unbeaten, North Carolina against Michigan State.

Cincinnati, winning its sixth straight, whipped Wake Forest 94-70 in first-round play. Oscar Robertson scored 29 points.

## No-Salem Wins Prep FW Action

CORVALLIS (AP) — North Salem swished by Beaverton 54-37 Monday to win the Far West Classic prep division basketball division.

Marshfield rallied in the consolation game for third place to eke out a 39-35 victory over Roseburg, after trailing much of the game.

Grant Harter, 6-foot-9 North Salem center poured in 22 points to lead the Vikings to the title. Beaverton's Steve Pauly scored 17.

# Staters Win FW Tourney

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Three years ago Oregon State created the Far West Classic. For the Beavers, it was a happy decision. Oregon State Monday night won its third straight title in the basketball tournament, edging Iowa 72-71 on Lee Harman's free throw in the final two seconds.

That free throw capped a 33-point performance by Harman and an Oregon State rally that stretched through the entire second half.

Monday night's consolation finale, for the Classic's third place, was won by Wyoming, which also came from behind for a narrow 35-30 triumph over the Air Force.

Except for an early 4-4 tie, Iowa led until the final minutes in its game with Oregon State.

A 14-point Iowa lead melted to nothing as OSC's Jim Anderson sank a hook shot that tied the score at 69-69.

Then Harman, a 6-foot senior, stole the ball and raced for a lay-in. But Iowa, too, rallied briefly as Dave Gunther, a slick 6-5 senior, dropped through a 20-foot set shot and again tied the score, at 71-71.

Harman then was fouled as he brought the ball down the court, and he sank the free throw. He missed his second attempt, and Iowa's 6-7 Nolden Gentry grabbed the rebound.

But the final buzzer sounded before Iowa could move the ball down the court.

Gunther played a spectacular game, and scored 34 points—just shy of the Classic's single game record of 36 he set Saturday night as the tourney opened.

Oregon State held a slight 51-46 edge in rebounds. A big factor in OSC's victory was the work of 6-9 sophomore Karl Anderson, who scored only four points but got 19 rebounds.

Another outstanding performance was turned in by Terry Hoppel, who helped bring Wyoming from a 35-27 halftime deficit to victory over the Air Force.

Hoppel and John Bertolero accounted for 14 points early in the second half, and Hoppel's jump shot put Wyoming ahead to stay at 41-40.

Fraser lost his effectiveness completely in returns. He was so rattled that in five services in the fourth set, the Americans lost only two points.

## Cage Polls Led By Cats, Tigers, K-St.

NEW YORK (AP)—Kentucky's Wildcats, for the second straight week, edged out Cincinnati today for first place among the nation's college basketball teams.

Sports writers and broadcasters, voting in The Associated Press' fourth weekly poll, gave Kentucky (8-0) 63 first-place votes and 1,338 points to No. 1 ballots and 1,286 points for the runner-up Bearcats (5-0).

The poll was based on games played through Saturday, Dec. 27.

Kansas State (7-1), by virtue of their 69-66 victory over Missouri in the first round of the Big Eight Tournament, wrested third place from unbeaten North Carolina by 843 points to 797.

North Carolina State (6-1), although idle last week, moved up a notch into fifth place with 462 points, displacing West Virginia, which fell all the way to 11th place by losing to Northwestern 118-109. The Wildcats (6-1) soared from 12th to sixth. Their 447 points barely topped the 435 total of Michigan State (4-0), which advanced from ninth to seventh place.

Unbeaten Mississippi State (8-0) and Auburn (6-0) each dropped a notch to eighth and ninth, respectively.

Unbeaten Bradley, which defeated Dartmouth and Gonzaga for its sixth and seventh triumphs, jumped from 19th to 10th, replacing Xavier.

Oregon led through most of the second half, and once ran its lead to eight points after holding a slim 32-30 edge at intermission.

But Wichita then rallied, and tied the score at 65-65 when Bobby Lee Goodall sank a jump shot with 17 seconds remaining.

## NCAA Set To Discuss Major Issues

CINCINNATI, Ohio (UPI)—The tightening of eligibility rules and possible curtailment of expenses to prospective athletes in prep schools are two of the major proposals the National Collegiate Athletic Association will consider at its meeting beginning here Sunday.

More than 2,200 representatives from colleges and universities throughout the nation are expected to attend the 53rd annual meeting, which will last a week.

Seven other national athletic groups also will hold their meetings during the NCAA sessions.

The American Football Coaches Association will hold its 36th annual convention during the week, and other organizations scheduled to meet are the American Association of College Baseball Coaches; the National Collegiate Track Coaches Association; College Athletic Business Managers Association; College Sports Information Directors of America; the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame; and the Navy V5 Association.

Paul Dietzel of Louisiana State University will be presented with the Coach-of-the-Year Award during the convention. Balloting for the award was conducted by the New York World-Telegram and Sun and the Scripps-Howard Newspapers.
