Corporate Profits Hike Predicted By Agency

NEW YORK (UPI)—Industrial production will rise 10 to 13 per cent and corporate profits will gain 22 to 34 per cent in 1959, according to the year-end predictions of Prentice-Hall.

That agency finds all segments of industry rising. It notes a rise of 2 to 4 per cent in employment and a drop of 16 to 36 per cent in unemployment for the year.

Here is how it looks at the various industries:

Advertising and Publishing: Total advertising in 1958 of \$10 billion dipped 2 or more per cent from 1957 but 1959 should see a rise of 6 per cent to 8 per cent.

Agricultural Equipment: After a two-year rise, farm equipment sales and earnings will level off after a rise in the early part of 1959.

Apparel: Retail clothing up 2 to 3 per cent in 1958; probably will rise another 3 to 5 per cent next year.

Appliances: Output in some lines rising with prospects of a 12 to 15 per cent gain over 1958 which showed a 4 to 5 per cent decline.

Autos and Trucks: Sales and production in 1959 will crowd six million units after a 25 per cent decline in 1958.

Beverages: Profits, margins, and dividends of distillers will rise in 1959. Beer outlook only fair.

Wine up 3 per cent in 1958, may rise another 4 to 6 per cent in 1959.

Building and Construction: Outlays in 1959 should pass \$50 billion to a new record high.

Building Materials: Favorable 1959 construction outlook will boost most building materials.

Chemicals and Plastics: A record output is seen in 1959, topping 1958 by 7 to 8 per cent.

Coal: Soft coal output down about 20 per cent from 1957 this year, will probably reach 450 million tons in 1959 and earnings should make a corresponding rise.

Containers: Total for 1958 will come close to 1957 with a rise of 4 to 5 per cent forecast for 1959.

Dairy Products: Milk and meat output up, also indications of a higher earnings report from the various companies.

Drugs and Toiletries: Gain expected to exceed the rise of 6 per cent in 1958.

Electric Utilities: Last quarter rise will lift 1958 output by 2 per cent over 1957 with outlook for a 10 per cent gain in 1959. Profits expected to rise 15 to 20 per cent.

Electrical Equipment and Electronics: Military and industrial volume to rise, the former by 10 per cent and the latter by 7 to 8 per cent.

Food Processors: Spending on food to top 1958 by 4 per cent.

Home Furnishings: Factory output and sales to rise 2 to 4 per cent and profits more.

Machine Tools: Good pickup is in sight for 1959.

Non-electrical Machinery: Shipments in 1959 should rise 10 to 15 per cent.

Meat and Poultry: Bulk of 1959 increase will be in pork. Slight decline seen in poultry.

Motion Picture: Movie attendance will rise 10 per cent over 1958.

Natural Gas: Could easily rise 10 per cent in 1959 after 5 per cent rise in 1958.

Nonferrous Metals: Gain should run to over 10 per cent over 1958.

Office Equipment: Sales this year up 8 per cent, will rise by more than 10 per cent next year.

Paper and Paperboard: Production will rise at least 6 to 7 per cent.

Petroleum: A 4 per cent growth in the cards for 1959.

Retail Trade: Should increase 4 to 6 per cent over 1958 totals.

Rubber: Consumption down nearly 10 per cent in 1958, should rise by 12 to 15 per cent next year.

Shoes: Output should climb 2 to 3 per cent next year.

Steel: Declined 25 per cent in 1958, may rise 27 per cent in 1959.

Textiles: Current climb should carry through 1959.

Tobacco: Topping 1957 record by 4 per cent, further climb of as much as 20 per cent in profits.

Transportation: Heavy gains for all sections seen for 1959.

The pickup is scheduled for Saturday afternoon and all day on Sunday. The entire city of Klamath Falls and the Stewart Lenox Addition will be covered.

The trees, to be piled on the Graham Brothers lot at the end of Biehn Street will be burned in a big bonfire Sunday evening starting at 7 p.m. and all Boy Scouts are invited to take wieners and marshmallows for a roast.

Roy Rowe, Klamath Falls fire chief, has issued a warning about the danger of keeping dried out Christmas trees in homes.
