

# TOP NEWS OF 1958 IN PICTORIAL REVIEW



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(24)—November 27—View from the roof of the biggest ski bowl in the U.S., the new Mt. Shasta Ski Bowl. This picture was taken after snow fall on Thanksgiving, but not enough for full operations. It wasn't until late December that enough snow had fallen to permit operation of the new facilities.



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(25)—November 29—Lakeview Mining Company's new uranium reduction mill began operation. It has a capacity of 210 ton per day. On a three shift basis, the mine and mill employ about 140 men.

(26)—November 18—First customers of the South Suburban Sanitary District received service from the new sewer facility. The complex sewer system was virtually complete at year's end. The district's oxidation ponds are in operation. Total cost of the project is estimated at \$1,600,000.

(27)—October 24—Arthur Rickbeil and Associates announced completion of plans to build a 93 unit moderately priced rental housing development in Klamath Falls, north of the Tower Theater and East of Washburn Way. Bids for the new construction will be asked early in 1959 with construction slated as soon as weather permits.

(28)—October 16—Months of planning, hoping and building culminated in the first sheet of softboard coming through the press at the Johns-Manville plant north of Klamath Falls. Here, far left, R. Frank Tucker, Klamath County chamber manager, and W. H. "Bill" Graham, J-M plant manager, watch the operation.

(29)—July 1—A dog's eye view of the weather is shown at this boxer demonstrated dog-sense in keeping cool. While the summer was hot, the year as a whole was a dry one. At year's end, total precipitation since October 1 was almost three inches behind that of the previous year. Summed up, the year was hot and dry.

(30)—November 15—After a number of years in the talking and planning stage, the West Side Bypass to Klamath Falls moved into the construction stage in early November. By year's end, much of the grading had been completed and work was well along on the concrete structures. Total estimated cost of the bypass was listed as \$1,200,000.



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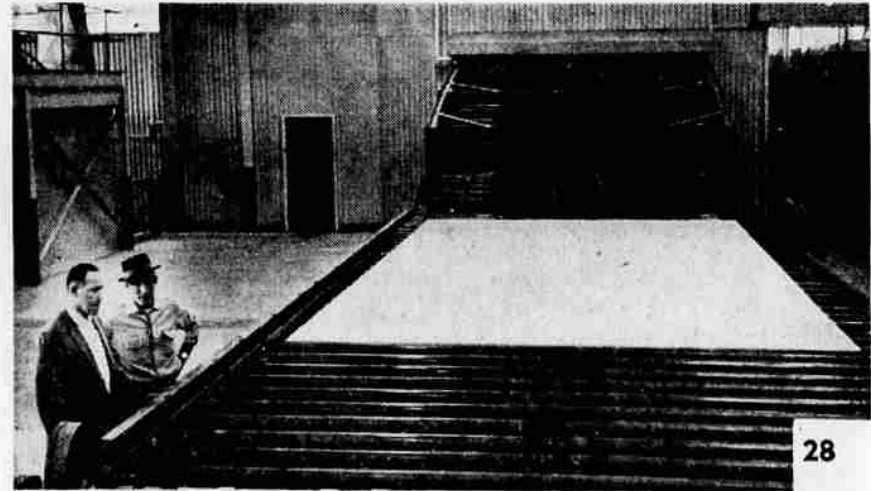
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## BASIN BRIEFS

## Fund Drive Nears Goal

ASHLAND — With \$30,254 added during the past week, the Oregon Shakespearean Festival building fund campaign passed the 80 per cent mark in a search for \$275,000. The theater seeks that amount to rebuild its Elizabethan stage. The former structure, condemned as hazardous, has been dismantled.

Following the weekly report meetings in the Ashland - Medford area, campaign officials announced a new grand total of \$221,283.93 and expressed their confidence that the effort is headed for successful completion within a month.

In order to meet a June rehearsal schedule, work on the new theater had to begin last month. Festival spokesmen point out that construction will continue as funds allow, but the building cannot be completed until the full \$275,000 is realized.

In Oregon, organized campaigns are now underway in Portland, Salem, Eugene, and Grants Pass. Chairmen for these cities report quickening activity and indicate that totals for their areas will be announced soon.

Contributions from festival patrons throughout the world continue to arrive by mail. Out-of-town gifts, ranging from a few dollars to a thousand dollars in size, now total \$13,834. Many contributors, in response to a festival association suggestion, are pledging their donations over a three-year period.
