

Humanitarian 'Mom' Chung Dies In SF

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Dr. Margaret J. Chung, famed physician and surgeon who became "mom" to hundreds of servicemen she formally adopted during World War II, died Monday of cancer. She was 60. Funeral services will be held Thursday.

In addition to servicemen, her adopted "children" included scores of celebrities from the entertainment world. They included such people as Lily Pons, Henry Fonda, Tallulah Bankhead, Liberace, Sophie Tucker and Hildegard.

Dr. Chung had been in failing health for several months. The end came in Franklin Hospital, where she had been a patient on and off since early August.

She was born in Santa Barbara in 1898, the oldest of 11 children. She put herself through medical school at University of California and served her internship with the Santa Fe Railroad Hospital in Los Angeles.

Then she went to Chicago, where she helped Dr. Herman Adler found the Juvenile Psychological Institute, and served as Illinois state criminologist.

She returned to San Francisco and opened an office in 1922. She was the first woman to practice modern medicine in Chinatown.

Dr. Chung became a friend of Anna May Wong, the Chinese film actress, and this led to friendship with others in show business. During her illness, such celebrities as Adm. Arleigh Burke, chief of naval operations, actress Marie McDonald, actor Gregory Peck, Arthur Godfrey and many others called or sent letters and wires.

Her reputation as "mom" to servicemen began in 1931 when she befriended seven naval aviators, taking them to dinner and looking after them while they were in town.

After World War II broke out, she enlarged the group to include men from the submarine service, known as the Golden Dolphins, and nonfliers, called the Kiwis. All were welcome to her legendary Sunday night suppers.

The list of her "sons" swelled to the point at which one year she personally wrapped and addressed more than 4,000 Christmas gifts for them.

The McCrackens moved to the Tulelake homestead in 1947.

They have an 18-year-old son Jim who is presently attending Tulelake Senior High School.
