UO Ducks Kickoff PCC Play At Home

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON (Special) — Coach Steve Beiko's Oregon Ducks, fresh from a pair of victories in the All-College tournament, open the 1959 Pacific Coast Conference championship race at McArthur Court Friday night against the Southern California Trojans and then meet the tough California Bears in the second home game Saturday night.

The Webfoots, who played five games in eight days during the Christmas holidays, finished the non-conference season with a record of six wins in nine starts while the Trojans had a 7-3 mark and the Bears, defending PCC champions for two years, were victorious in six of their eight starts.

The Webfoots will again face a tough height disadvantage in both games as the Trojans bring Jim Hanna, a 6-7 junior who weighs 233 pounds, as one of the key men in Coach Forrest Twoogood's attack and the next night the Bears will have Darrall Imhoff, a 6-10 junior, as their center.

Southern California also has a pair of hot-shooting forwards in Jim White and Johnny Werbas to

help Hanna carry the scoring load. All three have averaged over 10 points a game this season and the fourth high scoring Trojan, guard Jerry Pimm, may be back in action after an appendicitis operation two weeks ago.

The Bears have Al Buch and George Dalton at forward back from the starting team which played two thrillers with the Ducks last year and have filled in the other starting spots with capable reserves from the two-time championship squad. Both games last year were decided in the final 15 seconds with California winning here, 61-60, and the Ducks taking the game at Berkeley, 64-62, as Bud Kuykendall hit a jump shot from 20 feet just before the final gun.

Kuykendall and Chuck Rask, who was named to the all-tournament squad along with Denny Strickland at Oklahoma City, will be at guard for the two vital games here, while Strickland, Dale Herron and Stu Robertson will make up the front line in the "absent center" offense. Jerry Anderson at forward and Butch Kimpton at guard are again set for the job of doing the relief work.

Henley Cagers Slate Tilt With Lakeview

All is quiet on the Klamath County B League basketball front until next Tuesday, but the Henley Hornets go back to work Saturday night when they host the Lakeview Honkers in a non-league fracas set for 7 p.m. in the Henley gym.

For coach Ted Ammerman's Hornets, the Lakeview clash marks one of their few appearances against another A-2 school, Henley, because of its size and location, is relegated to the position of an orphan in Oregon high school classifications, and plays a full schedule against the Klamath County B schools during its regular season. At A2 playoff time the Hornets get a crack at the number two team in the Rogue League conference standings.

Lakeview, also an A2 school, is hooked up with Madras, Burns and John Day for conference action. The Hornets, 4-4 to date, have collected wins over the KU sophomore Wildcats, the Bonanza Antlers, the Malin Mustangs and the Sacred Heart Trojans. Their losses have been dealt them by Merrill, Phoenix and Bly. The Huskies dropped them twice while Phoenix

and Bly split the Hornet squad in two, both games being played on the same night. The Hornet Varsity trekked to Phoenix while the Jayvees tangled with the Bly Bobcats.

Henley forward Phil Swisher is currently holding down the number two position among the county high scorers with 92 points, running second to the Bly ace, Jerry Patzke, who has accumulated 149 points in six games for a 24.8 per game average.

The Merrill Huskies of coach Al Keck, the only undefeated squad in the county standings, shares the number one spot with the Bly Bobcats despite their perfect record. Coach Al Sample's Bly club has lost two games so far this season but neither counted in league play.

Tied for third place on the B ladder are Coach Gordie Kuis's Chiloquin Panthers and the Sacred Heart Trojans of coach Jerry Kempf. Each of the squads are riding .500 averages with two wins and two losses apiece.

The Malin Mustangs, under the direction of coach Bob Croft, are alone on the fifth rung with a 1-win, 2-loss mark. Sharing the basement are Les Martin's Gilchrist Grizzlies and Erv Ellis' Bonanza Antlers; the Grizzlies with 0-wins in two starts and the Antlers, 0-3.

Tuesday night action finds Bonanza and Henley at Henley, Bly at Malin, Chiloquin at Sacred Heart and the Merrill Huskies at Gilchrist.

College Football Has Lowest Scoring Year

College football in 1957 experienced its lowest scoring season in a decade, National Collegiate Athletic Assn. statistics for the 1958 season, still incomplete, indicate that the over-all average was just about the same as it was a year ago. Possibly there was a very slight drop.

The reason? Coaches have been devoting more time to defense than they did a few years ago; they have taught defenders to outmaneuver the blockers and the results naturally are good.

That's the consensus of nearly

200 press box experts replying to the Associated Press post-season football questionnaire.

Even though the principal trend noted this year by the same sports writers and broadcasters was a swing toward more varied, imaginative and wide open offenses, they considered the defenses strong enough to control most of the games.

In one way or another, about half the experts said that more emphasis on defensive play by the coaches and the resulting improvement of the players had caused the scoring decline in recent seasons. Only a few blamed conservatism and the ball-control offense.

About 35 others pointed specifically to the T and split-T formations, whose popularity seems to have declined this year. The defenses have learned to stop plays from those formations, and although coaches have tried new, or different attacks, they haven't yet come up with a style that can't be stopped.

Defensive tactics are vastly improved over those of just a few years ago.

A quarterback no longer can call a play in the huddle to penetrate a certain defensive lineup and expect it to gain. He has to look again and often change when the teams line up.

About a dozen writers and broadcasters mentioned that there's less concentration of football talent on a few big teams and that schedules offer few soft touches. The result is that there's little opportunity to run up big scores.

Irish Trio Wins Senior Bowl Jobs

MOBILE, Ala. (AP) — Three Notre Dame players apparently have won starting posts on the North's offensive team for Saturday's Senior Bowl football classic.

Yankee Coach Joe Kuharich, who has just accepted the head coachship at the South Bend, Ind., school, has been working Notre Dame end Bob Wetoska, tackle Frank Geremia and fullback Norm Odyniec with the No. 1 lineup in practice this week.

Also on the starting team on offense are two from Ohio State, two from Boston College and one each from Michigan and Indiana. One of the Ohio State starters will be center Dan James, biggest man on the field at 258 pounds.

Penn State contributes two to the North defensive lineup as the only school with more than one starter on defense.

Don Allard, Boston College's fine quarterback, apparently has been tabbed for North starting duties, with Lee Grosscup of Utah, leading passer in the nation a year ago, backing him up. Also in the starting backfield are Joe Morrison of Cincinnati and Alan Miller of Boston College.

The probable 11 starters for Coach Paul Brown's South offensive team come from 11 schools. Texas A. & M. and Vanderbilt coach will supply two on defense.

Key man in Brown's offensive plans is Baylor quarterback Buddy Humphrey, top passer in the nation this season with 112 completions of 195 attempts for 1,316 yards.

Others in the South's starting backfield apparently will be Don Brown of Houston, Billy Stacy of Mississippi State and Theron Sapp of Georgia.

Kickoff is at 2 p.m. (CST). The game will be televised nationally by NBC with a blackout within a 100-mile radius of Mobile.

The Redmond team, second in state competition last season, is a definite challenge to the Pelican hopes for 1959. Two state champions will make the trip for the Panther squad.

The opening bout on each of the matches will begin at 1:30 p.m.
