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DRASTIC REDUCTIONS

Town Torn By Tragedy Awaits Fate

SPRINGHILL, N.S. (AP)—The fate of this town of tragedy is in the balance. . . . The Canadian and Nova Scotia governments are trying to find an answer. Springhill's 7,000 residents are impatient to learn what's to become of them. . . . Mayor Ralph Gilroy in two years has guided the citizens through two mine tragedies — total dead 114 — and a 1½ million dollar fire in the town's business district. . . . Confident that Springhill will recover, he says: "The governments are doing everything in their power. By spring we'll have an industry. We will recover and maybe be a better Springhill for it."

About 800 coal miners, unemployed since the Dominion Steel and Coal Corp. shut down the last of its mines here, want work. . . . Scores, perhaps hundreds, would rather leave than exist on relief. . . . Some, like Doug Jewkes, are planning now to start new lives. . . . Jewkes, 37, was trapped nearly nine days in October. . . . A soft drink firm has offered him a warehouse job in Toronto.

For others, like 55-year-old Allan Skidmore, the future is bleak. . . . Industries prefer younger men. . . . Little real hardship is expected until spring when unemployment benefits begin running out. . . . The disaster relief pension will likely be about that given widows of 39 men killed in a 1956 mine explosion—\$29 a month plus \$10 for the youngest child and \$5 for each additional child under 18.

Bata, Spanish Guinea, West Africa, is the new home of a former Klamath County couple, the Rev. and Mrs. Bill Ainley, who once served the Mt. Laki Community Presbyterian Church.

Rev. and Mrs. Ainley went abroad into the mission field after a period of orientation and for some months were at Ambam, French Cameroun, Africa, while awaiting official permits recognizing them as the official representatives of the Presbyterian Mission in Spanish Guinea.

There are five national pastors "doing a good job" in their area who appreciate help and encouragement, they write. Churches continue to grow slowly and to make improvements. One congregation has received government permission to erect a new permanent concrete block sanctuary. . . . Some other churches have installed zinc roofs and cement floors.

The business was opened early in 1952 in the Alan Prescott building following the disastrous fire in December, 1951, which wiped out a corner fountain combination. . . . DeBortoli lived in Chilquin until he was out of high school and in more recent years he and his wife have been in the restaurant business in Weaverville, California.

County Gets Indian Road

The county has taken into its road system a newly completed all-weather road spanning the Callinus Butte area of the Klamath Indian Reservation. . . . County Engineer W. R. Canton said the road runs for 17 miles from an intersection near the Yamsay Guard Station southwest toward Chilquin. It provides an all-weather road, over either rock or oiled sections, from Yamsay Station to Chilquin. . . . Canton said the road was completed several weeks ago under a Bureau of Indian Affairs contract for \$266,000. It was turned over to the county under an agreement under which the county gradually is receiving reservation roads and is responsible for their maintenance.

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School To End Food Service, Reduce Staff

ALTURAS—At a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Alturas Elementary School December 29, it was decided that cafeteria services would be eliminated as of January 16, and that other cuts in school administration expense would be effective in the school year beginning in September 1959. Tentative reductions include abolishing the music department and cutting the teaching staff by one teacher.

The necessary reduction was brought about by the failure of the voters in the school district to accept a 70 cent levy increase in a December 18 election. . . . The withdrawal of the hot lunch program will affect approximately 900 children. . . . Dr. William Quinn, chairman of the school board, and other members averaged three nights a week for several weeks in appearances before civic and other groups for the purpose of explaining the need for additional funds to operate the school during the next school year.

Top Riflemen Given Medals

A number of Klamath Falls' junior marksmen were pleasantly surprised this weekend when they found sharpshooting medals in the mail. . . . City Police Lt. Bud Adkins said the medals were sent by a governmental agency for 49 of 92 students enrolled in city police rifle classes in 1957 and early 1958. . . . To qualify for medal competition, a student was required to score 260 of a possible 400 points from four shooting positions, Adkins said. From there, the competition for medals got tougher. . . . Adkins was immensely pleased that so many of his students received the honors. He said medals, when they come, arrive a little late, but he hoped students in present police rifle classes also would qualify for the honors.

Heavy Thirst Nets Arrest

YREKA—Two Happy Camp men who said they "were just trying to get a drink" were arrested last week by Yreka City Police on suspicion of attempted burglary at Jackson's bar, four miles south of Yreka. . . . Siskiyou County Sheriff Al Cottar said his office was notified by Marvin Wright, operator of the bar, that a front window of his establishment had been smashed. . . . Cottar's office called the Yreka City Police and the men, Robert W. Fleming, 20, and Dean C. Lokey, 26, were apprehended on their arrival in Yreka. . . . Police said the men admitted breaking the glass out of the window, but claimed they were only "thirsty" and trying to get a drink.
