

Internal Revenue Bureau Clarifies Clarification

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress this year clarified the law imposing a 10 per cent excise tax on luggage. The Internal Revenue Service today clarified the clarification.

The old law imposed the tax on certain specific items plus other unspecified cases, bags or kits for carrying toilet articles or clothing.

This meant the revenue service had to decide in many cases whether items fell under the catch-all definition.

In an effort to ease the administrative work, Congress last summer simplified the law, effective at midnight tonight, so that it merely lists 14 specific items which are taxable.

Some articles listed in the amended law as taxable are also known by other names not on the list.

The revenue service has decided they are taxable if they are sub-

stantially the same as any of the articles named in the law. To guide retailers, it made public today an expanded list, but says even this is incomplete.

Officials concede they still will have to decide the tax status of many articles on a case-by-case basis.

For example, the expanded list says many Boy Scout packs are taxable but some scout bags are tax exempt.

Bags for carrying wet bathing suits are ruled taxable but bags for toilet wet diapers are free of the tax.

Cases for carrying religious vestments are on the tax list but there will be no tax on cases for carrying pocket flasks.

Which is taxed: a shoe bag or a case for carrying raincoats? The revenue service says only the shoe bag is taxed.

How's that for clarity?

Paradoxical Tale Of Ice Wins Liar's Title For Man

BURLINGTON, Wis. (AP)—A paradoxical tale about hot ice has won a Minnesota man the honor of being the Burlington Liar's Club world champion liar of 1958.

The club, after studying the lies of the land for the 29th time, bestowed its top laurels on Lou Powers of Ortonville, Minn.

"One morning last winter it was so cold that when I set out a tea kettle full of boiling water, it froze so fast the ice was still warm," Powers wrote.

The prevaricator added: "The next night it was still colder, and when I kicked out the family cat I froze my foot."

O. C. Huelt, president of the club, admitted that Minnesota is so chilly it has snowmen with goose pimples but he fretted about the lack of lies from another frigid place, Alaska.

"What's with Alaska?" Huelt demanded. "They are bigger than Texas, but we didn't receive a lie from them in '58."

"The Burlington Liars Club is not going to recognize them as a

state until they send in at least as many entries as Texas," Huelt said.

To instruct Alaskans in the art of large-caliber lying, Huelt supplied some "honorable" mention fiction from Davis F. Boone of Marshall, Tex.

Boone's boast: "I've heard a lot of talk about a lot of rivers, but Texas has one that is definitely the driest. In fact, it is so dry that fishermen along its banks are drawing soil bank checks for not fishing in it."

Insects charged their fuel at a farmer's expense, according to another honorable mention winner, Mel Hart of Waynesburg, Pa. Noticing his electric bills mounting beyond reason, Hart said he investigated.

"Coming back to the house after dark, I found hundreds of lightning bugs—of immense size—had settled on the wires of the electric fence and were charging their rundown batteries for their night travels."

NJ To Suspend Licenses Of Speeding Motorists

TRENTON, N.J. (AP)—"Speeders lose licenses."

Starting Thursday, those words, posted on signs every five miles on every New Jersey state highway, will warn motorists of a drastic new weapon being used on speeders—mandatory license revocation.

It will be used on anyone caught

going 60 miles an hour or more on any road or street in the state, where speed limits range from 25 to 50.

On the N.J. Turnpike and the Garden State Parkway, where the legal limit is 60 m.p.h., revocation will be applied to anyone going 70 or more.

State officials expect 50,000 drivers a year to lose their licenses for 30 days or more under the new system.

New Jersey officials, impressed by Connecticut's mandatory revocation plan, hope the new system will cut deaths on the state's roads, the most heavily traveled in the world. So far this year, New Jersey ranks as the third safest state in the nation in traffic deaths per mile traveled, Connecticut is first.

Licenses will be revoked for 30 days on the first offense. There will be no exceptions or extenuating circumstances considered. A second offense will bring a 60-day revocation and a third an indefinite suspension.

An added feature of the New Jersey system is a requirement that a motorist prove he has liability insurance before he can get his license back. No insurance, no license.

Out-of-state drivers caught under the mandatory plan will lose their privilege of driving in New Jersey, but will probably not lose their home state licenses.

TO SUPPORT REQUEST

PORTLAND (AP)—An Oregon Democrat—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger—says he will support President Eisenhower's requests for higher postal rates and gasoline taxes.

Neuberger said the additional revenue from the two increases would lessen the federal income tax load.

Bad News For Aggressors Told By Electronics Firm

NEW YORK (UPI)—There was bad news today in a release from the Radio Corp. of America for any potential would-be aggressor against the United States.

The company said it has developed an electronic checkout and launching system that will help make the Atlas intercontinental ballistic missile ready for firing almost immediately after a warning of impending enemy attack.

The Atlas is the nation's first successful ICBM capable of carrying a nuclear warhead more than 6,000 miles. It was an Atlas that the Air Force launched into orbit around the earth from Cape Canaveral, Fla., Dec. 18.

RCA said the new launching system is designed to reduce substantially the count-down period from the 10 to 15 hours now required for sending off the missile.

The first of the new checkout and launching systems is being installed at Vandenberg Air Force Base north of Los Angeles. Several launching sites throughout the United States eventually will be equipped with it.

"ICBM hases are too big to be kept secret and their potential retaliatory power makes them prime targets for an enemy's own ICBMs," said Arthur L. Maloney, executive vice president, RCA Defense Electronics Products. "Therefore our missile crews must be able to launch a maximum number of missiles in a short time."

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Tot's Life Was Miracle

CHICAGO (AP)—A tiny infant born 3 1/2 months prematurely died Tuesday, 54 hours after birth, despite efforts to sustain the thread of life of the 12-ounce baby.

Doctors at Swedish Covenant Hospital said it was a miracle that Gloria Diane Hanses, who measured 10 1/2 inches, had lived more than a few minutes. They listed cause of her death as immaturity.

The infant, whose head was the size of a tennis ball, died in an incubator. After the first 36 hours in the incubator, where the temperature remained at 88 degrees, she had been fed minute quantities of dextrose through a tube to her stomach.

"She was just too small," said Nils Axelsson, hospital supervisor. Had Gloria survived, she would have shared the title of the tiniest infant ever to live. American Medical Assn. records list only one child of such small proportions as having survived. She is Jacqueline Benson, now 22, of suburban Palestine.

The premature birth occurred last Sunday after Gloria's mother Mrs. Mabel Hanses, 23, fell down the stairs of her home.
