Nelson Sees NY Tax Hike

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller launched his administration today by telling New Yorkers they must pay millions more in state taxes.

The new Republican governor declared in his first annual message to the Legislature that the state's fiscal affairs had fallen into "a serious condition of deterioration" under Democrat Averell Harriman.

"Much as we deplore the facts," he said, "conditions require additional tax revenues now."

Rockefeller said he was struggling with a deficit of "at least 230 million dollars" in the new budget.

He said he would spell out his tax proposals in the budget message, which he must submit to the GOP-controlled Senate and Assembly by Feb. 1.

The governor's 7,000-word message hewed strictly to state problems, unlike his inaugural message, which carried strong international overtones and prompted new speculation on Rockefeller's White House potential.

He linked virtually all of the state's problems to its economic climate, which he said had grown stale during Harriman's four-year tenure — an era marked by constant battling between Harriman and the Legislature.

Rockefeller reported that, during the last four years, state spending had climbed 46 per cent, while revenues increased only 35 per cent.

The new budget is expected to approach two billion dollars.

FACE CHANGES

Leadership Battle Looms

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two groups of Senate Republicans moved toward a head-on clash behind closed doors today for power in the Senate's GOP leadership.

Peacemakers among them still were trying to work out some compromise, fearful that in electing their floor leader and whip, the Republicans might split wide open their already thinned ranks.

An insurgent group of self-styled Liberals led by the veteran Sen. George Aiken of Vermont pledged a no-compromise fight to elect Sen. John Sherman Cooper of Kentucky as the GOP floor leader and Sen. Thomas Kuchel of California as whip.

The conservatives, quarter-backed by Sen. Styles Bridges of New Hampshire, backed Sen. Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois for leadership, and claimed enough votes to elect him.

The winner needs at least 18 votes if all the 34 eligible senators participate. In advance of the balloting, some conservatives claimed at least 19 votes lined up for Dirksen.

Kuchel officially is unopposed for the whip position being vacated by Dirksen, but Sen. Karl E. Mundt of South Dakota was put up as a potential candidate by some conservatives.

Mundt said he was not seeking the post, but had told those supporting him that "if they want to make it a contest, and they want me to do it, I would."
