



Nikita Tells Ambassador Reds Will Surpass U.S.

MOSCOW (UPI) — Premier Nikita Khrushchev, acting as toastmaster at a gala New Year's party in the Kremlin, told American Ambassador Llewellyn W. Thompson Wednesday night "We are going to overtake you economically."

But he passed in silence over the Berlin issue, according to Western diplomats who were present.

Among about 700 guests at the traditional dinner dance in the marble St. George Hall, the diplomats were interested to see Ivan

Serov, who recently was placed as boss of the Soviet security organization.

Serov dressed in a four-star army general's uniform danced with his wife, waved to Western acquaintances and seemed completely at ease.

Khrushchev and other members of the Communist Party Presidium occupied the head table at the dinner. The premier offered the traditional 10 or so toasts including one to the old year which he said had been so "wonderful" for the Soviet Union he hated to see it go.

Toasting the Soviet people and their capacity for hard work he said Russia's new seven-year economic plan was particularly important in view of competition with the United States.

He leaned in the direction of the U.S. ambassador who was sitting at a nearby table and added: "Mr. Thompson we are going to overtake you."

Khrushchev said Communism will triumph not by force but peacefully as the people of the world would come to see that it was a better system than capitalism.

But neither in the toasts nor in a brief chat later with Thompson did Khrushchev mention the latest Western note to Berlin in which the West refused to adopt a policy of appeasement.

In the course of the toasts Khrushchev referred to the coming United States visit of Deputy Premier Anastas Mikoyan who was seated at his left. Khrushchev said jestingly "He must promise he will come back and if he does not come back at least he must promise he will not work against us."

Cheap Power Outlook Bad

SALEM (AP)—Oregon will fare badly in its supply of low-cost power in the future, compared with the rest of the Pacific Northwest, a report filed Wednesday with Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan said.

The report was made at Morgan's request by H. Zinder & Associates, Seattle.

It said that wise use of surplus secondary power can make additional firm power available.

Morgan said the report lays the groundwork for procedures which can prevent construction of unnecessary facilities and those which fail to make maximum use of available facilities.

The Zinder report advocates construction of major interconnections between Oregon and California.

It warned that facilities to be developed by power companies would result in power costing more than does federal power.

It added that none of these proposed private developments plans to extend service to new large industrial loads, such as electrochemical or electro-metals plants.
