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tor had hailed his leadership and his selection of Urrutia. Castro said the road to Santiago, occupied Thursday after the defending garrison surrendered, had been a long and hard one. He called Santiago "the strongest fortress of the revolution" and said its triumph was being crowned by making it the provisional capital for some 12 hours, until he and Urrutia go to Havana.

Castro's supporters controlled all communications and every radio broadcast referred to Urrutia as "provisional president of Cuba." Former President Carlos Prío Socarras, an exile in Miami since Batista ousted him by military coup in 1952, arrived meanwhile in Havana. Prío has supported Castro's revolt from exile. He and all other revolutionary organizations recently agreed to accept Urrutia as provisional president.

There was little doubt that this island republic would accept Urrutia, a former judge about 56 years old who long has been Castro's choice to succeed Batista until free elections can be held. Castro called a general strike across Cuba until Urrutia was installed. The strike seemed 100 per cent effective, thus removing any question of remnants from the Batista regime trying to run the country.

Castro was still in Santiago, the capital of easternmost Oriente province and birthplace of his battle against Batista. Celebrations of his victory continued there all night. Until Urrutia takes over in Havana, Castro's announcements from Santiago provided the only framework of government. Men he designated were giving orders to Cuba's armed forces and police. Castro supporters held Havana under tight control — virtually martial law — today after victory celebrations Thursday led to violence.

Judge Sentences Pair, Gives Third Probation

Sentences ranging from probation to life imprisonment were passed on three men today by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg. A mandatory sentence of life imprisonment was passed on 26-year-old Myron Barkley, convicted of second degree murder at the close of a week-and-a-half long trial that ended two days before Christmas.

Barkley was convicted of killing his half-brother, 26-year-old Eldon "Beanie" Cress at the Jackson Creek Guard Station cabin they shared last September 6. Both Barkley and Cress were passengers in a car traveling on U.S. 97 the night before when a woman tourist was killed as a rifle bullet penetrated the rear of the car in which she was riding and struck her in the back. That death, however, was not an issue in the lengthy trial last month.

Clifford Barkley, 45, of Chillicothe, was sentenced to 20 years in the penitentiary for statutory rape. He pleaded guilty to severely assaulting a 4-year-old girl on the Klamath Indian Reservation last July 30. After his plea, Judge Vandenberg ordered him sent to the state hospital in Salem for observation. He was returned from Salem last week.

The judge made no comments upon sentencing either man, but he had several to make in passing sentence upon Frank N. Addison, who was placed on three years probation on a charge of burglary involving theft of record players and radios from J. W. Kerns implement and appliance store October 31.

Both Addison and Earl Nolte pleaded guilty to burglary charges, and Nolte, 30, was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary on December 15. At that time, Addison's sentence was delayed. Addison, accompanied by his attorney, P. K. Fickett, told the judge today that he and Nolte drove by the Kerns store about 9 p.m. the night of the robbery and Nolte suggested robbing it.

"For two cents, I'd help you," Addison quoted himself. He said Nolte gave him three cents. "I meant it more as a joke than anything else," he told the judge.

"You finally carried out that joke, didn't you?" the judge remarked. "If you use no more judgment than you exhibited here, you're a menace to society." However, the judge granted three years' probation to the defendant, proprietor of a bait shop and a family man who will be 32 January 12.

"Burglary probably is one of the sneakiest crimes a man can commit," the judge added. "Seldom do I give probation to a man who has admitted guilt in a burglary."

A second recommendation, that the cafeteria kitchen be provided with an approved carbon dioxide fire extinguisher of not less than five pounds capacity, was general to all the District One schools except Roosevelt. Thus repeated seven times, it accounted for all the remaining recommendations made to this district. The necessary extinguishers have been ordered from Cascade Industrial Supply, Klamath Falls.

The marshal's orders referring to other elementary schools in general called for minor corrections and improvements. The only other major order applied to Klamath Union High School. This order directed that the center stairway in the main classroom wing, which passes from the basement through the second floor, should be completely separated from the corridors and classrooms. Self-closing doors of at least one hour's fire resistance must also be installed. The Brotherhood Construction Company has been given the job of carrying out Perrin's plans for this project.

The only recommendation made to the high school district was a rather considerable one: "Whereas maintenance work shops and vehicle repair shops are, due to the nature of the work carried on therein, inherently hazardous occupancies, it is recommended that serious consideration be given to providing a separate building for housing these shops, and further, since storage space is in general a problem in all schools and storage of combustible materials contributes to the hazards of any structure, that a central storage warehouse also be considered."

The report also included a pat on the back for Penderosa School: "In the opinion of the inspecting deputy, this building is considerably above average in regards to fire safety. In future construction, this type of planning, construction and heating is highly recommended."
