

NCAA Meeting Officially Opens; Violators Checked

CINCINNATI, Ohio (AP) — The 53rd annual convention of the National Collegiate Athletic Assn. starts officially today. And it could open with a bang and screams of anguish if the Council finds any member schools guilty of NCAA code infractions.

The committee on infractions, headed by A. D. Kirwan of Kentucky, delivered its report to the Council Tuesday, but there was no indication of its findings. Investigations are conducted in the utmost secrecy so that an innocent institution will not draw unwarranted bad publicity.

The committee met last month in Kansas City to assemble the report. In its final session this morning, the Council was to decide if any action would be taken on the basis of findings by the infractions group.

In a routine action, the Council is expected to remove the University of Southern California from probation, since the school has served out its probationary period.

The report of the NCAA television committee, which met in two days of preliminary sessions, was also expected today, but all indications are that it merely endorses the current program of restricted TV.

It was learned the Big Ten put up its usual stiff fight for unrestricted TV, but was again thwarted by committee members from other regions.

The number of national and regional telecasts may vary slightly

from last year, but the "split-network" device, an arrangement to satisfy NCAA regulations requiring at least one telecast to originate in each district, will probably be retained. Under this setup, two or more games are shown "nationally," but the network is split so that each area gets only one game.

Rumors blossomed today after the surprise announcement Tuesday that Tom Nugent, head football coach and athletic director at Florida State, had resigned and accepted a four-year contract as Maryland football coach.

Nationwide League Talk Gets Louder

CINCINNATI (AP)—The American Conference, a nationwide football league of colleges which now are regarded as independent, is likely to come a lot closer to realization at this week's meetings of the National Collegiate Athletic Assn. and allied bodies.

This conference, which has been under discussion for several years, would include about a dozen teams from the East and the Pacific Coast, with Notre Dame as the all-important middle college.

Discussions have ranged from hot to cold for some time, but the breakup of the Pacific Coast Conference has made the Big Four of California football and the University of Washington, closely allied with the Pacific group, available for other affiliations.

Potential members include Southern California, UCLA, Stanford, California and Washington on the West Coast, Syracuse, Pitt, Penn State, Army, Navy, West Virginia and Miami (Fla.) in the East and possibly Notre Dame and the Air Force Academy in the middle territory.

Such an alliance has been proposed on several occasions but so far the colleges never have reached an agreement. Several other colleges have been mentioned as possible members.

The proposed league also has been tabbed as the Airplane Conference.

By using air transportation, games could be played without serious interruption of academic schedules.

Johansson Down Line On Title List

NEW YORK (AP) — Sweden's Ingemar Johansson is undefeated, the European heavyweight champion and universally recognized as the No. 1 challenger to world titleholder Floyd Patterson. But he may be third in line for a crack at Patterson's crown this year—if he gets the shot.

Cub D'Amato, Patterson's enigmatic manager, hinted today that his protegee may have a couple of title fights this year before he gets around to Johansson. That is, if he ever gets around to the hard-hitting Swede.

Who the first two possibilities are, Cus wouldn't say. He did say in answer to a question that he considered Johansson and England's twosome of Brian London and Henry Crooper, as worthy challengers.

D'Amato, in a telephone interview, seemed to give the impression that something had gone amiss in his dealings with Johansson. He said, however, he hadn't spoken to the Swede since the latter met with him in New York last November.

What were Johansson's chances of getting a shot at Patterson? "Johansson is not imperative to us," replied D'Amato. "We do not need Johansson. Johansson needs us."

In Stockholm, Johansson said he will not commit himself to a fight anywhere until he hears from D'Amato whether he will or will not get a fight with Patterson.

As for Patterson's schedule for 1959, Cus said:

"With what I have in mind, Patterson may be in the 90 per cent bracket (income tax bracket) before he gets to Johansson—if that fight takes place."

That seemed to indicate two fights.

"Could be," said D'Amato.

Cronin Seen In New Post

CHICAGO (AP) — Joe Cronin, long identified with American League baseball as a player, manager and executive, today appeared a certainty to take over as league president at the end of the month.

At the moment there is no other candidate to succeed Will Harridge who resigned last month after serving as president for 27 years.

The official announcement is expected Jan. 31 at a meeting of league club owners in New York. A majority vote is needed to elect a new president.

Harridge Tuesday said that Cronin, general manager of the Boston Red Sox, is the only candidate who has been invited before a screening committee which will meet in Chicago Jan. 14.

"If the conditions are right so far as Joe Cronin is concerned, he probably will be the man," said Harridge.

Nugent Moves To Terp Land

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP)—Whether Maryland football fortunes go up or down next fall, the fans are probably in for some surprises with Coach Tom Nugent at the helm.

The Florida State University head coach, who moves into the Maryland job Jan. 15, is an experimenter and a careful planner of plays. He led FSU to a 7-3 season last year, his sixth at Florida State.

He is eager to try his brand of football at the University of Maryland and Maryland officials are happy to have him.

Nugent's over-all coaching record, including four years at Virginia Military Institute and six at FSU, is 53 wins, 45 losses and three ties.

Victories will be welcomed at Maryland, which hasn't had a winning season in three years. Under a de-emphasized football program Maryland skidded from the nation's No. 1 gridiron power in 1953 to far out of the running last year with a 4 and 6 record.

Nugent takes over from Tommy Mont, who resigned under pressure in December.

Ewbank-Huff Tangle To Spark Pro Game

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — If Coach Weeb Ewbank knows what's good for him, he won't get too close to the sidelines when the East tangles with the West in the Pro All-Star football game here on Sunday.

Sam Huff, the New York Giants line-backer, hasn't forgotten that Ewbank punched him on the teams apple during the play-off game between the Baltimore Colts and the Giants—in full view of the 70,000 fans and a full million more on television.

"What gets me is that I can't figure out why Ewbank flew in there to punch me," says the still-burned Huff. "The man I tackled, Ray Berry, didn't think I was playing dirty. Next thing I knew, Ewbank was on top of me, so I punched him back."

The possibility of this re-match between the 230-pound Huff and the smaller Ewbank adds a little in the way of desert to what promises to be one of the fiercest-for-all in all-star records.

The report is that Norman Van Brocklin, one-time Los Angeles Ram quarterback, is unhappy with his successor here, Bill Wade. Van Brocklin now is with the Philadelphia Eagles and the two may be quarter-backing against each other.

Then Gene ("Big Daddy") Lipscomb is supposed to be mad at the whole Los Angeles team because it traded him away.

It is doubtful that Huff, Lipscomb and Van Brocklin will carry their grudge onto the field and it is very improbable that

there will be any fistfights. But it should result in a slam-bang game.

In fact, the eyes of the fans probably will be on the new and rugged name of football, Mr. Johnny Unitas, the one-time sandlot quarterback who sparked the Colts to the world's championship this year.

So much has been said and read about Johnny that it is expected that more than 30,000 fans will jam into the Coliseum to see the game—20,000 more than usual.

Johnny and Wade are the West quarterbacks in this annual fracas, but unless the West has a comfortable lead, it is doubtful that Wade, a local hero, will see much action.

After all, Ewbank won the world title with Unitas calling the signals and it is doubtful that he'll decide to go with anyone else, no matter how talented.

Bobby Boyd Ring Favorite

CHICAGO (AP) — Bobby Boyd, trying to regain the form that made him the No. 1 middleweight contender in 1956, is a 7-5 choice tonight against veteran Holly Mims.

The 10-rounder in Chicago Stadium will be televised and scored under the five-point system.

Boyd, a lanky 25-year-old Chicagoan who licked the top of the middleweight crop then skidded out of the rankings, counter-punched his way to victory over the crafty Mims in Chicago Stadium in 1956. Mims, 30, battled him to a draw in Miami Beach a year ago.

The Washington, D.C., battler went on in 1957 to score a surprising upset of highly-rated Spider Webb, lick Sammy Walker and stop Johnny Cunningham. He now is ranked No. 7 by the National Boxing Assn. and No. 4 by Ring Magazine.

The odds favoring Boyd are banked on his renewed desire, an ingredient that evidently had been lacking at times in his unpredictable ring ventures. Boyd's defensive lapses have cost him six defeats by knockouts. But he has nailed 23 opponents in winning 51 decisions. He has dropped six decisions and fought to three draws.

Mims doesn't have the punching power of Boyd, but he is a sharpshooter who can set his own pace and make an opponent follow it.

In 10 years as a pro he never has been knocked out in compiling a 15-16-6 record. His victories include 11 kayoes.

Hagan Holds Lakers Star

In a Philadelphia doubleheader, the Boston Celtics rolled over Cincinnati 109-95 and Detroit's Phil Jordan scored a lay-up in the last 21 seconds to defeat Philadelphia 107-85.

It was a one-two job for the Hawks, with Hagan's defense complementing Bob Pettit's 38-point performance and 35 rebounds, both were Garden records this season.

Nats Coach Paul Seymour and the Knicks' Fuzzy Levane both protested officials of the opposing clubs sitting on the teams' benches.
