**Werner Rites Set Saturday**

Eugene Werner, a long time resident of Klamath Falls, died January 5, apparently following a heart attack. He was born in Skutskar, Sweden, in 1896 and came to this country in 1919. He met and married Edith Norrgard in Oakland, California, in 1922. They moved to Klamath Falls in 1929 and resided at 2327 Darrow.

He was a member of the 29-Year Club of Weyerhaeuser Timber Company having been employed there since 1930. Mr. Werner was an active member of the Order of Vasa No. 460 in this city, and had served as district master of the Northwest District of the International Order of Vasa. He was also a member of the Klamath Lutheran Church and the International Woodworkers of America.

Beside the widow, he is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Charles Johnson of McMinnville, and Mrs. Joseph Matlick Jr. of Klamath Falls; two brothers, Conrad Werner of Chicago and Emil Erickson of Sweden; one sister, Karen Skarberg of Sweden; and three granddaughters and two grandsons.

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 2 p.m. from Wards Funeral Home.
