

Davis Cup Important So Alex Plays Hard

BRISBANE, Australia (AP) — The scene was the Milton Tennis Club Stadium where 18,500 excited fans were watching the Davis Cup challenge round between Australia and the United States.

Alex Olmedo, the lend-lease Peruvian playing for America, had wrested the first set from Australia's favored Mal Anderson. He had played brilliant, determined tennis. Now strange things were happening.

Suddenly the 22-year-old Olmedo no longer was the killer. He gazed blankly into the crowd. He looked at the broadcasting booth and smiled at Jack Kramer. He was loose and casual and his shots began straying into the net and past the lines.

"Oh no! Not again," groaned Myron McNamara of Los Angeles, a member of Kramer's pro tennis organization, as Anderson won the set.

Perry T. Jones, the 70-year-old American captain, was seen talking earnestly to Olmedo as he towelled between sets. Olmedo returned to the court to blast out a victory 8-6, 2-6, 9-7, 8-6.

The next day he teamed with

Ham Richardson to win the doubles and the following day he trounced the world's top amateur, Ashley Cooper, 6-4, 6-3, 4-6, 8-6 and sent the cup back to America. It was a phenomenal one-man job.

Later Olmedo asked what happened to him in that second set against Anderson.

"I was just thinking to myself," Alex replied. "Why do I take up tennis? Why am I like a monkey in a cage out here before all these people—and not a peso in it? Why is it not better I should be at home relaxing and taking it easy?"

Then Olmedo was asked the reason for his sudden change of attitude that made him a winner and the most exciting tennis figure in tennis.

"Mr. Jones talked to me," he said. "Then I realize I am playing in the Davis Cup. It is a big thing. I am playing not for just one country but for two—the United States and Peru. I decide to concentrate and try to win."

Although possessed of great tennis talent, Olmedo had a sporty record and never scored an important tournament triumph before cup play. His temperament seemed unsuited to success.

"We feared he lacked the killer instinct," said Kramer. "He would get a man down and then, instead of stepping on his face, he would let him get away."

All he did, at an age placed vaguely somewhere between 43 and 49, was retain the light heavyweight championship of the world against muscular Yvon Durelle in a brawl for the ages.

It was an amazing performance. Yet it only accents the fact that while sports supposedly are dominated by the muscles of youth, and the clock and the calendar are supposed to wait for no man, a host of old timers still are tweaking father time's whiskers.

Hawks Climb To 2nd Place

The lowly Chicago Black Hawks, riding the crest of an unbeaten six game string, today were planted in unfamiliar National Hockey League territory — second place.

The streaking Hawks, who have not finished higher than fifth place since 1953, had a pair of weekend victories to vault over New York into the runner-up spot.

Sunday night's 5-3 victory over Boston was the Hawks' fourth in their six game spurt, including two ties. The victory, coupled with the Rangers' 4-2 loss to Toronto, gave Chicago a two point spread over third place New York.

As Detroit tied Montreal 2-2 Sunday night, the deadlock left the league-leading Canadiens an even dozen points ahead of Chicago.

The Hawks, who nipped the Maple Leafs 2-1 Saturday night, slapped Boston for three goals in the second period.

Ted Lindsay scored twice while Jack McKenzie, Tod Sloan and Bobby Hull were the Chicago marksmen.

In Saturday's other games, Boston walloped Detroit 8-2 in a nationally televised encounter and the Canadiens trounced New York 5-1.

By a 2-1 margin, sports writers and broadcasters favor giving a football coach the same privilege as most other coaches have—the privilege of conferring with his players and advising them during timeout intervals.

Of 195 experts casting ballots on this question in the Associated Press postseason football questionnaire, 121 voted yes and 62 no on the question:

"Do you think coaches should be permitted to confer with the quarterback or team captain during timeout, as is done in basketball?"

Twelve were undecided or expressed no definite opinion.

The National Football Rules Committee has refused to consider changing the rule which bans coaching from the sidelines although a number of coaches have suggested it.

The reason most frequently advanced by the writers and broadcasters for permitting such conference was that coaches evade the rule, anyway, by signals or using substitutes as messengers.

Opponents of a change generally argued that the game belongs to the players, once it starts.

Arguments in favor of a change were that the coach is held responsible if his team loses but he doesn't have much chance to make a move that might prevent a defeat, that better and more interesting football might result and that it would take some pressure off the players if they could get advice.

Besides objecting to coaching from the sidelines on traditional grounds, negative voters voiced two fears—that coaches would call every play and that the conferences would slow up the game.

DIRECTORS OKAY Game Matters

REDDING — Directors of the Northern Counties Wildlife Conservation Association have approved several matters which will be submitted to the 1959 Legislature.

The group will ask that the Busch Bill, which gives supervisors control over antlerless hunts, be put on a permanent basis. The measure was in effect for only two years, and recently expired.

The association also wants supervisors to have control over deer and other special hunts. Support was given by the group to a program of brush burning and a more control of predatory animals.

The association also would again place a ban on killing of forked horn deer in mule deer areas. Also approved was a measure to return control of game management from the Legislature, and to press for laws which would permit election of fish and game commissioners.

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REDEGLS OPEN APRIL 9
